The Guardian's valued eastern correspondent writes from Red Point that there was no fishing in these waters for some time.

Two of our veteran fishermen, John Robertson and Seth McLean set traps off Basin Head recently for codfish, but could do nothing on account of sharks, as they ate the fish, cut the trawls and destroyed the gear.

They catch a shark occasionally, but he is an ugly customer to handle and of no value when secured.

Two beam-trawlers, whose headquarters are, I think, at Little Canseau, N. S. have been operating in these waters for some time off West River and Red Point from 24 to 7 miles off shore fishing Sunday as well as Monday.

What effect they will have on our fisheries is uncertain, but the fishermen are of the opinion that if they increase as probably they will, they will do for our cod fisheries what the purse-seine has done our mackerel—destroy them.

They are certainly destructive of all fish life as dragging an immense open-mouthed bag over the bed of the ocean, they take in their trawls all kinds of ground fish, as well as marketable kinds, and the unsalable ones are dumped overboard to rot on the bottom of the ocean.

CAN MAKE IT IN TEN MINUTES.

This recipe for mayonnaise dressing may be made in ten minutes and is equal to if not better than the sauce made in the slow, tiresome fashion of old. Place in a bowl the yolk of one egg, a small pinch of cayenne, a small pinch of mustard, a half teaspoonful of salt, a teaspoonful of vinegar. Pour in two or three tablespoonfuls of oil (don't measure it, just pour from the can) and begin to beat it with an egg beater.

As the mayonnaise begins to thicken pour in more oil and keep on beating and pouring more oil until very thick. Thin with a little lemon juice. Then use more oil, always pouring in two or three tablespoonfuls or more at a time and more lemon juice until you have the quantity of dressing required.

A half pint of the dressing may be made with one egg yolk and the juice of half a lemon. It is not necessary to measure the oil.

When ready to use then with more lemon juice or whipped cream.

BANANA FRITTERS.

Mash 4 bananas to a pulp, add 2 eggs well beaten, 2 cups sifted bread flour, 2 teaspoons yeast powder, teaspoon salt, about 2 cups sweet milk or enough to make a drop batter. Beat until well mixed. Have the fat heated as for doughnuts, so batter will rise to top at once. Dip a clean spoon in fat and use it to shape the fritters. Do not make too large. Fry until well browned. Drain on brown paper. To be eaten while warm. Serve with maple syrup.

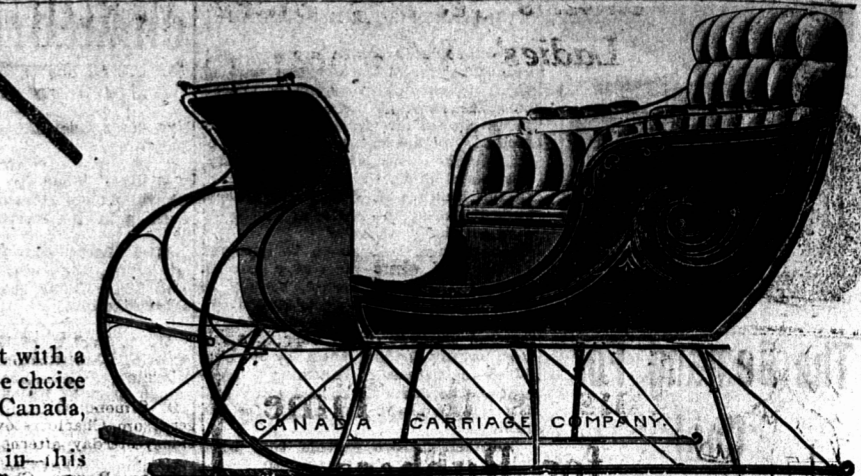

END OF OLDEST NEWSPAPER

WORTH KNOWING.

The President of the Chinese Republic, Yuan Shih-kai, recently suppressed the newspaper King-Bao, which undoubtedly was the oldest paper in the world. For 1,600 years it has reported the more important news not only of China, but also of foreign countries.

At a time when the art of printing and journalism were as yet unknown in Europe, the Chinese Gong-Chung invented a means for making types from lead and silver, and in the year, 400 A. D. the paper King-Bao was printed, and has since been issued regularly until recently.

The first edition was printed on ten sheets of yellow silk, and together with the King-Bao, all the high officials of the Chinese Empire—Scientific American.

Slightly soiled ribbons, if well powdered with French chalk or magnesia and held over the heat from a stove for a few minutes, will quickly shed any grease or soil. They should be carefully pressed after the powder and soil have been brushed off.

Smoke from a lamp or gas often spoils a ceiling in one particular spot, while the rest remains beautifully white. It is useful to know that soiled ceilings caused by lamp and gas will be rendered less conspicuous if rubbed over with dry whiting.

To make an ordinary candle serve as an all-night lamp, pack finely powdered salt around the wick as far up as the blackened parts. In this way a mild, steady light may be obtained all night from even a small piece of candle.

Celery and lettuce may be kept fresh by standing the roots in cold water and throwing over them a damp cloth or dry manilla paper. They should, before using, be washed thoroughly, soaked in ice water and dried on a towel.
