STRENGTH OF BOURASSA

MONTREAL, Aug. 14—Fifteen thousand shouting people, at times beside themselves with excitement, and on the verge of breaking out, to a free fight yesterday, saw, at St. Jovachin, a Liberal meeting called for the purpose of advocating the federal cause, turned into a Nationalist anti-federal demonstration. There is no use in beating against the bush, Henri Bourassa was the hero of the day. He and not Hon. Rodolphe Bouchette was able to make the usual question the feature of any meeting at which he is present, and, what is more to the point, able to hold it. The meeting simply goes to show that the Nationalist propaganda has become dangerous to the Liberal cause in Quebec, and there is ample proof at the meeting itself that the Conservatives will not be able to refrain from using Bourassa and his followers just as much as they will allow themselves to be used, no matter how much the principles of the two parties may differ.

Leaders Are Treating With Board of Trade. Temporary Truce is Observed.

LONDON, Aug. 17—The time limit of 24 hours within which the railway men demanded that their employers agree to consider their grievances expired this morning, but the threatened general strike on the railroads of the United Kingdom failed to materialize. Instead the representatives of four railway societies involved were in a conference with the Board of Trade and the traffic proceeded as usual. No formal orders were given the union men by their leaders, but it was generally understood that a truce would be observed while negotiations with the Board of Trade continued.

TURKEY DECIDES ON NEW POLICIES

LONDON, Aug. 16—A dispatch from Constantinople says there is a complete change in the internal and external policy of the Turkish Government. Where internal politics is concerned it has been decided to effect a rapprochement of the Moslems in the various non-Turkish nations, whether they be Christian or otherwise. An agreement has been reached between the government and the Greek, Bulgarian and American patriarchy in accordance with demands put forward by the patriarchy of the three countries. The internal politics the government will repudiate any attempts of the Pan-Islamic propaganda to draw vote attention, exclusively to political affairs or definitely ally itself with the triple entente.

ANARCHISTS ON PANAMA CANAL

Special to The Guardian. NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 17—A body of Anarchists has been discovered among the Spanish laborers on the Isthmian Canal. The discovery was made through the confession of a laborer, Antonio Lopez of Barcelona and alleged to have been implicated in the massacre of priests, nuns and other religious workers in various parts of Spain two years ago at the time Francisco Ferrer was executed at Barcelona.

BOY MURDERER IS NOT INSANE

NEW YORK, Aug. 10—Paul Geidel, the youthful slayer of William H. Jackson, the broker suffers from no mental ailment, but is sane and rational, in the opinion of James A. Cleary, his counsel. Mr. Cleary so announced this afternoon, adding that he based his belief upon information given him by an alienist who examined the bellboy in his cell for three hours recently. If the alienist so reported formally, Mr. Cleary said, there would be no application for a lunacy commission as had been contemplated.

HON. W. S. FIELDING IS NOMINATED

SHELburnNE, August 16—The liberal convention for Queens-Shelburne met today, when Hon. W. S. Fielding was nominated. The convention was small, the delegates coming from the west were very few on account of the forest fires, and from Liverpool, the number was very much reduced for the same reason. West of Shelburne, as a matter of fact, sent no delegates. No other name was mentioned for the nomination besides that of Mr. Fielding. A public meeting followed the adjournment of the convention, which was addressed by the minister of finance. The conservative convention will be held Friday.

SHERIDAN SENT UP FOR TRIAL

ORILLIA, Ont., Aug. 16—At the conclusion of the evidence taken before Magistrate Clark in the preliminary hearing into the cause of the death of Rossford, who was stabbed to death near here last Wednesday night, Arthur Sheridan, who is charged with the murder was committed to Barrie, to stand trial at the Fall Assizes in October. Sheridan alleges the stabbing was done in self-defence.

\$100,000 FIRE CAUSED IN OTTAWA BY CIGARETTES

OTTAWA, August 16—A fire occurred here tonight with losses estimated at \$100,000. Two boys smoking cigarettes while tending a team of horses, set fire to the warehouses of Provost and Allard, wholesale grocers and did \$20,000 damage there. The flames then caught to Chevril hotel on Murray street which was completely gutted, and some of the shanty men therein had to be carried out by firemen, owing to being under the influence of drink. The fire scorched many nearby houses and between the fire and water cost some \$100,000 damages ere it was over. As the surrounding buildings were old and constructed of wood, considerable excitement prevailed when firemen brought semi-nude shanty men down the ladders.

HILLSBORO SCHOOL REOPENS

The Macdonald Consolidated School will be reopened on Sept. 5th after the midsummer holidays. This is made possible by a contribution of \$1200 from the P. E. Island millionaire, Sir Wm. C. Macdonald. Mr. Herbart District has voted into the school on the basis—forty cents on each hundred dollars, Government valuation of property, and a three dollar fee on each of the first two pupils in a family living within a mile radius of the school. ARRESTED THE WRONG PERSONS

He was at the station ready to enchain for Sydney on the five o'clock train when he was notified to remain behind. R. H. Murray, solicitor for the S. P. C., received a telegram shortly before 5 o'clock from the provincial constable, who made the arrest, saying that the wrong persons had been arrested. Consequently they had been released.
