## OLYMPIC WINTER GAMES OPEN TODAY

### Foster And Archer Former Canadian Hockeyists Ruled Ineligible For Competition

Chancellor Hitler To Officiate At Opening Ceremonies That Will Send Games Underway. Canada To Meet Poland In Opening Game.

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) GARMISCH-PARTENKIRCHEN, Germany, Feb. 5.—The International Hockey Federation ruled two Canadian-trained members of the English hockey team ineligible for competition tonight on the eve of the opening of the fourth Olympic Winter Games.

The players, James Foster, formerly of Winnipeg and Moncton, and Alexander Archer, ex-Winnipegger, were ruled out for having transferred to English teams without the permission of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association.

E. A. Gilroy, of Portage La Prairie, Man., President of the C. A. H. A. explained to the meeting the Association rule that players desiring to leave the Dominion must apply for a transfer to keep in good standing. Archer and Foster, he charged, had broken this rule.

With three members abstaining, the International Federation voted unanimously to uphold the Canadian position and the two players were stamped ineligible for the Olympics.

The vote reduced the number of Canadian-trained players on the English ice team. This trio, along with Foster and Archer, were born in the British Isles.

The vote cleared the air, and with weather conditions ideal, the Winter Olympics tonight awaited only a few words from Chancellor Hitler to make them official.

At 11 a. m. Thursday (7 a. m. A.S.T.) Germany's Fuehrer, following the historic colorful parade of the nations, will proclaim the Games open.

Three and a half hours later, Canada's hockey array, confident of keeping the Dominion's supremacy in that sport intact, will square off against Poland in the first competition of the international athletic carnival.

### Island Entered In MacDonald Tankard Play

#### Trophy For Provincial Competition

Prince Edward Island will be represented in the Dominion curling championships which open in Toronto in March, Secretary C. M. Williams of the Provincial Association announced last night.

Association officials from Summerside, and Montague met with local officials yesterday and decided to send a team to compete for MacDonald Brier Tankard Trophy, after they had discussed matters in connection with the eligibility of a team from this province for competition in the Dominion championships.

Atler Prince Edward Island Curling Association had applied for entry in MacDonald tankard play, they were informed one week ago a team from the province would not be eligible.

Secretary Williams communicated with Secretary C. S. Richards, MacDonald trustees and was informed that the province's application would be reconsidered if certain qualifications could be met.

Last night Mr. Williams announced a team representing Prince Edward Island could meet the requirements and Macdonald Trustees had accepted the province's application.

In the course of the meeting Mr. Williams read a telegram from Mr. C. S. Richardson offering the presentation of a trophy on behalf of the curling clubs to the provincial playdowns winner together with transportation to and from Toronto as a prize for the winning rink which will represent the province in the Macdonald-Brier Tankard playoff.

Needless to say the offer was enthusiastically received. Previous to this donation by the tobacco company, Mr. Harry Winchester, city, offered to donate a cup to be known as the "Kinlock Trophy" for provincial team competition.

### British Boxer To Make Bid For U.S. Titles

NEW YORK, Feb. 5.—The boxing tom-toms will start beating again tomorrow when Jock McAvoy returns to New York with the most ambitious ring program ever undertaken by an invading pugilist.

McAvoy, holder of British titles in the middleweight and light-heavyweight classes, wants to capture the world titles in both divisions.

McAvoy is matched to fight John Henry Lewis, negro holder of the light heavy or 175-pound title. The date has been shifted several times and is likely to be set for some time in March, at Madison Square Garden, to avoid conflict with the newly developed McLarin-Conzoneri match.

If successful, he proposes to challenge Jimmy Braddock, Joe Louis or whoever is on top, for the world's heavyweight championship, in 1937.

### Action Taken Against Club Executive

Canadian Press Staff Writer (By Guardian's Special Wire) TORONTO, Feb. 5.—President W. A. Fry of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada announced tonight the expulsion from amateur sport of nine members of the Ottawa Roughriders Football club executives as an aftermath of the "great impersonation" of Roy Berry by Bohn Hilliard last fall.

Hilliard, former University of Texas halfback, assumed the name of Roy Berry and played with Roughriders in the Interprovincial Union last season. Mr. Fry said he was satisfied that the impersonation actually took place and he was not satisfied that the club executive was unaware of it.

Those expelled are George F. Perley, P. Lorne Young, Stewart Christie, James P. McCaffrey, James Wright, Robert Thompson, J. E. Stanley Lewis, J. P. Ebbis and S. C. Hooper. Mr. Lewis is Mayor of Ottawa.

