Government Policies Strongly Indorsed In Draft Address Debate

"His Honor's gracious Speech from the Throne has most concisely and convincingly set forth the Government's many services performed during the past year for the well-being of our Province and the advancement of the interest of our people and also forecast many important legislative measures for still further promoting the Provincial welfare and caring for new and unprecedented conditions arising out of the period of depression and stress through which the world in recent years has been passing and from which we are glad to note evidences of gradual recovery.

"We heartily commend the Government on what has been accomplished and also on the legislative programme now contemplated and brought before this House for consideration and approval.

Junior Clubs Encouraged "During the past few years the Department has been emphasizing work with boys and girls. Twenty-one Club Clubs were organized up until last year, with almost four hundred members. Splendid work has been done in blending and feeding live stock on an improved basis in a general community improvement. Some Science clubs for girls were also organized and this year fourteen of these clubs have been organized. Poultry Clubs have also been started and it is the intention this year to extend work in this department.

Subsidy Claims Adjustment "For many years, the claims of our Province for more generous treatment in the matter of subsidies from the Federal Government have been stressed in our Legislature. We are sure it must be a source of gratification to all P. E. Islanders to know that a joint presentation of the Maritime claims by our Maritime Premiers secured the appointment of a Royal Commission to carefully consider such claims. Our Island was fortunate in being represented on the Commission by the Honorable Chief Justice Mathieson who has given many years of intelligent and interested study and research to the claims problem. Our Province's claims were ably and exhaustively presented to the Commission, whose report has just been tabled. The majority report of the Commission recommends an additional annual subsidy of \$275,000.00 for our Province.

Chief Justice Mathieson presented a minority report claiming this and increases to other Maritime Provinces inadequate. Our Government confidently expects that when these reports are considered by the Dominion Government and further adjustments will be made a much larger Island subsidy be given Prince Edward Island, thus materially bettering the Provincial financial condition.

Agriculture Dept. Commended "The Department of Agriculture is to be congratulated on its progress in the past year. Its extensive programme of work in the past year directed its attention towards improvement in quality of farm products and the establishment of a well-balanced mixed farming programme of production. As first-class products are always sought after and command highest prices, the Department has done wisely in directing the raising of standard production. Prince Edward Island farm products have an enviable reputation in the best markets and our constant aim must be to uphold and improve until the highest standard is reached and maintained. The wisdom of mixed farming has been very forcibly brought home to us during the past few years and our Department is to be commended for stressing this and showing the farmer the profitable and profitable programme.

"During years past, Prince Edward Island was noted for its fine Island-raised horses and supplied large and discriminating horse-trading centres with numerous well-bred highest standard horses. The coming and almost universal use of auto and tractor for a time practically killed the demand and caused our farmers to discontinue raising horses for export sale. However the last few years has brought about a change and a new demand for good horses has arisen. Quick to take advantage of this new demand, our Agricultural Department has urged the raising of horses of high standard quality and in fulfilling this demand has struck evidence at our recent Exhibitions.

"Co-operating with the Dominion Departments much progress has also been attained in the breeding of hogs and sheep and also in egg and poultry production. Advanced prices in pork have materially benefited the farming communities.

Successful Short Courses "The Agricultural Department has also carried on an aggressive educational campaign through its Short Course, held in Charlottetown, where students from various districts received helpful instruction in all lines of farm activities and rural economy. Capable agricultural experts visited outlying districts explaining and demonstrating improvements in methods of farming in all its branches.

"The School Fairs have been most effectively organized and efficiently handled. The results accomplished have been an agreeably surprising revelation to the people of our Province. The co-operation of the inspectors and teachers cannot be too heartily praised for under the Department's direction their enthusiasm and untiring efforts have been responsible for the wholehearted participation of their pupils in the local and central Fairs. A visit to these Fairs shows that yearly great advancement and improvement is being made and augurs well for the future of our Island communities along lines of agriculture, school craftsmanship, art and nature study.

"The recent overworking of produce markets and consequent low prices and difficulty in marketing showed that some drastic action was necessary to remedy conditions. To meet this need our

MEETING OF THE W. C. T. U.—The regular monthly meeting of the W. C. T. U. was held in Hertz Hall, Charlottetown, on the 5th inst. The President, Miss Edith Sterns, presided, and Mrs. J. M. McLeod conducted devotional exercises. Miss Sarah Wood rendered a solo very pleasingly. The report of the Society was given by Mrs. Bennett, which was quite encouraging. After the business, Mr. John Simpson, of the Prohibition Commission, presided, and Mrs. J. M. McLeod conducted the meeting on the Temperance Situation. He gave an interesting and informing address, on the duty of the Prohibition Commission, the work of the R. C. M. P. and the proposed amendments to the Prohibition Act, and pointed out some of the difficulties encountered in the enforcement of the Act. At the close of his appreciative address, a vote of thanks, moved by Mrs. Warren, seconded by Mrs. Johnson, was extended to Mr. Simpson by the President. By appointment of the Ministerial Association, Rev. J. M. McLeod was present, and he gave the greetings of the Association to the W. C. T. U. and assured them of the sympathy and cooperation of the Association in all efforts to promote the cause of Temperance, and that the holding of the proposed Temperance meeting under serious consideration. Miss Edna Burke gave a solo very acceptably at the close. After further conference on Temperance matters, the meeting closed with the benediction by Rev. J. M. McLeod.

