New Method Of Attack On Police Barracks Rebels in Ireland Copeled Trainmen to Help Up Train While They Fire on a Barracks DUBLIN, May 18.—Rebels have adopted a new method for attacks on police barracks. Travelling by train yesterday they compelled the trainmen to stop the train at Ballinaderreen, County Mayo, and opened fire on a barracks. The police replied, wounding one passenger in the train. The members of the attacking party were pursued by the police, and the belief is expressed that one of the party was killed. A prominent district leader named Jim Hunt was captured. Nine policemen were ambushed yesterday at Lanesborough, County Longford, and one of them was killed and three were wounded. Seven policemen ran into a ambushade at Kintilly, Kings County, Tuesday evening and one man was killed and three were wounded. A royal marine named Williams was taken from a barroom near Roscos Point, carried to the seashore and riddled with bullets. BELFAST, May 18.—District Inspector Walsh was seriously wounded by three men during service in St. Patrick's Catholic Church, Tuesday evening. Members of the congregation were searched on leaving the church and eight men were arrested. DUBLIN, May 18.—An official announcement issued today says that a party of thirteen rebels near Kilmac, Thomas County Waterford was struck out, when the matter surrendered without a fight. The men handed over their arms and five bicycles.

CANADIAN WAR VETERAN AT SYRACUSE THREATENED WITH DEPORTATION SYRACUSE, N. Y. May 19.—Because he owes hospital bills and authorities have expressed fears that he and his wife might become public charges, Alexander McCallum, Canadian Overseas World War veteran, faces deportation to Canada, together with his invalid wife and their eight children. The eldest boy is 18 years of age and the youngest child, two. Only possible eleventh-hour intervention with the Secretary of Labor at Washington by Congressman Magee, can save the expulsion of the family. Aid of Congressman Charles Robb of the Syracuse, Comrades of the War, Veterans of America, of which McCallum is a member. This course was taken by the Americanization League. McCallum claims his side of the case has never been heard. He and two children are working and earn \$43 weekly. Illness of his invalid wife and daughter caused hospital bills aggregating over two hundred dollars. He is paying these bills by instalments. He has a notice that the family would be deported today, but no officers have arrived, and he is still carrying on. Sons of St. George and Clan Douglas are aiding his cause. Then the father of seven, McCallum enlisted in 1916 and went overseas. He came to this country two years ago. McCallum was born near Smith's Falls, Ont., forty years ago, was married at Westport and came here from Phillipsville.

May 18.—The largest class in the history of the university was graduated from St. Francis Xavier's yesterday when the degree of Bachelor of Arts was conferred on twenty-eight students. Four of the graduates were young lady students of Mount St. Bernard Convent, who received their degrees at a separate convocation held in the immaculate Hall of the convent, last evening. St. Francis Xavier conferred the honorary degree of LL. D. on A. G. MacDonald, inspector of schools, Antigonish, and the honorary degree of M. A. on Alphonsus Landry, professor in the Normal College, Truro. R. McKenna of Bathurst, and Miss Nelle Landrigan, of Moncton, to receive their degrees. Among the prize winners at the closing were: Edward Jennings, St. John, who won the gold medal for the highest aggregate in the junior year, and also a second prize of 100 francs. Arthur Chaisson, St. John won the first prize of \$50 for freshman English, the first prize in French and tied with Edward Baillie for first prize in physics. Thomas Bohan, Bath, N. B. tied for a prize in English. The second prize in freshman English was won by William J. Maynes, St. John. Rev. Dr. H. P. MacPherson, president of the University, in his address said that the year just closed had been one of the most successful in the history of St. Francis Xavier. The attendance, which was fifty per cent, greater than it had ever been, was so large that accommodation for students had to be found in the town. Eloquently setting forth the duties of the college man towards his fellow who had not enjoyed the same opportunities and advantages, Right Rev. Monsignor Foley, rector of St. Mary's Cathedral, Halifax, today addressed the largest graduating class in the history of the university at the annual commencement exercises of this institution. Twenty-seven received the degree of Bachelor of Arts.

German Goods Importers Uneasy (Special to The Guardian) MONTREAL, May 19.—The importers of Montreal, desiring in German goods are much concerned at the proposed provision in the budget that the customs valuation shall disregard depreciation in foreign currency below 50 per cent. The importers, who claim that at least \$5,000,000 worth of German goods are at present enroute for Canada, and fearing a big drop in trade, organized a big deputation to wait on Sir Henry Drayton and requested him to drop the case. The deputation which consisted of firms from Montreal and Toronto who import dry goods, felts, silks, blocks, from German and Austrian manufacturers generally were told by the Minister of Finance that he would consider the matter. From enquiries made by a local paper it seems that the importers generally by doing this, the new clause is aimed principally against the importation of German goods in Canada. METHODIST DIVINE IS RE-PRIMANDED FOR HIS CONDUCT Head of Home Mission Board of Church in Canada Severely Criticized at Lay Session of Ottawa District For Letter Written To Another Minister. OTTAWA, May 18.—Rev. C. E. Manning, D. D., of Toronto, head of the home mission board of the Methodist church in Canada, was severely criticized today at the lay session of the annual meeting of the Ottawa district Methodist in Dominion church for "his autocratic unchristianlike and unsympathetic manner" of replying to a request made by Rev. A. A. Radley, chairman of the district. Rev. Mr. Radley wrote to Dr. Manning on behalf of the minister of one of the country circuits, who was badly in need of funds. The country minister had succeeded in raising \$180 more than the amount set for salary purposes by the home mission board and had forwarded it to Rev. Mr. Radley, at the same time saying that he was badly in need of funds. This information was communicated by Mr. Radley to Rev. Dr. Manning with the request that the \$180 be returned. Dr. Manning, without referring the matter to the home mission board, replied saying that it was impossible to comply with the request and that he was surprised that Mr. Radley had taken it upon himself to make such a request. The letter when read to the meeting aroused the ire of several delegates, who referred to Dr. Manning's action as dictatorial and autocratic, and said the letter lacked sympathy and Christian spirit. The chairman was authorized to write to Rev. Dr. Manning conveying to him the feeling of the meeting. The foundation of a permanent flower border should be made up of early perennials.
