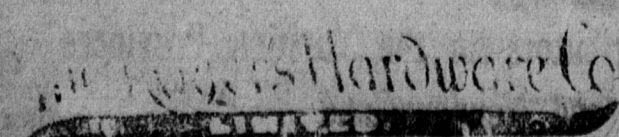

—TIGNISH FIRE PROTECTION.—A mass meeting of the citizens of Tignish took place in Tignish Hall on Monday evening the 10th inst., at which a fire brigade committee was organized consisting of five of the most energetic men of the place. The object is to improve the fire fighting apparatus so as to make it more efficient. Up to now, a hook and ladder company was in force but from this on a newly equipped fire brigade will have at their disposal proper power pumps, hose, and an extra supply of ladders. It is safe to say that the citizens of Tignish desire protection against fire and they are going to have it. Apart from the organization of our improved fire brigade, the citizens appointed a strong committee for general improvement in and about the village; in other words general reconstruction work. There was also a strong resolution passed at the meeting favouring the Soldiers Memorial Highway.

Arrangements for Supplying Germany

PARIS, March 8.—The Council of the great powers took action today to ward relieving the rather acute situation created by the interruption of the negotiations at Spa concerning the taking over of German ships and supplying Germany with food. Final action went over until tomorrow but meantime at a conference between David Lloyd-George, the British Premier and M. Clemenceau and Colonel Edward M. House of the American Peace Delegation a resolution drawn by Lord Robert Cecil member of the British Peace Commission was tentatively approved for adjusting the affair. This resolution provides that of the day the ships are released the Allies shall undertake to re-visitual the Germans until the next harvest, payment being made in coal, potatoes, nitrates and other products which Germany has and the Allies want. The agreement reached between the British, French and American member of the council leads to the expectation that the Council will accept settlement tomorrow and that the negotiations at Spa will be resumed.

PARIS, March, 9.—L'Intransigeant predicted today that the plenary conference with the German Peace Delegation will be held in Versailles before the end of this month. The general conference will take up ratification of the preliminary peace on March 15th. The German Penitentiaries will be called in for an informal conference about March 20 after which the Plenary conference will be held.

Splendid Lecture on Paris

(Continued from page one)

sure to be, than what we have seen during the past four years on the plains of Flanders and of Belgium, of France, of Serbia and of Poland, then this world will have become a worse hell than Milton ever conceived of, or Dante ever pictured. Getting back to the subject of Paris, the Paris of ante-bellum days, the speaker declared that one great feature which impressed him forcibly was the great attention paid by the authorities to keeping the city as far as possible in perfect condition; its streets are looked after with unceasing care, its buildings erected with a due idea of uniformity, while the whiteness of the building stone adds an added beauty and the greatest attention is paid to the flower-beds and ornamental trees.

The lecturer, after outlining a some length historical facts in connection with Paris took his audience on an imaginary journey, beautifully illustrated, to the points of the greatest interest in the city. First of all he dealt with the monuments, starting with the Arc de Triomphe, largest of all the world's triumphal arches and most imposing and grand in its colossal and simple design, occupying the most commanding spot in Paris, and set in the centre of a twelve-pointed star of avenues. The Major after describing in detail the historical events connected with this majestic structure, next described the Arc du Carroussel, upon which stood for a time the four world-renowned bronze horses, which adorn the portal over the entrance to St. Mark's Cathedral in Venice.

Other views put on and described were the Vendome Column in the place Vendome, the Column of July, the Cathedral de Notre Dame, Exterior and Interior, and the panorama from this magnificent edifice, affording a magnificent view of the city; the Church of the Madeleine, the Pantheon, Santa Chapelle, St. Germain Auxerrois, the Tomb of Napoleon, the Garden of the Tuilleries, the Louvre, Luxembourg Palace, Palais de l'Industrie, Palais du Trocadero, Grand Opera House, Place de la Concorde, the Bois de Boulogne, the Bois de Vincennes, the Chamber of Louis XIV., Chapelle des Invalides, the Cascade of St. Louis, St. Denis Cathedral (the burial place of the Kings of France from Dagobert to Louis XVIII.), and many other famed places, all combining to make the lecture one of the most interesting and informing that one could listen to.

At the close a hearty vote of thanks was tendered Major Bartlett, moved by Dr. McGuigan, seconded by Mr. Daniel McDonald and supported by Lieut. Governor McDonald.

THE MARKETS

TORONTO

There was a good and active demand for cattle at prices which were on the whole about steady, although advances of about 25 cents per hundred were made on some grades compared with values at the close of the previous week. A few lots of steers weighing from twelve hundred to thirteen hundred pounds per animal sold during the week at \$16.00 per hundred, and one lot at \$16.25. Of steers weighing from ten hundred to twelve hundred pounds each, a few head of eleven hundred and fifty pounds brought \$16.00.

HOGS

Feed and watered hogs sold at \$18.25 and \$18.50 per hundred. On Wednesday \$18.00 was the top price reported and some hogs were sold at \$17.50.

The market closed on Thursday with sales being made from \$17.50 to \$18.00 per hundred.

MONTREAL
A brisk demand and a small supply of cattle were factors responsible for an increase in price estimated at 50 cents per hundred when compared with quotations of the previous week. The advance was particularly noticeable in the sales of steers. The quality of the offering was poor. Twenty one steers averaging nine hundred and ten pounds sold at \$12.50 per hundred, and eight sters averaging slightly over ten hundred pounds were weighed up at a similar price. Steers of very medium quality and weighing around nine hundred pounds sold up to \$11.00 and a few very light steers weighing about four hundred and fifty pounds each realized \$8.50 per hundred.
