"Lords Versus The People"

LONDON, April 28.—Labor's hopes of fighting the next general election in Britain on the cry of "the Lords versus the people" was nearer realization today on account of Snowdon's Budget. It is obvious from the Chancellor's speech that he expects the present Government to be in office two years from now, when the land revenue taxes will become effective after the interval for valuation. He also expects that in the meantime there will be a big battle in Parliament on the measure which, with the help of the Liberals, will get through the Commons successfully, following its emergence from the lower house. It is thought that the Lords will oppose the new tax measures by all the means in their power, thus giving Labor the opportunity of going to the country with the Lords versus people cry as the pre-war Liberal Government did.

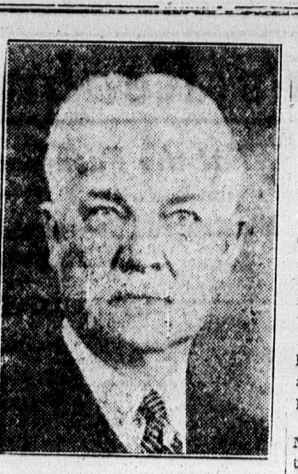

Well Known Citizen Passes

Seldom has a death caused more widespread public regret than that of Mr. James McEachern of this city, who passed away last evening at 10 o'clock in the Prince Edward Island Hospital. Suffering from periodic illness throughout the past winter, Mr. McEachern became seriously ill several weeks ago. Although his condition of late was a source of anxiety to his many friends, his passing was unexpected.

Born 65 years ago at West River Mr. McEachern moved to Charlottetown at an early age where he followed the work of plumbing and pipe-fitting the greater part of his life. During the last few years he operated a filling station on Prince Street.

A man of unusual physical strength Mr. McEachern in his younger days was very prominent in athletic circles, and won many trophies at various meets in which he participated. He was formerly a leading pole vaulter, and always took a deep interest in all branches of sport. The deceased was a member of the Caledonian Club.
