The Experts Say

By KAY REX (Canadian Press Staff Writer) OTTAWA, Feb. 6 - (CP) - There's nothing like a bowl of hot soup to take the chill off a winter's day.

One of the easiest to make, and into which may be put most of the refrigerator's leftovers, is soup stock.

Ingredients: two pounds beef (soup bones, shank, neck or ribs); one tablespoon fat; two quarts cold water; one large onion; one-quarter cup chopped celery, stalk or leaves; one tablespoon salt; three whole cloves; one bay leaf; one-quarter teaspoon thyme, savory or sweet majoram.

Brown meat lightly in fat. Add cold water, cover and simmer 1 1/2 hours. Add vegetables and seasonings and cook one hour longer.

Strain, cool and remove fat before using. Yield: eight cups.

For Vermicelli Soup, bring stock to boiling point, add one-half cup vermicelli, cover and boil gently for 20 minutes.

Vegetable Soup - Ingredients: two small slices salt pork; one small onion; two tablespoons browned flour; two cups shredded cabbage; one cup tomato juice or canned tomatoes; one cup diced carrot; one cup diced potato; one-quarter cup cut barley; two quarts hot water; salt and pepper.

Cut salt pork in cubes and cook slowly to extract fat. Add finely chopped onion and brown lightly.

Sprinkle with browned flour and blend well. Add prepared vegetables, barley water and seasonings. Cover and cook slowly for one to 1 1/2 hours. Yield: about 12 cups.

Breakfast isn't the only meal at which cereal plays an important part. It is often used in dinner dishes, such as rolled oats in scalloped dishes.

Tomato Wiener Scallion - Ingredients: One-quarter cup minced onion; 2 1/2 cups tomato juice or milk; one teaspoon sugar; 1 1/2 teaspoons salt; one-quarter teaspoon pepper; one-half teaspoon prepared mustard; one cup rolled oats; two cups finely diced potatoes; six wieners; one tablespoon fat.

Combine onion, tomato juice, sugar, salt, pepper, mustard and potatoes in a shallow greased baking-dish; cover with one-third of the tomato mixture and repeat until all of the tomato mixture and potatoes are used. Brush wieners with melted fat and a little prepared mustard and place on top. Bake covered, in a moderate oven, 350 degrees Fahrenheit, until potatoes are cooked. Remove cover for last 15 minutes to brown wieners. Yield: six servings.

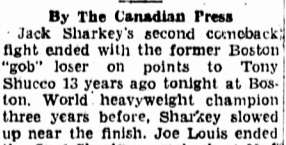
