

Famous Flyers For Air Pageant Wednesday Aug 31

Management Of Upton Air Meet Determined To Put On A Show Equal To Anything Of Its Kind Ever Attempted In Canada.

The management of the great Air Meet to be held at Upton Airport Wednesday, August 31st received wire yesterday afternoon closing contract with the celebrated Levens Brothers Flying Circus of Toronto with a personnel of seven and four outstanding aircraft, a speaking announcing car, a parachute jumper, high-speed motorcycle for dispatch flying, signalling and control of ships approaching and on the ground. The Levens Flying Circus was performed from the Pacific coast east but this is the first time they have appeared this side of Montreal. They have put on complete Air Shows in hundreds of towns in Canada and thrilled thousands of people and return each year to duplicate their performance of the past year. Among their personnel is the celebrated crazy "Hump" Madden of British Columbia. "Hump" thrills the audience with upside-down flying, stalls, turns, death cheating spins and awe inspiring loops. They also have the only Autogiro passenger carrying plane in Canada. Among the other ships is the celebrated Waco and the trim and attractive popular American built ship the Eagle-Rock. Levens Brothers show while a feature of the Upton Air Meet is a small part of the show and several greater thrills will be performed by the "flying Frenchman" and the Belgian ace.

One of the first flyers to be engaged was the celebrated Belgian ace, Achiel Vanhee who will appear in a plane new in this country, the Mohawk-Pluto, a low winged monoplane and Joe Blondeau, "the flying Frenchman" in a Curtis-Robin Challenger.

These are only a very few of the aeroplanes coming and there are even greater surprises in store for those who attend.

The Rovers, champions of the City League five times in the last eight years, are tottering on their throne. Last night the up and coming Stars trounced the North Enders by the score of 6-1 in an abbreviated game, the number agreed upon. This was the first tussle of the best three out of five games for the current championship. The Rovers were not as polished as usual, but there are other games coming in which to flash their former smooth play. The secret of the Star victory lay in the strong left arm of "Big" George Ayers, who allowed but three hits, while striking out eight. His support was good, but one error being committed behind him.

The sun appeared from behind the clouds to cheer both players and spectators, as the game got away to late start. The Rover first inning was fruitless, but the Stars used their's to such advantage that the North Enders never quite caught up, scoring twice. Squarebriggs lead off with a hit to start the frame. Conference Comment

(Canadian Press)
QUEBEC, Aug. 22—"It would be difficult to estimate the very great importance of the example of cooperation which British nations have given the world," said Mgr. J. M. Rodrigue Villeneuve, Archbishop of Quebec, commenting on the Imperial Economic Conference.

"As one eminent speaker said during the plenary session which revealed the extent of success attained, the various states represented at the conference grasped the importance of sacrificing individual wishes for the common good," continued the Archbishop. "Better is the triumph of British nations as a whole than individual prosperity for one unit alone. Without resorting to blind optimism, it is easy to realize that the conference was a step in the direction given the world by His Holiness the Pope, namely re-establishment of universal equilibrium. And for that we should thank God."

TORONTO, Aug. 22—Criticism of Canada's action in signing a trade

India
BOMBAY, India, Aug. 22—Practical results at Ottawa have far exceeded expectations, says the Times of India in an editorial today on the work of the Imperial Conference.

The proposed United Kingdom duties merely complete the United Kingdom tariff system, argues the Times, making it all embracing like other national tariffs.

A conflicting view was expressed by G. D. Birla, prominent business man, formerly a member of the Round Table Conference and an ex-president of the Federation of Indian Chambers of Commerce. He declares the advantages to India derived from the new agreement with the United Kingdom are far outweighed by the disadvantages.

European Newspapers
LONDON, Aug. 22—Dogmatic and contradictory views of the work accomplished by the Imperial Eco-

nomic Conference are expressed by European newspapers today.

The United Kingdom has made a poor bargain in the eyes of the German newspapers, some of whom feature "England's open hand," recounting that the Mother Country "gave presents to the Dominions for an uncertain return."

The majority of French newspapers express satisfaction that England "has regained in Canada much of the ground she recently lost to the United States." One writer declares however that "Ottawa ended in failure and sent Great Britain back to Europe."

Fish Industry
MONTREAL, Aug. 22—A glance at the results of the Economic Imperial Conference does not seem to convey the impression that the fish industry of Canada will gain much by the Ottawa parley, said I. A. Paulhus, ex-president of the Canadian Fish Association here today.

"It is naturally too early to make a definite comment on the treaty, but the first impression is that nothing is changed as regards the fish industry. We still continue to get 10 per cent preference over the same product of foreign countries in the British market. While this much protection was accepted with

satisfaction by Canadian fish exporters, it has proven to be insufficient to allow us to compete in the United Kingdom market, with similar products from Russia, Denmark and Iceland, it had been expected that another 20 per cent would be added to that protection but this has not been done, so far as I can see."

Sir John Aird
TORONTO, Aug. 22—Canadians must realize that it will take some time before the results of the Imperial Conference would work out, but if the conference accomplished half what it hoped to, it would be a success said Sir John Aird, President of the Canadian Bank of Commerce.

He was pleased to note, said Sir John, that an opening had been left for negotiations with Russia, Britain's wartime ally. It would have been unfortunate, he felt, to injure friendly relations between Britain and Russia. He believed there was some way of maintaining peace and harmony for the benefit of both nations.
