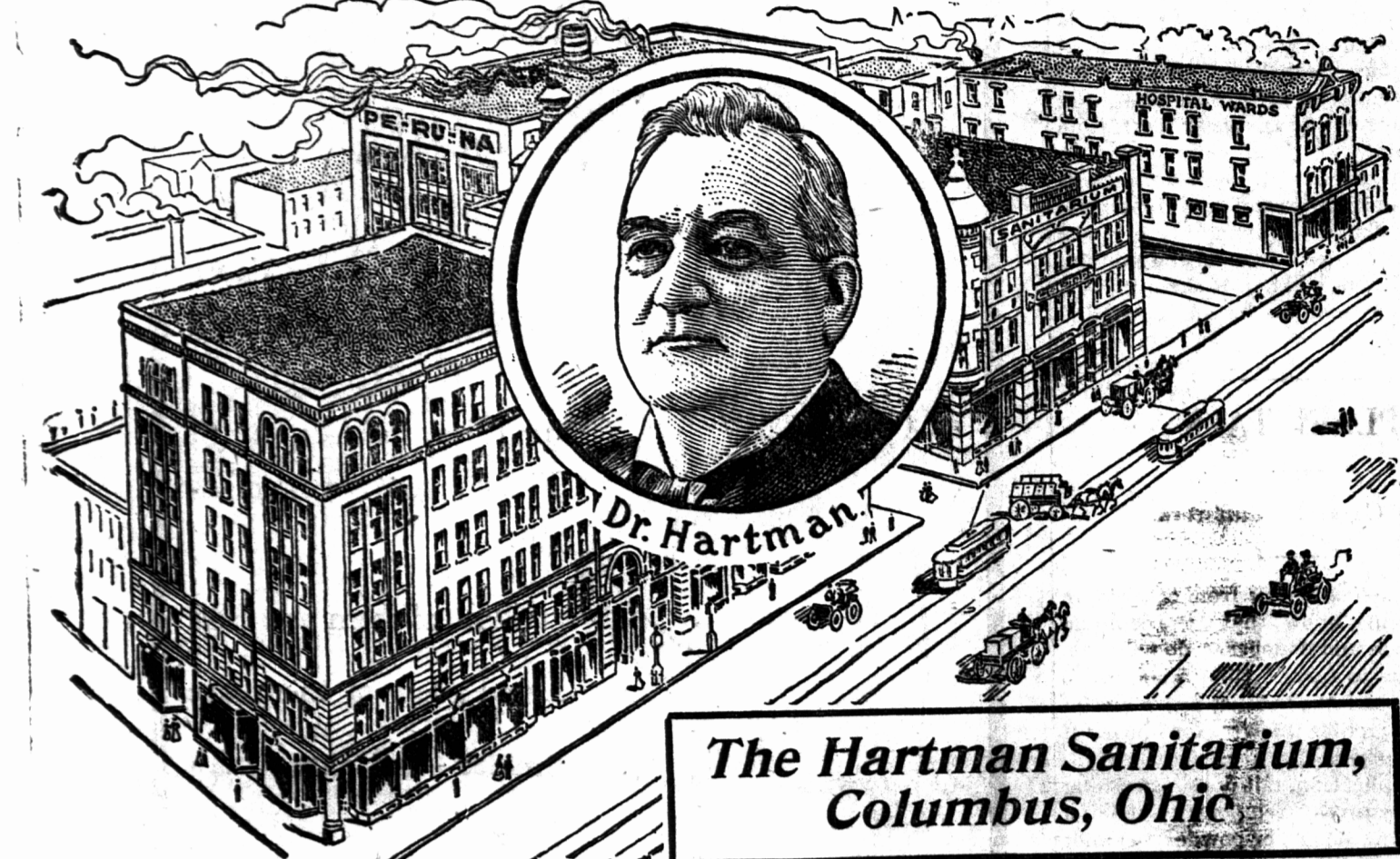

THE EDITOR'S MAIL.

Father Burke Remonstrates.

SIR.—I have to remonstrate against the bald assertion of your reporter that my speech at the English meeting "was chiefly an attack on Superintendent Sharp." If a plain statement of fact, and an honest and fearless presentation of our case in the west, constitute an attack on Mr. Sharp, so much the worse for his position in this railway matter. Why should I dissemble? The Superintendent preceded me in addressing the English meeting and attempted to adduce figures against a second train in winter which were altogether unfair and which he was not able to defend, and I had to show up the conspiracy into which he had gone to get them and did so. You can make figures prove anything if you are so minded. I also repudiated as did others the contention of the superintendent that train arrangements were to be made for freight first and public convenience after and showed how both could be better served and a system of train service used that would not outrage the rights and feelings of any section of the country. That this end of the Island is shamefully used, even Mr. Sharp had to admit. Who is responsible for this treatment? Mr. Sharp and Mr. Sharp alone; therefore, when you condemn the treatment you condemn the cause of it, and speaking the simple truth, are made to attack when you are really defending your rights. It were much better for your reporter to state the argument in these matters and let the public draw its own conclusions. The resolutions passed at the meeting without a dissenting voice, are certainly a greater attack on Mr. Sharp than my speech, and neither I nor the meeting considered the personality of the head of the road further than it is responsible for a "preposterous" state of affairs as to our trains and one we are not disposed to further tolerate.
