Not Recognized As World Champions

PARIS, June 9.—(The International Boxing Union at a meeting today decided that henceforth championship matches shall be for 15 rounds, instead of 20 rounds as had been demanded.

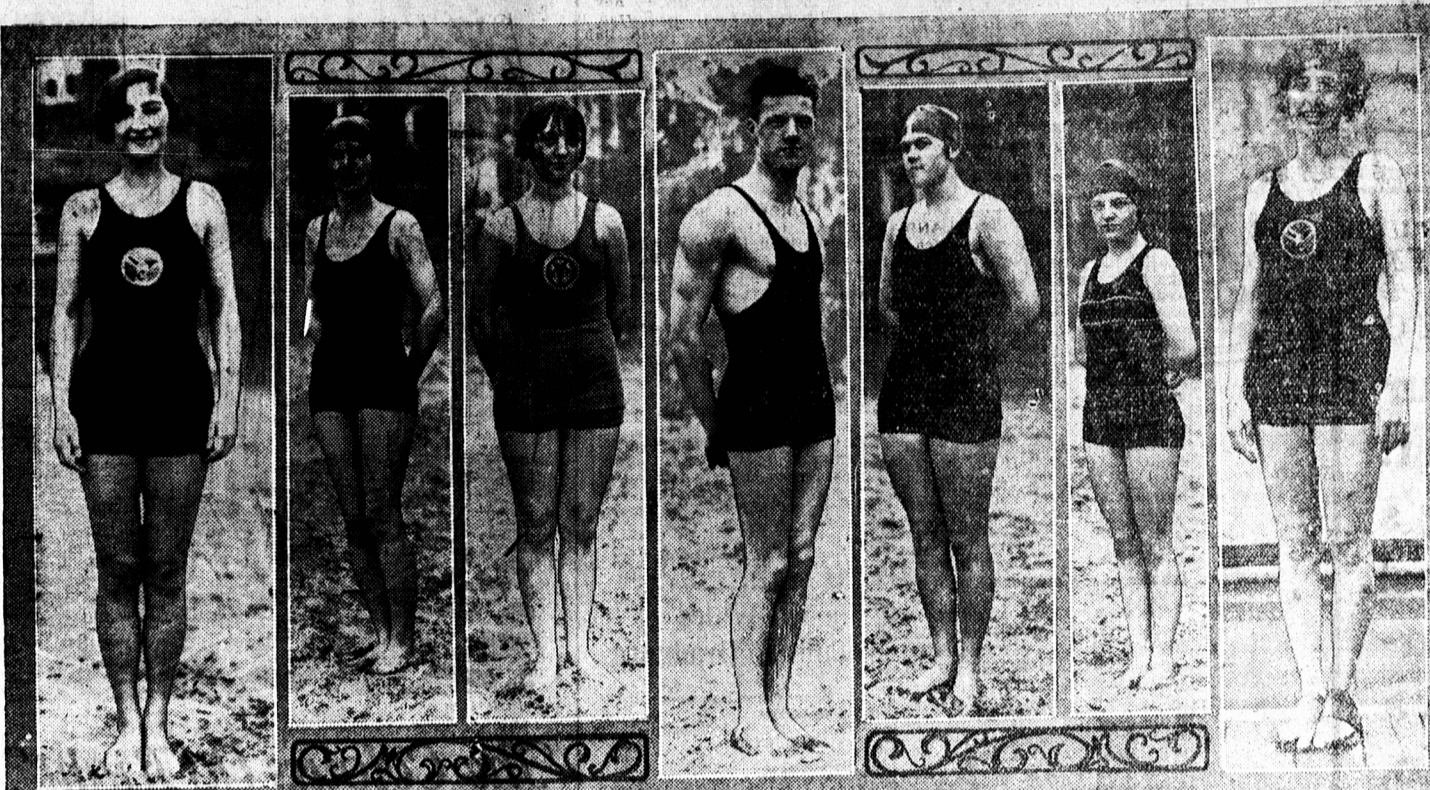
The union ruled that as the European champions have had no opportunity to meet the American Champions in the lightweight, welterweight and light-heavyweight classes it will not recognize these Americans as world champions. It recognized, however, the world titles of Pancho Villa, flyweight; Phil Rosenberg, bantamweight; Kid Kaplan, featherweight; Harry Greb, middleweight; and Jack Dempsey, heavyweight.

WORLD'S SWIMMING CHAMPIONS GIVE EXHIBITIONS IN CANADA



Local swimmers had a look at some world-beaters, when Ethel Lackie and Sybil Bauer visited Toronto last week. Miss Lackie is the fastest lady swimmer in the world, and is credited with fifteen world's records from 50 yards upwards. Miss Bauer is the holder of the ladies' back stroke record, and once surpassed the men's time for 100 metres, lowering the world's record by 4 seconds. Miss Bauer's record, however, has since been lowered by a German swimmer. Reading from left to right: Ethel Lackie, world's champion short distance swimmer; Flora Martin, Assistant Secretary, T.L.S.C. and promising local swimmer; Helen McCormick, H.P.S.C., another one of the young school who promises well; Tommy Walker, a Canadian record holder over several distances, including the back-stroke championship; Alice Hardy, another brilliant local swimmer, who promises to be a title holder in the near future; Jean Kilpatrick, a young woman who is prominent in local contests; and Sybil Bauer, the only woman to defeat a world's record established by a man.
