**LEAVING FOR STRAITS OF BELLE ISLE**—The C. G. S. Arranmore, Captain Gilbert, which has been undergoing repairs and painting for the last month at the Marine Wharf, will leave port today with supplies for lighthouses on the Straits of Belle Isle. Leaving on the Arranmore are Mr. H. Bibby of the Dominion Meteorological Department, Toronto, and Mr. D. Sutherland, radio direction finder. Mr. Bibby will visit the different stations to check up on the test balloon flights carried on for the purpose of determining the velocity and direction of the upper air. The balloons used are about two feet in diameter, and are filled with hydrogen. The work of calculation is accomplished by means of very delicate mathematical instruments.

**SHRINE DEDICATED**—An interesting ceremony took place on Sunday in the Roman Catholic Church at Seven Mile Bay. A shrine in honor of eight French priests, who came to Quebec in the early days to convert the Iroquois Indian tribes and who gave their lives to the cause was dedicated on Sunday by Rev. Joseph McGree, C. S. S. R., of Charlottetown. Rev. Father McGree preached a very eloquent sermon on the martyrs. Rev. William Monaghan, parish priest, was in a large measure responsible for bringing the shrine to their church.—S.

**MOURN PERSONAL FRIEND**

The officers of the Euphrobia, which now lies at the Marine Wharf, Summerville, mourn the loss of Squadron Leader E. L. Johnson, Chief Navigation Officer of the R-101, the ill-fated dirigible, which crashed to earth early Sunday morning at Beauvais, France. Mr. Johnson was a navigation officer of world renown and had served time in the ships of the Stagnation Co., of Northshields, England, to which company the Euphrobia belongs. He was personally known to some of the officers. At the opening of the war he left the Marine Service and joined the Air Force and became an intrepid aviator. After the war he continued in the Force and was on the R-100 when she came to Montreal. One of the officers of the Euphrobia has with him an interesting picture of Mr. Johnson and his wife as they were leaving Buckingham Palace in company with Capt. Bernard and wife, when they were decorated by His Majesty, King George, for special service rendered to their country when they took the Air Minister on a trial flight to Kanachi, India. Capt. Bernard was the pilot and Squadron Leader Johnson, navigation officer. The S. S. Euphrobia, Capt. Connolly, experienced a stormy passage from Montreal, but had fair weather from Swansea, England.—S.

**New Water Supply Available By December 1st.**

The supply of water for the City is still very low. Mr. J. A. MacMillan, Water Commissioner, reports. The water supply this Fall is the lowest for many years. The same difficulty is experienced in the country as well as in the City.

The water commission expects that the auxiliary supply from the new wells at Brackley will be available by December 1, if exceptionally bad weather is not experienced. Tenders for the pumping station are being let today. This week the wells will be connected to a suction pipe. Pipes have been laid to about half the distance between the Brackley wells and the reservoir.