Experiment With New Fox Food If experiments now being carried on were successful, Prince Edward Island fox-ranchers within a short time would be using Nova Scotia fish meal as fox fodder. Dr. A. A. Beatty of the Fisheries Experimental Station, Halifax, said last night.

Fish meal had been used by one of the largest ranches on the Island for several months at the rate of a carload a fortnight and excellent results had been obtained. It was a cheaper food and had excellent fur-growing qualities. Mr. Beatty said the Nova Scotian, although enthusiastic over the new food for foxes added the scientist's customary word of caution: "Although we are entirely satisfied with the experiment thus far, we will not recommend the feed for general use until we have had an opportunity to watch the growth of pups in the late spring."

Discovery of the excellent fur growing qualities of fish meal had been made by accident when they were carrying out experiments with mice and other animals. The fur grew quickly and had an excellent lustre. Then they hit upon the idea of using the food for renard.

During the past year, as in recent former years, the fox industry has proved the financial salvation of a large percentage of our rural population and, as the returns from this industry have been distributed among our merchants, manufacturers, and other Island enterprises, the whole population has been materially benefited. The grants given by our Government have been wise investments. The Fox Shows have been the means of raising the standard of live foxes and pelts to a remarkably high degree. The Judge at the Charlottetown Fox Show, Mr. George Calbeck, stressed the noticeable improvement and standard of the competition was now so keen and the standard of excellence so high that new methods of judging and awarding points will have to be thought out and set up.

"We regret the difficulties under which our fishermen have been laboring this year. These importunate members of our Island community have worked strenuously and received very discouraging returns for their efforts. We know our Government has their interests at heart and can be depended upon to look carefully into their needs and so legislate that prosperity may come to those so deserving of it.

Progress In Education "Our Department of Education is functioning most satisfactorily. The co-operation of the Department and the Districts is shown by the largest enrolment since 1922. Teachers, parents and pupils are all striving to maintain the world-wide reputation for scholarship that has for many years been recognized as one of Prince Edward Island's most worthy assets.

"The success of the Carnegie Provincial Library Demonstration has been most marked. Our people are availing themselves in increasing number of this means of education, culture and enjoyment. The number of branches is now twenty and every branch reports an active and enlarging interest. Our Government will be well advised if the work of the future carrying on of this most helpful and worthy enterprise.

"A Province, of which the population is most largely rural and looks to agriculture for its living, should certainly see that the best of education is given along agricultural lines. That the Government plans to so revise the curriculum of Prince of Wales College that this subject shall be given the place it deserves and our young people be so educated in matters pertaining to the farm and its activities that success will be assured.

Reference was next made by Mr. MacDonald to the report on Maritime subsidy claims of the White Commission, a warm tribute being paid to Chief Justice Mathieson as the Maritime representative on the Commission, whose report showed his great interest in, and knowledge of, Maritime financial affairs. Much credit was also due to

Dental Hygiene "The zeal of the Minister of Public Health and the Government for bettering the health of our people is shown by the encouragement given in the new field of preventive dentistry which is now being introduced into our Province. This is one more tangible evidence of the Government's desire to assure our Province of the greatest possible boon, good health, by the extension of this work.

Women's Institutes "The Women's Institutes must again be congratulated on the large part they continue to play in the bettering of conditions in our rural communities. The well-kept schools, the encouraged pupils, the assisted teachers, the loyal community spirit, so noticeable in our districts, are tributes to the good work they have done and still continue to do. We are sure every member of the House joins in wishing them a most successful year. The fact of the meeting of the biennial convention of the Federated Institutes being held here this year should be a great stimulus to the activities of 1935.

Highways and Bridges "The Government has again carried on an effective programme of public works. The highways have been kept in good condition and bridges given necessary attention. The travelling public have been taken care of and the movement of produce made most convenient. The Government is to be commended for its decision to carry on the Trans-Canada Highway project. This will provide employment for many of our people and also be a valuable asset to our Province. We trust the experiment with low cost pavement will mean a great saving in our road work and also permit extension of same.

Improvements at Falconwood "The Government is deserving of praise for the handling of the Falconwood situation under trying circumstances and in spite of great inconveniences. The two new units completed are functioning most satisfactorily but the need of originally-planned-for third unit will be very acute. We trust the time will not be too long delayed when this shall be an accomplished fact and the work permitted to go on as efficiently and helpfully as all desire that it should.

"While speaking on Falconwood, we are reminded of recent passing of Dr. Victor L. Goodwill, who for twenty-five years was head of this institution. Dr. Goodwill did a wonderful work in this capacity and endeared himself to the whole Island. We are confident the whole House mourns his loss and sympathizes with his widow in her sad bereavement.

"Our Provincial Building so long a prized historic landmark of our City, has during a recent survey been shown to be in need of ex-

clusive repairs. This is no surprise when one considers its age. The Government's plans to make the necessary repairs will, we feel sure, be approved by all. The building is a noble historic heritage and it is our duty to pass it on in fitting state of repair to future generations.
