PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND

And its Attractions to Tourists.

Prince Edward Island's summer climate is delightful, and the scenery is beautiful and quietly picturesque. Surrounded by the Gulf of St. Lawrence, it enjoys all the coolness of the sea breeze, and the advantages that can only be derived from sea bathing, at about 65 degrees.

Charlottetown has over 12,000 inhabitants, and is the capital. It has many great retail stores, besides a large wholesale trade. It has a Gas Light and Power Company, two Electric Light plants, and a street railway is in embryo. It has a first class water works and sewerage system. It is famed for its wide and shaded streets, its many pleasant drives, the principal of which is the new Park Boulevard, its attractive surroundings, pure water, and clear, cool and bracing air. It is widely known as one of the healthiest cities in Canada. It has two hospitals, many churches and a large and elegant new Opera house. It also has several fine public buildings and a market which is one of the chief sources of the citizens' e. It has one of the largest and best equipped pork-packing establishments in the Dominion. On its west side is Victoria Park—a favorite summer resort—while on the east are the magnificent new Exhibition Buildings and Driving Park. Chief among its public squares is Queen Square in the centre of the city, beautifully laid out with blooming plants of every description, fountains, and well arranged walks, and enlivened with a band of music during the summer evenings. The rural scenery in the vicinity of Charlottetown is charming, and horses for driving are abundant at very low prices. Boats can also be hired, and steamers run regularly on the bays and rivers, affording most pleasant excursions. The principal hotels are Davies, Queen, and Revere.

Summerside has about 3000 inhabitants. It is situated on beautiful Bedeque Bay. It has the largest and finest departmental store in the Maritime Provinces, besides having other large retail stores. It has an Electric Light Plant, and a water works system and sewerage are being agitated for. The hotels are—Clifton, Queen, Russ, Strathcona and Campbell.

Georgetown and Souris have a population of about 1,000 each. In the former are the Aitken, and Tapper hotels and in Souris the Sea View.

At Cape Traverse, a very pleasant summer resort, is the Landsdowne hotel; in Alberton, the Albion Terrace and Wisner; in Tignish the Railway and Bellevue; in Kensington, Clark's and Commercial; in Montague, McDonald; and in Mount Stewart, Clark's and Manson's.

The following hotels open for the summer season: At Hampton, Pleasant View; at Stanhope, Mutch's and Cliff; at Brackley Point, Shaw's; at Rustico, Seaside; at Malpeque, North Shore; at Tracadie Beach, Acadia; at Alberton, Seaford; and at Pownal, Florida.

In addition to those already mentioned there are other towns and villages in the Province with hotel accommodation, while many farm houses prepare for the reception of tourists. The rivers and streams teem with trout, the bays with mackerel, while game of every description abounds.

FASTEST IN CANADA.

DETROIT, July 12.—The fastest mile thus far made this season and the fastest ever gone in Canada, was paced on the Windsor track this afternoon by Joe Patchen. The black stallion also covered his last 1-4 mile in 50 1/2 seconds, a 1 5/8 gait. The match between Patchen and John R. Gentry was a fine hard driven contest, and was won by Patchen in two straight heats by a couple of lengths in both cases. Patchen made his first mile in 2:04 1/2, a 1/2 second better than Gentry's mile at Lima, Ohio, and led all the way in both heats.

The Murderers Plea.

YOKOHAMA, July 13.—The Chinese minister in Tokio has visited the Japanese minister of foreign affairs and communicated to him what is described as "The first Peking despatch since the troubles broke out." The despatch says that the murder of the German minister and other foreigners was due to the Takue affair and to the sending of Admiral Seymour's expedition and that the Chinese government is now doing its best to protect the foreigners in Peking.
