## Operations A Boon To Blind Persons

MONTREAL, Que., May 19 — The hope and best wishes of every blind person in Canada yesterday went with Dr. Jean Audet Lapointe, a diminutive, quiet spoken Montreal doctor on the staff of the Ste. Justine Hospital as he boarded a Trans Canada Air Lines North Star at Montreal airport. He is going to Nantes, France, to attend a congress of the French Society of Ophthalmology. Dr. Lapointe is believed to be the only Canadian doctor to have successfully restored sight to several patients by grafting to their eyes the cornea taken from those of dead persons. The delicate operations have achieved wide fame for the doctor who has been studying the theory of cornea grafting for many years. At Nantes he will join specialists at the congress of the French Society of Ophthalmology on May 23. Two days before the congress the specialists will meet to exchange the latest techniques in modern surgery. The Montreal doctor has been invited to perform one of his noted eye operations before the specialists during his visit to Nantes. On his return, Dr. Lapointe plans to establish an "eye bank" throughout Canada. He pointed out that many problems would have to be overcome, particularly since the cornea from the eyes of a dead person had to be used within three days.