"It is almost incredible to believe that such prominent sportsmen could have acquiesced in this shocking breach of the ethics of British fair play and sportsmanship, and it will be a pleasure, indeed, to lift this ban if and when any or all of those mentioned present to the Eastern Ontario branch of the Union of Ottawa satisfactory evidence that the impersonation was without their knowledge," Mr. Fry asserted.

An official investigation of the Hilliard-Berry impersonation, conducted by the A. A. U. of C. through Daniel J. Ferris of New York, Secretary of the Amateur Athletic Union of the United States, revealed that Roy Berry could not have been in Ottawa last fall.

At the end of a 2,000-word summary of the situation, addressed to all branches of the A. A. U., outlining his investigation and the various steps taken before the question came into official hands, President Fry said:

"This, therefore, is to notify all branches of the A. A. U. of C. that from this date forth the athletes under their control are forbidden, under penalty of suspension, to participate in any individual or team sport sponsored by a club which has on its list of officers, directly or indirectly, any of last year's Ottawa rugby football players."

### Schurman Sinks Winning Counter As Crystals Debeat Superiors 3-2

A brilliant unassisted goal from the stick of Jackie Schurman early in the third period gave Summerside Crystals a 3-2 victory over the Superiors at the Forum last night in an exhibition game. Schurman's goal broke a 2-all deadlock that had existed from the second period and although the losers failed to score the equalizer they gave the largest crowd of fans of the season thrill after thrill as they repeatedly sent four and five man attacks deep into Crystal territory, only to be turned back by a rugged defence and smart goalie.

The game was a typical old time Charlottetown-Summerside struggle with Crystals being cheered on by 400 western fans who had come down by special train. Neither team showed to any advantage over the other and the encounter was close all the way. Fifteen penalties were dished out by referees: Mel Diamond and Crilly Lea, mostly for minor offences as with the exception of a flare up in the first period the players stuck strictly to hockey even though the checking at times was plenty rugged and feeling was running high. The flare-up occurred early in the first period when Williams and Phillips started trading punches but five minute penalties slapped on the offenders cooled off their battling tendencies.

On the Summerside lineup last night were familiar faces to Charlottetown hockey fans, Montgomery, Schurman, Danny Gallant and Charlie Cahill were all there and although they may have slowed up somewhat they retain plenty of their old cunning. Cahill, lately reinstated to the amateur rinks was probably the best man on the ice. He was a distinct threat all evening and with Jackie Schurman shared the starring honors of the visitors. Schurman figured in all three goals, scoring the winner and drawing assists on two while Cahill accounted for one.

Play, after a ragged start, pepped up considerably at the halfway mark of the first period and Weeks, Superiors' goalie, performed sensationally on two occasions as he out-guessed Schurman from five feet out after the tricky centreman had stekhandled through. Battling even the teams failed to score a goal until after fourteen minutes had elapsed but when they did start three goals were shot in less than six minutes with the visitors getting the odd one.

Montgomery of the Crystals sent the visitors into a one-nothing lead at 14:25. Schurman carrying over the line bounced a hard drive off Weeks' pads and Montgomery was right in position to slam the rebound back into the cage.

One minute and 25 seconds later Superiors made it 1-all on a pretty combination play. McIntyre skating down left wing rounded Woodside on the Summerside defence to slip a short forward pass to Smith and the latter player made no mistake as he pecked the open corner cleanly.

Crystals however, came right back and before the period was over had regained the lead. Again it was Schurman who made the pay for the goal, this time feeding Cahill inside the line and the former pro gave Weeks no chance as he skated into close quarters with the disc.

Through a fast second period Superiors continually were on the offensive and their efforts led to them tying the count. Early in the period they had a man advantage when Phillips drew a penalty but couldn't get their gangy play clicking effectively. The teams were at full strength when they did score. Ernie Diamond racing in fast to snap home Peters' rebound on a long shot from centre ice. The locals had another chance toward the close of the period when Gallant was waved to the box but again they could not take advantage of the opportunity.

It took the visitors just four minutes of the final session to cage the winning tally and it was Schurman who turned the trick. Taking possession stickhanded through the Superior defence and Weeks was caught cold as Schurman's backhand drive from ten feet out landed high in the cords.

It was the winning counter despite the frantic efforts of the losers but in the remaining time the fans were treated to action every minute. Play lived up right after the score and penalties began to fly thick and fast. Shorthanded or not though there was little thought of defensive hockey and none shown and although the Crystals were hard pressed at times they held their's lim lead until the bell.
