And while the league has been changing so has the game changed radically. Ice zoning, forward passing, etc. all being adopted and the changes have materially speeded up the game and lent considerable aid in attracting the huge crowds that now attend.

The war has brought many difficulties to the league but despite these obstacles the league continues to carry on. It has the approval of both the United States and Canadian governments and it certainly is providing entertainments for millions of fans in these days of stress.

Jackson Gives Bruins 7-6 Victory Over Maple Leafs

BOSTON, Nov. 22 (CP)—With little Art Jackson performing the hat trick with three goals, Boston Bruins gained a 7-6 victory over the Toronto Maple Leafs tonight at Boston Garden in a National Hockey League game played before 11,500 fans.

After getting off to a two-goal start early in the opening period, the Bruins lost the lead twice before Busher Jackson, Art's older brother, blasted the Bruins' winning tally through goalie Turk Brodie with less than three minutes to play.

Canadiens Snap Losing Streak By Rallying To Tie Black Hawks 3-3

CHICAGO, Nov. 22 (CP)—Montreal Canadiens snapped a four-game losing streak tonight with a rousing third-period drive that gave them three goals and a 3-3 tie with Chicago Black Hawks in a National Hockey League game witnessed by a crowd of 14,564.

Two of the goals came from the stick of Gordie Drillon with Ray Stelfitts getting the one that knotted the count. No overtime was played, on conformity with a new N.H.L. ruling.

For two periods, Canadiens were completely baffled by the tightly-knit Hawk defense built around net-minder Bert Gardiner. It was at 6:05 of the third that Drillon found the range when he fired in a corner shot with Sweeney O'Connor and Toe Bluke assisting. Less than four minutes later, he shot about the goal, with Bluke and Tony Graboski on the play.

Throng Of 13,940 Watch Toronto Squad Give Sparkling Display Saturday

TORONTO, Nov. 22 (CP)—Toronto Maple Leafs were out of this world Saturday, thronged by a wildly approving throng of 13,940 at Maple Leaf Gardens, to defeat Montreal Canadiens 2-0 and assume undisputed overnight command of the National Hockey League. One of the down beats they were coming strongly, cruising through loose-knit Montreal defenses for four goals in the final 23 minutes.

The Stanley Cup champions accumulated 22 scoring points over the route and were full value for the victory, although they were fired only eight less shots at Walter (Turk) Brodie in the Toronto net than youthful Paul Bibeault handled for the Habitués. Every Leaf player except Hank Goldup and Thomson profited in the scoring jag and the only forwards who scored goals were Jack McClellan and Billy Taylor.

Grant (Knobby) Warwick and Jimmy Orlando, the Detroit "bad man" started a scrap there.
