

Plan to Aid Jewish Farmers

TORONTO, Jan. 4.—The Federated Jewish Farmers of Ontario are organizing a campaign to raise \$50,000 to purchase and equip a farm near Georgetown as a training school for Jewish immigrants who come to Canada with the intention of settling in rural Ontario.

The decision of the organization to undertake the education in agriculture of Jewish immigrants is a result of the comparative failure of the arrangement with the Department of Immigration and Colonization by which prospective Jewish farmers are brought to Canada, according to Morris Saxo, President of the Federation.

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Bedeque Choral Society

On Tuesday evening, Dec. 29th, the Bedeque Choral Society, rendered an Artistic Programme of Musical Numbers to a deeply appreciative audience. The Chorus consisted of over forty voices was conducted by Rev. Dr. J. S. Sider, accompanied by Mrs. Earl Leard. The Soloists delighted the audience by their very fine interpretation of the selected songs. Mr. Gordon MacCallum especially, used his fine baritone voice with great skill, and almost perfect technique. Mr. J. B. Lewis as usual pleased everyone, by his excellent work in "Larkhour Watch", with Mr. Brewer Auld, while Mr. Auld and Miss Sophie Henderson in "Beautiful Bells" brought back sweet memories to many present. The Glee Club, rendered several selections especially one that was highly appreciated entitled "Soldier's Sleep".

The Choral Society is to be congratulated upon its very excellent work in the success of the Society's administration, are delighted, by the intense interest shown on the part of all the members. Two choruses per week are being maintained, and it is a very dreadful storm that prevents a good majority from being present.

Two new Departments have been created. The "Glee Club" and "The Orchestra". The men of the community that are really interested in the raising of community ideas, and can sing, are all joining and the result is very satisfactory, as it gives the Choral Society a splendid opportunity of demonstrating the Unity of the Christian Spirit, in its application to Social Ideals. The Society rejoices in the fact, that the choicest spirits of all the Churches, interested in Music, and thus, interested in the organization, are thus, interested in the Choral Society.

During the programme the choir demonstrated its ability to entertain and added to the enjoyment of the evening.

On December 31st, 1925, the Choral Society spent the evening in a Social Manner, in the Hall at Bedeque. Games were indulged in and a splendid spirit of friendship prevailed. Later in the evening dainty refreshments were served by the Ladies, and then the Society attended in a body, the Special Choral Watch Night Service held in the Central Bedeque Baptist Church.

This Service, although held in the Baptist Church, because of its central location, was distinctly a Choral Society Service. The President of the Society, Major Urie Dawson, occupied the Chair, and conducted the service in a very solemn and reverent manner. The invocation was offered by Deacon Colby Lewis of Freetown, followed by the famous hymn of John Wesley's "O for a Thousand Tongues to Sing." Mr. Brewer Auld of Freetown then read very beautifully the 103rd Psalm, which was followed by the rendering of the "Tenor Solo 'Somebody Cares'". In this solo, Mr. J. B. Lewis, excelled himself, and all felt that he was singing for the Lord and not for the gratuity of the audience. Mr. Gordon MacCallum of Lower Bedeque, the Baritone Soloist of the Society, then offered the Prayer of Consecration, and all joined with him in heart, as he voiced very beautifully the deepest aspirations of each member of the Society. It was a solemn moment. The poet's words for forgiveness, the regret of wasted opportunities in 1925, the consecration to purer ideals of Love and Service in 1926, found a deep echo in the hearts of all. Following the prayer, a paper was read by Mr. T. Bradshaw of Middle-town. Clearly did Mr. Bradshaw show the ideals of the Choral Society, and answered the oft asked question "What is the object of all this Choral endeavour?" He showed that a tremendous force Music had played in the Community Life of the Centuries and how now, in the Age would be, if Music ceased to exercise its spiritual function. He pledged the Society to a more consecrated effort in the Coming Year and closed by paying a tribute of friendship to the Musical Director, Dr. J. J. Sider. During the Offering, which was directed towards the Choral Society Funds, Mr. Leard, played very sweetly the famous "Ave Mezzo." His interpretation of this classic was very fine, the violin almost speaking, as the familiar strains stole softly through the Church.

Major Urie Dawson, then addressed the audience. As President he had a New Year's Message for the Choral Society, and also for all present. The message was found in the 46th chapter of Ezekiel, and the 2nd verse. "The Prince shall worship at the threshold of the gate; then he shall go forth, but the gate shall not be shut until the evening." Opportunity is the one thing that all Sovereigns of the Old Year and its opportunities had passed, but the New Year stood, beckoning all to its unknown adventures. It was a splendid thing for the Choral Society at this time to be engaged in Worship, it was the place to obtain strength and help for the "going forth" that always follows such worship. In going forth into 1926, all were to remember that they were using their talents for God, and that opportunity would be their slaves until the closing hours of the Year, when the gates of another Year would be shut, as surely as the gates of 1925 were being shut that night. A brief consecration service followed, and in the old Year died, the members of the Choral Society with bowed heads, prayed for purity of character, and spiritual power, for their opportunities in 1926.

As the New Year was born, sweetly in full harmony the Society sang "Lead Kindly Light Amid the Encircling Gloom," and after rising "Onward Christian Soldiers" rang out from hearts that had passed

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The following is a copy of the address read by Mr. J. A. McDonald, and the presentation was made by Mr. John McAskin, in behalf of the Young Men's League to Father McLellan, which was accompanied by a black merrschman pipe and case:

Rev. A. P. McLellan, Pastor of St. Andrew's Church, Spiritual Adviser of St. Andrew's Catholic Young Men's League.

Rev. and Dear Father,—We, the members of St. Andrew's Catholic Young Men's League, wish to express to you in some small manner our appreciation of the splendid support and assistance you have given us in our work. The organization of our new society is always attended with many difficulties and disappointments. But under your guiding hand and capable executive ability, the society is now safely past its initial stages, and we hope that, in the very near future the magnificent Jubilee Hall will arise, a towering monument to the master mind behind it all. Your keen understanding of human nature and especially of young men, was a great asset in making our meetings a success. Instead of a feeling of restraint which too often accompanies the presence of the clergy, your knowledge of young men coupled with your genial disposition, cast a mantle of comradeship over all that makes us feel at home. As pastor of St. Andrew's Church for the last twenty-five years, you left no stone unturned, perhaps it was with some trepidation you took charge of St. Andrew's Parish with all its glorious traditions to uphold. But you were not content to let St. Andrew's rest on the records of her former glory. Through your energy and capable management, your religious zeal and devotion, your flock for the last quarter of a century, you cannot point to a more glorious chapter in the history of St. Andrew's than today. Her sons, whom you might say have grasped the torch from the dying hands of the Sainly Bishop McEachern, are holding it high, in burning the flickering flame of Catholicity into the great beacon light of truth and hope it is today. Not only in our own diocese have St. Andrew's sons consecrated to the Holy Priesthood, done noble work, but also in other parts of Canada and the United States as well. And what few dioceses let alone parishes, can boast two of St. Andrew's stalwart sons, your own boys, you might call them, are today in far away Pagan China, carrying the Gospel of Christ to the children of the Sun. A crowning tribute, indeed, to your years of labor. In conclusion, dear Father, please accept this little token of affection, and when its fragrant aroma hovers around your head, may it symbolize our best wishes for a very Merry Christmas and a Happy and Prosperous New Year.

Bucharest Army Chiefs Plan Coup
