"Failure" Smiles Proudly Watching Busy Harbor Once Called Wild Dream

Thomas Harling Sees Churchill Docks Active. Expects The Whole West To Benefit.

CHURCHILL, Man., Sept. 6.—A bright-eyed, ruddy-faced man with a white moustache, smartly trimmed, and so, matching the smart tailor-made clothes of St. James street cut, stood on the quayside.

The S. S. Pennyworth, of Newcastle, recently arrived from Antwerp, and the ports of the British Isles, had warped in to discharge cargo, and load flour and feed and No. 1 hard wheat from the prairies.

On the horizon, faint against the long twilight of the land of the Midnight Sun, was a smear of smoke, left in the wake of the S. S. Sierentz, French tramp bound for La Have, with 280,013 bushels of hard wheat, the finest shipment that ever left the prairies.

The man who stood alone, contemplating the scene, was Thomas Harling, senior member of Thomas Harling and Sons, shipping agents.

He has been called a traitor in Quebec, and a friend in Saskatchewan and Manitoba. But many like to think of him as a shrewd business man, who saw the opportunities of Churchill a jump ahead of the St. Lawrence shipping men.

"When I started in the shipping business in Montreal years ago," they told me I couldn't make it go," said Mr. Harling as he started talking of the past and future of traffic lines.

He came to P. E. I. in 1926 from Bermuda, where he had held a pastorate. He was born in Newfoundland, was a graduate of Mount Allison and of an American university. He spent five years in Kensington, and several months in Montague.

His family includes Miss Ella Saint, R.N., formerly Superintendent of the Prince County Hospital. Mr. Jack Saint, salesman, Miss Dorothy Saint, R.N., a graduate of Falconwood Hospital, and several younger children.

The funeral takes place on Thursday afternoon burial being in Amherst. Members of the United Church Presbytery of Prince Edward Island will be in attendance.

British Tariff Is Worth More Than Ten P.C.

Millions Of Mice Devour Crops In Australia

ADELAIDE, Australia, Sept. 6.—Almost unbelievable stories are coming from the West coast districts which at present are being devastated by the worst mouse plague in history.

Some stories told, which are vouched for, read like chapters from Baron Munchausen's fables. In one farmhouse the mice ate the corn out of a bottle of strychnine and then devoured the contents, resulting in a large death toll.

At another place the haystacks were built on a raised platform which was rendered mouseproof by iron caps on top of the posts. At night it is almost impossible to see the ground around the stacks for a moving mass of rodents, which inches deep near the platform.

When pastry is being rolled out for cooking one person has to stand by knocking the mice away while the cook works fast. A farmer who left his hat on a table for a few minutes found that the brim had been eaten off it.

At Koombilla one farmer killed 35,000 mice in a night, but made no visible impression.
