OTTAWA, July 9.—The Dominion Government is arranging through the Department of Marine and Fisheries

for a ten thousand dollar exhibit of food fish at Toronto exhibition. The exhibit will be the first of the kind ever attempted in Canada and will be of great educational value. Arrangements for the display are now being completed. A large number of leading fish companies will contribute toward the exhibit. The display will include live fish in tanks, cured fish, fresh fish in cold storage and mounted specimens of rare varieties.

Andrew Halkett, Curator of the Fishery Museum, Ottawa, will be in charge. The exhibit will consist principally of commercial fish representing the fisheries of the Atlantic, Pacific and great inland waters. A cold storage refrigerator with a capacity of six tons will be installed for storage, the fish being visible from the outside by glass doors. Special means will be adopted for diffusing information regarding fish by lectures and distribution of literature and by giving visitors samples of fish to eat. There will be a kitchen in connection, with display by

an expert chef who will fry the fish which will be served hot free.

SYDNEY, July 9.—Col. Sam. Hughes and General Sir Ian Hamilton arrived here after completing their tour of inspection across the continent. The visitors were met at the depot by the local civil, military and judicial authorities and taken for a tour of the principal points of interest in the city.

Col. Hughes examined the armory and equipment at Victoria Park and expressed himself as pleased with the showing made by the men. The need for a new Armory was pointed out and Col. Hughes promised one would be built in the near future.

BOSTON, July 8.—The threatened strike of the street car men on the system of the Boston Elevated Railway Company was averted late today when an agreement was reached between representatives of the company and the Union on a method of arbitration.

By the agreement James L. Richards, for the company, and James S. Vahey, counsel for the union were delegated to select a third arbitrator to act with two others, one being named by each party to the dispute. The men ask an increase of wages, and improved working conditions and the company offered a compromise. The Union claims control of 7,000 out of 8,200 employees of the road who had voted overwhelmingly in favor of a strike when the committee of the Chamber of Commerce brought the parties together today.

EDMONTON, Alta., July 7.—John Merrigan, who will appear before the District Court on Monday next to answer to the charge of receiving four stolen foxes which were found on his ranch, after they were taken from Lee's fox house, is no other than the man who risked his life with a friend at the time Captain Holmes was rescued from a wrecked ship at Wolf Point, Prince Edward Island in 1903. This information has been received here by Harry Robertson, the lawyer who is appearing for Merrigan at the trial. At the time of the wreck Captain Holmes and six of his men were in danger of their lives for nearly twenty-four hours. They were wrecked one evening during a heavy snow storm and gales. At nine o'clock next morning Merrigan embarked in a rowboat which had to be skidded over the ice for some distance and rowed to the doomed vessel until four o'clock in the afternoon. They battled with the waves and finally brought all the men safely to shore. At that time the newspapers made much of the heroic feat and Merrigan was presented with a purse of gold for his bravery.

OTTAWA, July 7.—In connection

with the recent examination of candidates for entrance to the Royal Military College, 1913, it is announced that although there are only 4 places vacant at the Royal Military College for students entering next September in view of the near completion of the new dormitory it has been decided to admit the full list there being only a few over the number thus affected. The Minister deems it unfair under the circumstances not to admit all who pass. Thus a total of fifty who passed the exams, out of 120 who tried will be admitted to college upon opening in September.

JOHANNESBURG, July 6.—A strike which involved practically all miners in the Rand has broken out. Anarchy reigned and there is much bloodshed. Already the casualties are estimated at more than a hundred. The authorities have been compelled to declare martial law. During several hours today troops raked the streets with rifle fire. Negotiations for a settlement of the serious situations are going on and several hours have been spent in session. A most serious clash took place between the troops and police and mobs of workmen. Early in the afternoon crowds gathered in front of the Rand Club and commenced to stone it. They disregarded orders to disperse and the troops fired with fatal effect. Another mob was dispersed by the dragoons who charged repeatedly. The ambulance gathered to take away the dead and in a short time a small area lay sixty dead and wounded. Fighting in other quarters of the city swelled the list and are believed to be over a hundred.

largest is \$51,000 for Buildings at the Ontario Agricultural College. Next comes a grant of \$10,000 to encourage agriculture in the public schools, partly by grant, partly by helping teachers to attend courses or instruction. Stock and seed judging course get \$7,500; women's Institute work gets \$6,500; fall fair and field crop judging courses get \$5,300. A similar sum goes to educational work in connection with the marketing of farm products organizing co-operative societies etc. For drainage work there is a grant of \$5,000; another grant \$5,000 for the purpose of getting more land for the Ontario Veterinary College and a number of smaller grants.

The feature of Saturday's work at the annual camp of the P.E.I. Militia Force on the Exhibition Grounds was the inspection of the Charlottetown Light Horse. The inspecting officer was Colonel Nelles of the Canadian Royal Dragoons, who arrived from Toronto on Friday night. The inspection took place in the morning on the broad common north of the Exhibition grounds. There the Light Horse, under their commander, Major Ings, assumed squadron formation and were exercised in squadron drill. Colonel Nelles, with his staff-sergeant and orderly, looking on from the favorable position afforded by a slight eminence. Though they had had only three days' training the troopers acquitted themselves creditably. Afterwards they were inspected in outpost duty and at work as mounted infantry, when they put in some interesting skirmishing practice. Following this they threw a line of observation and in these practical manoeuvres performed as creditably as in the ceremonial movements.

After dinner, Colonel Nelles inspected the saddlery and stables of the Troop, and this completed the inspection. It is understood that he expressed his satisfaction with the efficiency of the Force. Colonel Nelles will probably be leaving Charlottetown this morning. As to the other units in camp Saturday, the R. A. M. C. were engaged in routine work, while as to the 32nd Regiment, besides musketry exercises, they were marched down to Victoria Park, where they were put through out-post duties. They marched through the city on their way to the Park, and as they were accompanied by their Band, attracted a good deal of attention.

The Signalling Corps put in some useful work during the day with the heliographs. For this purpose signalling stations were established at Rocky Point, South Port and Victoria Park. The nice sunny weather was very favorable to the use of the heliographs. It is now definitely known that the Minister of Militia, Hon. Col. Sam. Hughes, and General Sir Ian Hamilton, Inspector of the Overseas Forces, will visit the Island. They were due to leave Ottawa yesterday and are expected to arrive here to-morrow. Sir Ian Hamilton is being accompanied by a staff comprising a general official and a major, whose names are not yet known here.
