New High For Pound Sterling At New York

(Canadian Press) NEW YORK, March 2.—Touching a new high for the year, the pound sterling soared on New York foreign exchange today to close at \$3.46 1/2 for cables, 5% cents higher than yesterday's close. The Canadian dollar, in sympathy with the pound, rose 1/2 cent to end the session at 8 1/2 cents. This represented a premium of 1 1/2% per cent on United States funds as against Canadian money.

WEDDALL FORMER PASTOR AT SUMMERSIDE PASSES—Miss Jessie Strong, of Summerside a personal friend of Mrs. Weddall, has received the sad news of the death on Feb. 20th at his home in Fredericton, N. B. of Rev. Dr. Weddall, Rev. Dr. Richard W. Weddall was pastor of the Methodist Church at Summerside from 1894 to 1897, and was the first minister of the new Methodist Church built about that time to replace the one which was burned. He had many friends in Summerside who will regret to hear of his passing. He visited the Island on several occasions and preached the address at the funeral of the late Charles Strong in 1919. Rev. Dr. Weddall was well known in the Maritimes and had been in active service in the ministry for 52 years, and at the time of his diamond jubilee was presented with a framed scroll and other gifts from the Conference. He was president of the New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island Conference in 1897. He was born at Yarmouth, N. S., on August 11th, 1849 a son of the late Rev. Richard Weddall and Mrs. Weddall, and was a graduate of Mount Allison University in 1869. He was ordained in 1873. His first church was at Queen Square, St. John, N. B. Although retired, he often occupied the pulpit of Wilmot Church, Fredericton up to the time of his last illness. He leaves to mourn his widow and two daughters, Mrs. G. R. Racine of Montreal and Miss Maud at home and one sister, Miss Louise Weddall of St. John, N. B. The funeral took place from Wilmot United Church on Feb. 21st to the Rural Cemetery. Rev. J. W. Bartlett conducted the service. Telegrams of regret were read from Mr. W. A. Watson, President of the Maritime Conference; Faculty of Mount Allison University; and Wesley United Church, Montreal. Prominent clergymen attended the funeral.—

Boston Citizen Boosts Beauties Of P. E. I.

That Prince Edward Island is getting a lot of free advertising and has an enthusiastic booster in Mr. Raymond Willard of Boston, is evidenced by the following notice which appeared in the "Evening Tribune" Lawrence, Mass., February 17, 1933. This is the second time recently that Mr. Willard has made the Island the subject of one of his interesting talks. For nearly two hours on the evening of January fifth he entertained a large audience under the auspices of the Lowell Bible Society while he traced the history of the Island from the time it was first sighted by Jacques Cartier up to the present. In his inimitable way he portrayed in words the appealing picturesqueness of this country until each one who heard him was kindled with a desire to see for himself the pastoral charm of the "Garden of the Gulf." Perhaps it is because Mr. Willard is an artist of considerable talent that he can describe the beauty of landscape and sea in such a convincing way. Among his paintings which have been exhibited at the Boston Art Club the past few years were scenes of Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia. He is now completing a twenty-five by thirty canvas in oil from a sketch of Charlottetown harbor which he made last summer and which will probably be finished for the spring exhibition.

It is very gratifying for us who are Island born, but living in Massachusetts, to have a man like Mr. Willard whose ancestors and himself, have lived in New England since the landing of the "Mayflower" and therefore cannot be accused of a predilection for the Island through tradition or residence there, speak so highly and broadly of the merits of it. We trust he will continue his good work and are pleased to learn he anticipates visiting the Island this summer and hopes to bring back many sketches. Judging from his work which we have seen we know they will be very pleasing and bring to us who are unable to go ourselves glimpses of the land we love so well.

ROTARIANS HEAR HISTORY OF PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND

(Evening Tribune, Lawrence, Mass. Feb. 17, 1933) The interesting origin and romantic history of Prince Edward Island, the smallest of the Canadian Provinces, were entertainingly described by the members of the Lawrence Rotary Club Thursday noon by Mr. Raymond D. Willard, senior member of the accounting firm of Robert Douglas Company with offices in Boston and this city. Vice President John F. Murphy presided and the speaker was introduced by Chairman Harold T. Houston of the attendance committee.

Mr. Willard traced the history of the Island from the time of its discovery down through the years to the present day, and revealed many enjoyable side lights in connection with its methods and customs. He said that it is a place of peace and plenty where touches of the old and modern worlds mingle harmoniously together.

The speaker, who visits the Island regularly each year, said that it boasts neither poverty or riches. Its inhabitants are a kindly people, many of whom still follow their pursuits in antiquated style, such as grinding grain and using spinning wheels. He mentioned the fact that his appearance before the Rotary Club was made the same day that the new Prince of Wales College was being dedicated on the Island.
