The Red Cross

(Continued)

At the close of the Great War an entirely new departure was made in the work of the Red Cross. From the beginning it has been purely an auxiliary to the army medical service. In the recruiting for the war it was found that a substantial number of men called up for military service and it was felt that something should be done to improve the physical condition of the population. It was therefore agreed that the magnificent Red Cross organization which had rendered such tremendous service in the war should be continued in time of peace for the purpose of "the improvement of health, the prevention of disease and the mitigation of suffering throughout the world." The words of the formula are almost identical with those of a resolution which had been adopted by the Canadian Red Cross Society some years before.

The covenant of the League of Nations the several governments bound themselves to promote the formation of voluntary Red Cross Societies in their respective countries having the objectives above stated.

National Red Cross Societies now exist in over fifty countries. These are all members of a League of Red Cross Societies whose headquarters were established at Geneva in 1919 and were removed to Paris in 1922. The League maintains intimate and friendly relations with the International Red Cross Committee and each sends to conferences of the other a duly accredited delegate. The work of the International Committee is chiefly related to Red Cross service in war and that of the League to the Red Cross peace-time programme.

Dunant's plan was to provide unofficial assistance to the army medical services in time of war but these were later developed to such a high pitch of proficiency that non-military assistance in the field has proved to be necessary, and the work of the Red Cross in war time has come to be confined to the home front. We can recall the immense activities of the Canadian Red Cross during the great war and the Societies in other nations carried on similar work. This consisted largely in financing field hospitals and equipment and forwarding medical supplies and in sending comforts to the soldiers. During the war the International Committee maintained a magnificent service in assisting prisoners of war, tracing missing men, etc. The staff at the headquarters in Switzerland numbered about two thousand; and over thirty different countries applied for their services and the enquiries dealt with were recorded on over five million cards. Over £715,000 in cash were distributed to prisoners and 500 internment camps were regularly visited.

After the war came the great task of repatriating the prisoners. Convoys were organized and the health of prisoners cared for under the auspices of the Red Cross. Then there were the relief activities in Austria and Hungary and in 1921 the immense organization of famine relief in Russia under Dr. Nansen, over £800,000 being expended.

A great number of different lines of work have been carried on by the Red Cross in its peace-time programme, and great advance has been made in the improvement of health and to prevention of disease. The Junior Red Cross is now organized in 52 countries with a membership of over 17,000,000. The object of this great movement is to train the children in health habits and to cultivate on their part the spirit of unselfish service to others. Incidentally they are trained in the duties of citizenship and taught to further the ideals of "international good will."

Fishermens Union Organized at Lot 7

A large number of fishermen from Cape Wolfe, West Cape, Lot 7, Campbellton, and O'Leary were present on Friday evening, May 21 in Lot 7 Hall to organize a local station of the P. E. I. Fishermen's Union. Mr. W. T. Reilly was appointed chairman and Mr. Frank B. O'Halloran acted as chairman at the meeting. Speeches on this occasion were made by prominent visitors and local fishermen.

Hon. W. H. Dennis, Minister of Agriculture, explained that he was acting in the place of Hon. B. W. LePage, chairman of the Fishermen's Loan Board, and informed the meeting that for the purpose of the loan, it would be strongly advised to organize and to take advantage of the provisions of the Fishermen's Union Act.

Mr. W. H. Acorn, M. L. A., gave in brief detail the nature of the Fishermen's Loans and for what purpose they were distributed and also urged the members of the Fishermen's Union to be organized and to take advantage of the provisions of the Fishermen's Union Act.

Mr. Aeneas Gallant, M. L. A. gave a short address and referred to some abuses of the loan privileges and gave warning that any false representations made by applicants for loans would be severely dealt with.

Mr. C. P. McCarthy, Tignish, acting secretary and organizer of the Fishermen's Union of P. E. I. set forth fully the objects for which the Union was formed and gave specific examples of the benefits derived therefrom. He assured the fishermen present that if they formed a union and entered into its activities in the proper spirit there would be no doubt of the success of the undertaking. After some further discussion on in which Hon. Mr. Dennis and Mr. Acorn took part it was unanimously decided to form a union to be known as Station No. 18 Fishermen's Union of P. E. I.

Officers elected were as follows: President, Mr. Frank B. O'Halloran; Vice President, Mr. Fulton Cook; Sec'y-Treas., Mr. Bernard Reilly; Executive Committee: Messrs. W. T. Reilly, James Monaghan, Victor Cook and Eldridge Cousins.

A vote of thanks was extended to the speakers, which was fully acknowledged. The new organization will take immediate steps to prepare for outfitting on an extended scale, and fishermen are hopeful that they will have a successful season.—S

Would Modify Ottawa Pact

LONDON, May 25—(CP)—Modification of the Ottawa Agreement to make way for an Anglo-American trade treaty was advocated in the House of Commons today by Graiaun White, Liberal.

"If there is failure to arrive at a satisfactory arrangement for an expansion of trade which the United States is so anxious to bring about," White declared, "she will inevitably be driven back to isolation and the consequences to this country and the world would be most serious."

"Now is the time for cooperation with America. It is clear there must be some modification of the principles of the Ottawa Agreement."

Recovery Triumph For Capital System

NEW YORK, May 25—(AP)—Alexander Dana Noyes, dean of New York financial news commentators and financial editor of the New York Times, said today the sound working of the capital system had brought recovery.

Addressing the New York financial advertisers at the lawyers club Noyes said perhaps it is best that "the old Wall Street" should have gone.

"The Wall Street methods and practices of 10, 20 or 30 years ago, even those of 1929, could not in any case have returned," he said.

Stating the financial upheaval caused by the Great War brought a chain of inevitable expectations in its wake, he said "the spirit of hostility to wealth which has been displayed in many of them was unfortunate."
