**THE** Guardian has received a copy of the Montreal Star containing the following reference to Mrs. A. Peter:—"Mrs. Arthur Peters, wife of Premier Peters, of Prince Edward Island, is the younger daughter of the late Mr. Charles Stewart, formerly of Rosebank Farm, near Charlottetown. Mrs. Peters, who is a brilliant conversationalist, has hosts of friends and admirers in Charlottetown and throughout the province. She is much attached to her home in the suburbs of Charlottetown, and prefers its quiet comfort to social duties or public functions."  
**YESTERDAY** morning the steamer Olivette was seized by the Customs Department at the instigation of W. B. Robertson charging a violation of the Customs laws. It seems that during the morning a lad went aboard the steamer and landed with a box in which were 8,000 to 10,000 cigarettes. The duty had not been paid on these goods and the customs officer, Mrs. Sullivan made the seizure when she had some distance up the wharf. It is thought the boy had an accomplice but he refused to tell his name. The steamer was released upon Mr. Clarke the agent here paying \$400.

A MONTREAL despatch of July 28th says:—Hon. Arthur Peters, premier of P. E. Island, who arrived here to-day from London, en route for Charlottetown, announces that the representatives of the three maritime provinces, who are to meet in Quebec in September, will take up the question of modifying the British North American Act so as to conserve intact the present representation of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and P. E. Island. He claims that in the case of P. E. Island that province was admitted to confederation by a special act, and upon the understanding, if not the written facts, that her federal representation should not be lowered. If the northwest fills up, he adds, as it is sure to do, the smaller provinces will be completely swamped in the house of commons. Hon. Mr. Chamberlain's accident prevented Hon. Messrs. Murray, Tweedie and Peters discussing the question in London, as it was their first intention, but when the trio of premiers meet this fall to discuss the inland fisheries they will take up the other more important matter. They will urge a change as in the case of British Columbia and Manitoba, both of which came in upon the written stipulation that their representation in the commons would not be reduced. "Do you expect much sympathy from Ottawa?" Mr. Peters was asked, and he replied: "Hon. Mr. Fielding is with us in our effort to obtain justice, although he says that the modification of the British North American Act is a very delicate and important matter."

**CAPTAIN DANIEL McDONALD**, of the schooner Joseph McGill was drowned on Monday night in Pictou Harbor. The accident happened about ten o'clock. It appears that the McGill was lying at anchor waiting to get on the Marine Slip and the Captain was returning to the ship in a boat. He was standing up sculling and while in this position fell overboard. The mate who was on board heard the shout and went to the rescue but the unfortunate man had disappeared. Yesterday afternoon search was being made but up to a late hour the body had not been located. The schooner Joseph McGill is owned by Jas. A. Sharpe, Summerside and recently made a trip from Caolin River to Murray Harbor Railway. After discharging she went to Pictou to get on the Slip. The deceased was about 50 years of age and leaves a wife, three daughters and three sons, one son and one daughter residing in Boston. Previous to taking charge of the Schr. McGill Capt. McDonald was for some time captain of the schooner Rose Mury, owned by J. R. Larkin. He was master of the latter schooner when on an expedition gold hunting on the Labrador coast a few years ago.
