It Is Dangerous To Be A Seaman.

LONDON, May 19.—The number of fatal accidents in the United Kingdom last year exceeded considerably the number of men killed in action during 1900 in South Africa. Industrial accidents, fatal and non-fatal, increase in number year by year, in spite of acts of parliament and other preventive measures. The official totals for the last five years are as follows:

The greatest number of deaths in any one industry in 1900 was, as in previous years, among seamen, of whom 1,889 were killed during the year. The total (4,823) also included 1,049 miners and 628 railway servants.

The death rate from industrial accidents in 1900 per 100,000 persons employed was 815 in the case of seamen, 137 in the case of miners, 117 in the case of railway servants. It will be seen therefore, that the mortality among seamen from accidents is six times greater than among miners, and seven times greater than among railway servants.

This comparison raises the question of the condition of seamen as compared with other occupations. It must be remembered that the number of British seamen employed is steadily decreasing, and the number of foreign seamen steadily increasing. The official returns show that the number of British persons employed in vessels and engaged in the home and foreign trades fell from 188,000 in 1890 to 174,000 in 1899. In the same period the number of foreigners employed increased from 27,000 to 36,000. In 1889 the proportion of foreigners to every 100 British subjects employed was 15. By 1899 that proportion had increased to 21.

Last year parliament passed an act for the prevention of accidents among railroad employes. The age of prohibition of boy labor underground was raised. Now the Home Secretary intends to introduce a bill in the interests of the factory population.

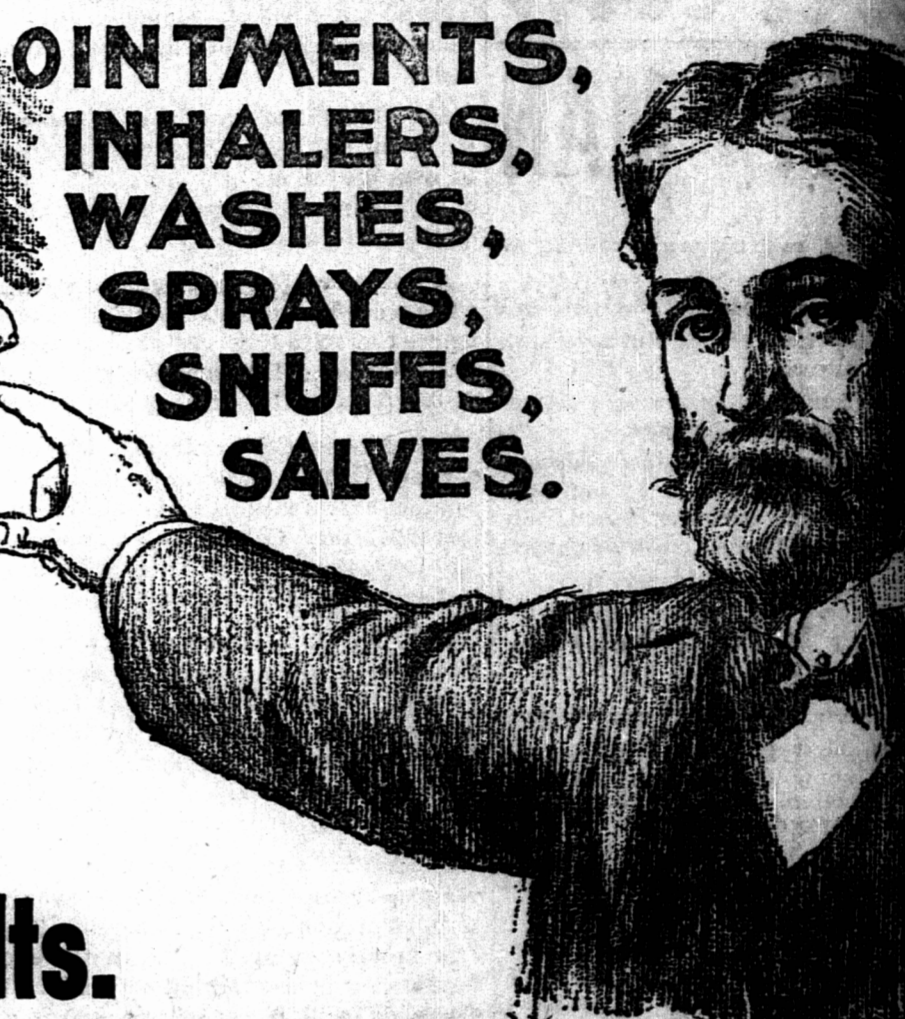
TO SET TYPE BY TELEGRAPH.

If some mid-western papers are credible a young Iowan named Frank D. Peame has invented a machine that will set type by telegraph at a thousand miles range one operator doing all the work. Several telegraph corporations are reported to be negotiating for use of the invention which may revolutionize telegraphy and effect great economies in time and money on the big dailies.

I expect to perfect my machine and use it in connection with the Mergenthaler type-setting machine says the inventor. In a short time it will be possible to send a message from New York to Chicago and put it into type without the assistance of an operator at the receiving end or a type-setter.

Four distinct parts make up the apparatus which does the sending and printing of messages. The sender is a keyboard which has electric wires connected with each key and is similar in appearance to the keyboard of any writing machine. At the receiving end are a selector an intermediate switch and the portion of the type-writer which does the printing.
