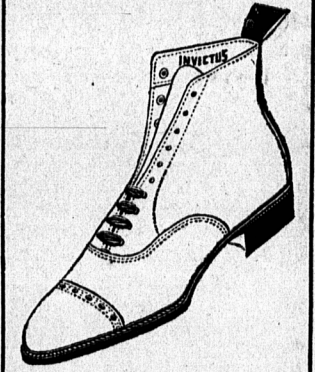

...THE SOURIS TOWN COUNCIL held a special meeting in the Town Hall on Monday night to consider the advisability of going ahead with the erection of a new town building. Mayor Brennan presided; Councillors M. A. Paquet, J. F. Sterns, J. B. Matthew, Captain D. A. McDonald and C. D. McKinnon were present, as was also Mr. C. C. Carlton, town clerk. His Worship stated that an offer had been received for the old building and lot; he felt that there would be no difficulty in securing a site for the new building as there were two or three available. After considerable discussion a committee was appointed to secure plans and estimates for the erection of the proposed building and to report at the next regular meeting.

NO BARE LEGS FOR BOSTON.
BOSTON, March 26.—Stockings were worn by the young society women at the 1915 dance carnival given at the Cort Theatre, for the benefit of the Woman's Suffrage Campaign fund.

It has never been customary to wear stockings in Greek and primitive dances but Mayor Curley, believing the bare feet and legs are shocking to public morals, ordered that stockings must be worn by dancers tonight.

Boston advocates of artistic dancing are indignant at the Mayor's latest censorship. Lilla V. Wyman, many of whose pupils appeared in the carnival, said:

"In some of the 'reviews' and 'folies' the girls of the chorus have worn short stockings and left their legs bare. That was not art, and it was not interfered with. But in Boston, the spirit of Greece must go shod!"

DESERTED FACES
COURT-MARTIAL
LONDON, Ont., March 27.—The first court-martial to be held here since troops went into training was conducted today, when Lance Corporal Forester of the 15th Battalion, was arraigned before a board of officers, headed by Lieut.-Col. Wilson on a charge of desertion. The finding and sentence of the court, which were not divulged were forwarded to the Judge Advocate General at Ottawa for ratification.

CHINA BUYS TIN IN UNITED STATES
PITTSBURG, March 27.—The government of China this week ordered \$240,000 worth of tin plate, a total of 70,000 boxes to be rolled by the American Sheet and Tin Plate Company. No statement as to the purpose of the order was made, but advices said that China would place other orders here in the near future, owing to the great difficulty of securing English or Welsh tin because of the war.

FROM FRANCE
The following letter has been received by Mr. Large, Bayfield Street, from his son, Heber R. Large, who is now in France:—
Pte Heber R. Large, No. 5705
1st Canadian Division
Signal Section,
Headquarters, 1st Inf. Bde.,
France, March 3.

Dear Dad,—Thought I would drop you a line. We have been at the front some time now, holding our own line of trenches. I was up to the trenches day ago. They are about 5 ft. high, built with sandbags, etc., and about every ten yards are dugouts, shell-proof. If the trench is shelled the men go inside. It's in one of those that our telegraph instruments run. But I am back operating at headquarters. The German trenches are from 80 to 800 yards from ours, and if a man is killed he gets it through the top of his head. Our town was shelled by them a few days ago, and 3 men killed and 14 wounded. I saw the men killed, several were gathered in a bunch watching shells fall, when one fell in among them. I see some queer things. We are quite comfortable, have lots of blankets, clothes, food, etc., and we are in a position to buy tea and coffee, so all is well. The towns are shelled quite often all round firing line. See where Bay is blockading Germany. It looks as if this racket were close soon at that rate. A few days ago a British aeroplane went up above us, and the Germans started to shell it, but it escaped them. It was a good sight. I cannot write much more, or say anything about our messmates on account of censorship, but I will write you little interesting bits often.
