Meeting of Irish Self-Determination League
A very large and enthusiastic meeting in behalf of the Self Determination League was held on Monday, 25th inst. Mr. Hugh Duffy was appointed chairman and in a few witty and appropriate remarks introduced the speakers of the evening, Rev. Maurice McDonaid Dr. McGuigan and Mrs. L. G. Clarkin.

Dr. McGuigan was the first speaker and in clear and convincing language showed that the Irish had distinguished themselves wherever and whenever given a chance as citizens of any country to which they belong, and strongly refuted the charges that they are disloyal people but on the contrary he showed that they stand loyally for the first principles of good government and the upholding of the British Empire, and at some length reviewed the question of the independence of small nations which was understood to be the main cause why Great Britain and her colonies had went to war to defend their rights. Although Ireland is still without her Parliament the Irish people are more united than ever, and the Self-Determination League was organized to show that the sympathy of the people are with her in her struggle for her rights as a small nation.

Mrs. L. G. Clarkin who was a delegate from the Island to the great convention at Ottawa at which she said there were seven hundred delegates present, gave an excellent outline of the convention, and the leading speakers which included French, Scotch and Irish from every province of this great Dominion and many of them non-Catholic delegates, and she proved that many of the reports in the press that the British flag is to be side with the Flag of Ireland and that all classes were members of the Self-Determination League in Canada. Mrs. Clarkin is a pleasing speaker and was warmly applauded by the audience.

Rev. Maurice began by asking whether the matter with Ireland, and he showed the cause of the breach between England and Ireland and spoke at length on the reasons why the people of Canada went overseas in 1914 to defend the rights of Belgium, Poland and other small nations, which were being at that time over run by Germany; and we are organizing the Self-Determination League for no other purpose than to show the rulers of the British Empire that we are asking for Ireland only what we have in our own Dominion. Self Government and the Irish Nation will never be satisfied with the treatment which she is receiving at the present time, a treatment which any nation would resent. We are here by our efforts and sympathy in this cause to strengthen the British Empire when we advocate a fair measure of Home Rule for Ireland.

When the speaker finished 125 subscribed their names as members of the League.

Ames Holden to Re-Open Shops on Open Contracts
MONTREAL, Oct. 27.—Preparatory to re-opening their factories which on account of public reluctance to buy "shoes have been closed for the past three months, Ames Holden McCrea Co. have decided to maintain an open shop and have informed the local officers of the boot and shoe workers' union of their intention to break the agreement which the men say does not expire till next May.

The company also refused to receive a visit from the general officers of the union declaring it would negotiate with the men direct from union headquarters in Boston. The workers have been promised support in their determination to oppose reduction of wages or increase of hours.

Another shoe manufacturing firm has intimated cut of 15 per cent in wages and an increase in hours from 50 to 55 per week effective November 1st.
