LOST HIS LIFE, AND WHY?

The circumstances in connection with the horrible affair which has shocked the finer feelings of the people of this city are such as should cause grave reflection on the part of every citizen.

A young man leaves his home in the bloom of youthful vigor only to be struck down at the hand of a stranger, and to be taken to his home a mangled corpse.

Although the fact has not yet been revealed at the preliminary examination yet rumors are freely circulated that most of the men if not all, connected with the tragedy, were under the influence of strong drink.

Having their blood fired by alcohol, the combative and animal instincts were aroused and the death of one of the number was the result.

The law must take its course, the guilty must stand condemned, and yet is it after all the man or men who committed the deed, who should be held responsible? Is it the man who has not sufficient will power to resist the flowing bowl who should be branded as the perpetrator of this heinous crime? Or is not it rather the contemptible wretch who dealt out the liquor to these men, upon whom the hand of justice should fall? These are questions for every intelligent citizen to consider.

But this tragedy which has given rise to such a sensation in Charlottetown, a tragedy which has almost cost the life of a broken-hearted mother, and which will cause kindred hearts to bleed,—this tragedy may prove the means of awakening the public to a realization of their duty more thoroughly than could be accomplished in any other way. Our own people, residents of this Island and more especially of Charlottetown, must be aroused from their lethargy. One sacrifice has already been made. We know not what others may follow. Now it is a son of a resident of Loyalist Road. But there are sons of prominent gentlemen of this city whose conduct renders them equally liable to go down beneath this destroyer of mankind.

It seems that nothing less than one or more tragedies such as this is sufficient to arouse many of our people to action. Let each one make this affair his, or her, own personal grievance. If it had been my son, my brother, my husband, my father, whose soul had taken its flight from a murdered temple, whose body had been dissected by the surgeon's knife, what a tempest of angry resolutions would arise; what a grim determination to wipe from our fair Canada the source of all this misery, wretchedness and crime.

On Thursday the 29th of September 1898 the people of Canada will have an opportunity of pronouncing on this condition of affairs. Since the date has been fixed for the plebiscite there is no longer any reason for delay. Let everyone be up and doing. Our churches and our temperance societies should respond nobly to the battle cry and by organized effort and personal canvass endeavor to roll up such a majority as was never before gained for any cause in Canada.

Already some work has been accomplished. The really temperance forces have not been sleeping. They have delegated the provincial branch of the Dominion Alliance to undertake the task of placing temperance literature in every home in our province. And this the Alliance will make an honest effort to accomplish.

But temperance literature costs money, and in order to secure the necessary quantity a large amount of money will be required. Many of the churches and temperance societies throughout the province have expressed their willingness to aid in this work. That they should do so is not a matter of charity but one of duty, pledged and plain.

The manner of raising funds in the churches may safely be left in the

hands of P. E. Island clergymen, and our faith in the various temperance institutions fosters the belief that these also will make a prompt and generous response.

Money may be remitted, and we hope will be remitted without delay, to Mr. A. Horne, Charlottetown, president of the Provincial Temperance Alliance, or to the secretary of the Alliance, Post Office box 37, Charlottetown.

And now for one grand united effort to overthrow the forces of intemperance in our land. Let us load up the grand old gun of public opinion before which have fallen negro slavery, regal tyranny and aristocratic privilege, and applying to the touch hole the match of moral sentiment let it belch forth a canister charge of half a million votes which will sink the rum ship so deep in oblivion that only the plummet of history will ever find her.

Lived Rich Died Poor.

I knew Daniel Drew when he had \$19,000,000, and he died in debt. I knew a gentleman who at one time had \$3,000,000 in the bank, who is now earning about \$1,200 a year. The \$3,000,000 was in cash, in addition to his investments of various kinds. There are a dozen men in New York who ask me for occasional loans of from 50 cents to \$5. who when I first came to New York, were among the rich men of the town. It has been my fortune for a quarter of a century to be the counsel as a lawyer and associated in business with men whose accumulations distinguished them among their fellows as rich; it has been my experience, as I sum up through a quarter of a century of review of the lives of the thousand men who have been represented upon my ledger or in my secret counsel, that the majority of them either failed in business or died poor—Chauncey M. Depew.

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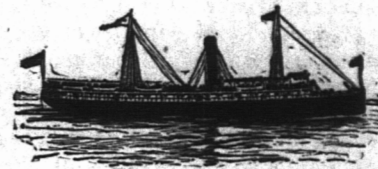
