Missionary Convention.

The first Convention of the Women's Baptist Missionary Union of P. E. I., met in the Baptist church, Charlottetown, Wednesday, 26th inst. The morning session was devoted to a service of Praise and Prayer, led by the President, Mrs. J. C. Clarke.

The second session opened at 3 p. m., when an address of Welcome was given by Mrs. James DesBrisay of Charlottetown, and responded to by Mrs. Bishop of East Point. The greetings of the W. C. T. U. were conveyed to the Convention and fittingly replied to by Mrs. J. H. S'retch. Reports from local societies were of a very encouraging nature, showing progress in organization and increased financial support.

An admirable paper on "The three phases of missionary work" was prepared and read by Miss J. Currie. Mrs. Bethune, Mr. J. H. Stretch and Mrs. Caleb Taylor also read interesting papers on other phases of the work. Miss Davies and Mrs. Scantlebury read extracts from missionary workers. Mrs. Larter gave an address; appropriate music was sung; Mrs. Spurr's solo was pleasing and impressive.

The public meeting at 7.30 was largely attended. Quite a number of gentlemen were present. Interesting papers were read by: Mrs. Bishop on "Mission work and its great need," and Miss Ada Wadman on "Christian giving"; Miss McDonald read interesting "Extracts" from Mrs. Churchill's letters in which feeling reference was made to the recent illness of Miss McNeill who went out last Autumn from this Island. Rev. J. C. Sturr spoke forcibly on "The relation of Foreign Missions and our Educational Institutions." Bro. Carter earnestly urged "the relation of F. M. to Home Missions"; Rev. J. A. Gordon supplied Rev. A. Freeman's place on "the relation of F. M. to North West Missions" and also made a thoughtful appeal on "the Unity of our Work," in which was shown the interdependence and relation of each department of christian work.

The choir under direction of Mr. Hawley rendered a missionary anthem and other appropriate music.
