# 5,000 See Algiers Win Feature At Old Orchard Track



Nothing in competitive golf has the effect on your frame of mind as much as how you are putting at the moment. For instance, during the recent Open Championship at Cleveland played a round of what was probably the best golf I have played in some time, but I was lucky to have a 69.

"Lucky to have a 69!" I can hear you exclaim. If I had been putting like Lloyd Mangrum with whom I was paired on that round, I would have had a 57, or at the worst a 63, instead of a 69. That's why I felt cheated rather than being satisfied with my 69.

Like the millionaire who wants to make more money, you're never satisfied in golf. I was playing so well from the green in that 69 round that I wanted to accomplish perfection by putting just as well as I was playing my other shots.

In that particular round putting seemed so important in the situations which developed that I wasn't satisfied with the round when I didn't put as I aspired to. That's the way it goes in golf, the way it goes when you have a round in which it is the puts that don't fall which would have paid off in your score.

Nor am I the only player who has been having trouble with his putting. Harold (Dug) McSpoden has been playing as well in recent months as I have ever seen him play, but he has been putting badly. He is playing better than he ever was a few years back when he was winning so many tournaments and so much prize money, but he was putting much better then and he was continually confronted with situations in which he had to put for the payoff and he made them.

Lloyd Mangrum, the new Open Champion, is an all-around putter and, perhaps, you conservative putters can learn something from the fact that he plays for the cup on every shot. The way he grips a putter is enough to give you confidence in him on the green. He has a good firm grip and he strokes the ball easily and smoothly, but gets plenty of power behind his ball.

At the ninth hole of the afternoon, or second round of the Open playoff, Lloyd pulled off a putt which illustrates better than I can get the ball into the cup. At that particular hole he put one in from all the way across the green for a six. If he had missed it would have been a cinch to take an eight on that particular hole. He hit the ball hard. The ball hit the back of the cup at the speed and jumped several inches above the level of the green but dropped in. It's a great feeling when you're making that kind of putt.

In putting I would recommend that you consider the following instructions. Don't forget the left hand must be put in your right hand so that the club never wiggles.

The actual tapping of the ball is done with the right hand. But no matter how long a putt you may have, try not to bring the clubhead back more than a foot. There's enough power in the right hand to hit the ball just as far as it is ever necessary to hit it on the green. Keep your putter low low sweep it on the grass to the full extent of your stroke. Never lift it. Remember to keep your head steady. Your ball still long after the ball is struck.
