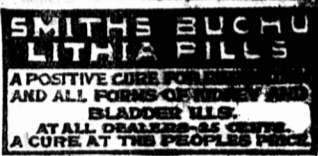

A SIGNIFICANT LETTER.

The New York Tribune prints a translation of the private letter of a prominent Russian to a citizen of New York which is quite remarkable in its way. The Tribune affirms that the writer belongs to a wealthy family which is on terms of intimacy with the Czar's household, is related to members of the Ministry and is himself a high official. The letter, literally translated, reads as follows: "I had wished to write thee a letter, above all about our ideas of the war. The war is most unpopular and we all desire our own defeat. We hope that it will open the eyes of the people to the fraud of our Government, which is universally hated. One hears on all sides that the Japanese are fighting for our freedom. There is nowhere the slightest feeling against the Japanese."

The Tribune remarks that if on all sides among the Russian upper class it is said that the Japanese are fighting the battle of Russian freedom, and an intelligent Russian can say "we all desire our own defeat," on what a precarious footing must the whole bureaucracy, with its domestic and foreign troubles, stand. A STATUE TO FRANCES E. WILLARD.

The late Miss Frances E. Willard is to be honored by a statue in the National Statuary Hall at Washington among the great women departed. The honor comes by resolution of Congress. The statue is the gift of the great state of Illinois. This is the first statue of a woman to be placed in the great hall of the nation. Referring to the incident the Washington Star says: "If ever an American woman deserved the tribute to her memory that was paid yesterday by the Congress of the United States, it was Frances E. Willard. For she, notably among the members of her sex, contributed in her life to the welfare of mankind. Her name was a household word throughout the United States and was familiarly known in Europe. She had become a power. And her influence remains today and will continue as long as women work against evil and seek the betterment of mankind." When the statue was unveiled many hundreds of little children threw flowers at its base. Miss Willard is represented standing on a platform in the act of speaking, her right hand resting on a small reading desk.

There is much talk of provincial rights these days in the West. That is well in its way. The sort of provincial rights in which Prince Edward Island is just now most interested is the right of this Province to efficient steam communication.

The new French submarine torpedo boat Korrigan, with her crew on board recently remained submerged continuously for twelve hours without inconvenience. This is the longest record for continual submersion. The Korrigan can make 12 knots an hour on the surface and seven knots when under water and has a radius of 80 miles.

It was in May of 1901 that the settlement for the then past default of the Dominion in regard to winter communication was made. The Act of Parliament in which the settlement was embodied, states that it is to be in full satisfaction of all claims which the Province "now" has, on account of the failure to give efficient steam communication. That little word "now" proves that it was no settlement for the future.

ENTERPRISE AT SYDNEY. SYDNEY, March 15.—Captain J. A. Parquhar, of Halifax, has succeeded in floating a company for the erection of a steel dockyard at North Sydney. The concern is capitalized at \$250,000. The federal government is giving a subsidy of 2 1/2 per cent of capital invested.

REASONS WHY WE SHOULD HAVE THE TUNNEL

Sir,—In reading your many editorials re the Tunnel, we cannot understand why any intelligent man or woman on P. E. Island should say one word in its discouragement. Let thoughtful persons review the past experiences of travelling over the Northumberland Straits in fall and winter months, what a state of hardship and misery it discloses. As a part of the civilized world our people have occasion to leave their homes at times, to fulfil the different missions of life. In doing so many of them have been injured for life, others have contracted colds they never recovered from, besides suffering agonies from cold, exposure, and the anxiety of facing piles of drifting ice and probable death.

The late John LePage our Island Minstrel has written the Dirge over the loss of the Fairy Queen, Oct. 7th 1853. What a sad tale, and such loss of life, that occurred a half century ago. We have now better facilities for travelling, certainly, but there is still great danger, delay and discomfort in crossing the straits. If we are to keep pace with civilization nothing but the Tunnel will accomplish the end sought after.

As an agricultural Province our exports are of bulky, perishable, nature and regular, rapid transit is necessary for success, in these lines. Our fisheries suffer from the same causes. It is a great disappointment to our people after getting their products ready for the outside markets to have such loss of money and labor. It is no wonder our population is decreasing for the people will go where their energies bring better results.

Our people would do well to take the example of Great Britain when she has any matter of great importance or public benefit to do politics sink into insignificance. Let us all stand united and firm in a reasonable demand from the Dominion Government. They will then think that it is worth while to connect us with the Mainland and our former trials and hardships in crossing the Straits will be a thing of the past, our trade and commerce will move on serenely amidst a happy and contented people, instead of wishing it had not been our fate to have been born in such an ice-bound regime.
