

Track Record Broken At Summerside

Squire Hanover Goes Mile In 2.11 As Harness Racing Season Opens In Province

Summerside came into its own again as a racing centre yesterday afternoon when 2,000 people crowded into the re-built race track and watched with the greatest interest the 12 events on the program.

Summerside track was the oldest active one on the Island when it ceased holding races three years ago. Taken over by Captain Sampson Grady, it was partially re-built when a bad accident laid up the grand old horseman proprietor, Willard McDonald, a great racing fan, acquired the property this spring and by hard work and considerable cash outlay had it ready for the work on the anniversary of Canada's birthday. Many were the complimentary remarks made regarding the lay-out and the really good job done by Mr. McDonald in such a short time.

The track itself promises to be one of the fastest in the Maritimes for, although only in use a short time the footing is so good that Squire Hanover trotted first in heat in 2:11 3/4 and then back in 2:11. The former track trotting record was 2:14 made by Lusty Frisco in 1936 and the same year at the same meeting Hanover Courier set up a pacing record of 2:12.

The races were on the dash system yesterday with the horses classified for four events of three dashes each, with positions drawn for every heat. Each dash was a race with a purse of \$100 to be divided among the winners.

The aggregate race for was \$1200. At 2 o'clock the track was packed and also the paddock and front. Large crowds of people were also on centre field and adjoining the stand. It was, without doubt, the biggest crowd to attend a race meet in Summerside in many years. The West Kent School Band was in attendance and played enjoyable music.

Shortly after two o'clock starter Rankine MacLaine of Charlottetown, making his debut as a starter and acquitting himself in a very satisfactory manner, called the first event—the No. 1 Classified Pace.

First Dash: They got away with very little scoring, the race centering in a close contest between Albert E. Grattan, Charlotte B. and Uscita Britton, with Uscita Britton starting fast at the finish to win. Charlotte B., driven by Owen Hennessey, second, pacing the best heat since she came to the Maritimes. Albert E. Grattan a close third, Bonnie Scott fourth, Bedford Grattan fifth. Time 2:13 1/4.

Ten-to-Ace Finishes Last In Canadian Derby Run At Winnipeg Yesterday

WINNIPEG, July 1 (CP)—Ten-to-Ace, regarded as Canada's outstanding racehorse, finished last in the six-horse field in the \$8,000 Canadian Derby here today with Maginot Line, owned by Dr. L. H. Appleby of Vancouver, B.C., sweeping home first in the great upset in Canadian racing history.

Western racing experts along with race track officials were so positive ten-to-Ace would win away with the Derby that one made the race, feature event at Polo Park before a holiday crowd of almost 17,000 fans, a "no betting" affair.

Red Sox Win 12th In A Row Sweeping Twin Bill From Washington

NEW YORK, July 1 (AP)—A night of exciting and timely hitting enabled the Red Sox at Boston to extend their current winning streak to 12 games today by sweeping their second doubleheader in as many days from Washington Senators, 7-2 and 7-1, before a paying crowd of 10,533 fans including many Ted Williams backers.

The Senators collected all five of their first-inning hits against starter Ken Clegg, and, with a 2-1 lead, appeared to be getting set for him when Yank Terry was ruffled into service in the sixth inning. Terry pitched a 9-inning ball for the remainder of the game and the Soxers won it for him in the seventh with singles by Dom D'Maggio and Lou Finney and Johnny Pesky sacrifice batted the winning tally against Bobo Newsom.

Joe Dohson re-established himself as a starting pitcher by holding the Senators to five hits in the nightcap.

Indians Scalp Chisox

At Chicago, the first seven Cleveland batters that faced Orval Grove, Chicago White Sox first-inning batter, in the first inning scored to give Al Smith more than the margin of victory, 7-2. It was the Indians' third straight triumph in the series.

Jack Wade, veteran outfielder picked up by the Chicagoans as a free agent a month ago, made his first extensive appearance in replacing Grove before a man had been retired in the first inning. He held the Indians to three hits while accomplishing 27 outs, with no runs charged against him. Previously he had made only two for the White Sox at Boston.

The second event on the program was the No. 2 Classified Trot with five good trotters including the Maritime champion and record holding stallion Watchim, 2:07. Good as all the trotters were—Squire Hanover was clearly in the best form of his career. Word had leaked out that he had been going great guns over driver Semple's track but few expected that he would head Watchim, Millie Kalmuck or Paul Abbe. Hanover Courier got away to a good start and was never headed, not being asked in the least. Millie Kalmuck got away last and made up a lot of ground. Watchim was unsteady, showing great flashes of speed, almost closing up with the leaders then making breaks; Paul Abbe getting away well but making cogly breaks; Playdale steady but minus a brush, finishes third, just ahead of Paul Abbe. Time 2:11 3/4 setting up a new track trotting record.

Second Dash: Squire Hanover was again unsteady, although Millie Kalmuck made a good try in the stretch and driver Semple had to shake the Squire up to shake it off; Watchim looked like a winner down to the first half but unsteadiness at critical times placed him third; two lengths back of the winner; Playdale fourth, Paul Abbe fifth. Time 2:11 a new record.

Third Dash: This could have been won by either Millie Kalmuck, Squire Hanover or Watchim down to the first half, then Watchim made a break which put him out of the race. Hanover kept in the lead all the way round the second half but Millie tucked in behind. When they straightened in the stretch a battle royal ensued to the wire, Millie winning by a short neck. Watchim heading Paul Abbe and Playdale. Time 2:14.

No. 3 Classified Pace

First Dash: This looked like a sure thing for Lady Hal but turned out differently. Jack Clyde took the rail shortly after the word "go" and never surrendered it, his driver using his head and saving energy for the final challenge in which he headed Lady Hal who had to go a long mile to get through. Wait N' See showed up well in this heat heading Hilda Budlong slightly, Singin' Sam a good fifth and Grace Abbe sixth. Time 2:18.
