Winners Remain In Running For City Hoop Title By Saturday Night's Win—Queen Square Wins School Title.

Playing the lead after five minutes of play in the opening half, Hi-Y club stayed in the running for the City Basketball title by turning back the Navy squad in the Y. M. C. A. Gym Saturday night by a score of 33 to 26.

Smashing Upset As Broker's Tip Leads Field Home

Canadian Jockeys Riding First Two Horses — 9 To 1 Shot Comes From Away Back To Win Kentucky Derby By Inches From Head Play.

Associated Press Sports Editor LOUISVILLE, Ky., May 7—Challenge of the east to the thoroughbred resources of the Blue Grass Country tonight had been decisively hurled back. In one of the most thrilling, bitterly fought two-horse finishes in the 59 year history of the classic Kentucky Derby, Broker's Tip on Saturday carried the famous colors of Colonel Edward Bradley to triumph by a scant notch over the speedy Head Play, in one of the most smashing upsets of American turf history.

CANADIAN JOCKEYS RIDING FIRST TWO HORSES

Two jockeys who won their spurs in Canada were aboard the winner and second horse, furnishing an outstanding feature of the race by their thrilling duel through the home stretch. Don Meade, who served his apprenticeship on Winnipeg tracks, piloted home the Bradley entry, while Herbie Fisher, a Toronto youth, fought desperately but futilely for victory with Head Play.

Nowhere at the start and only 11th in the three year old field of 18 around the first turn, Broker's Tip handed the form players a terrific jolt. The dark, powerful son of Black Toney-Forteresse came with a sensational start on the far turn, passed the string of Charles P. and Ladysman, the favorite, and then battled Head Play, nose and nose, in a tinging duel of horse flesh and rough riding right down to the wire.

Franco-Belgium Six-day Bike Pair Win Toronto Grind—Peden and Audy Second.

(Canadian Press) TORONTO, May 7.—Ability to win six-day bicycle races today had been ably demonstrated by the "Red Devil" team of Alfred Letourneur and Gerard Debauts in their first appearance before Toronto fans.
In a wild orgy of sprints and jams during the closing hours of the race Saturday night, the Franco-Belgium duo, handicapped when Debauts was forced to ride the last 90 minutes with two fractured ribs, literally rode the other eight teams into the boards with their clever manoeuvring and sustained speed.
The excitable Letourneur and his dour, but gritty partner, covered 2,546 miles, six laps, to finish three laps ahead of the Victoria-Montreal team of "Torchy" Peden and Jules Audy. These two teams stood out with their spectacular pedalling in the last 60 minutes and were the only ones to lap the field during this time.
