The announcement in yesterday's Morning Guardian that the contract for the Carleton Point Pier had been awarded was gratifying news to Prince Edward Islanders generally.

The contract figures, \$950,000, indicate the magnitude of this, the first step in this great undertaking. The pier will be one of the greatest in Canada.

It is estimated that the total initial expenditure in connection with the car ferry will be little less than ten million dollars.

For the year ended March 31, Canada received 185,347 British emigrants. Sixty per cent of the male emigrants were between the ages of 18 and 30, and their occupations as follows: Skilled trades, 32 per cent; laborers, 25 per cent; agriculturists, 19 per cent; commercial and professional, 1 per cent.

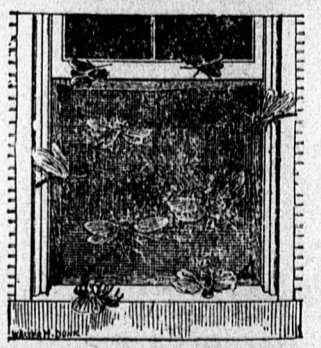

CAST WREATHS OVER TITANIC GRAVE BOSTON, Aug. 1.—Wreaths, fashioned by members of the family of William T. Stead, the London editor and author, who was lost in the Titanic wreck, were cast into the sea from the deck of the Cunard liner Franconia as that vessel lay with engines stilled over the grave of the Titanic last Sunday afternoon.
