ran downstairs in her night clothes to your father for his protection?"

"She went downstairs but not for my father's protection or through anything caused by me."

"Did you know or were you informed that your wife was in a certain condition?"

"She told me."

"Did your attitude change toward her?"

"Yes, I was more sympathetic. Ellis denied having told his wife on one occasion to pack her trunk and go to Hell. He also denied having told his wife that he would never give her back a cent of the \$90 he had borrowed. As a matter of fact he had returned \$40 before the tragedy.

Reverting to the matter of the deceased's alleged attempt at an unnatural offence Ellis told Mr. Johnston that his counsel on Friday asked him to allow the point to be brought out. He did not, he said, desire to reflect on his dead wife's character, but submitted on pressure.

Ellis firmly denied that he ever struck his wife, kicked her, or threatened her in his life. He had no knowledge of any statements by his father that she was to have a separate room until something was arranged for her, nor did he know that she had written to Rev. Mr. Bamford.

The deceased, the prisoner said, refused on three consecutive occasions to go to Summerside to sign the mortgage in connection with the property deal and that company him did not ask her to accompany him on the morning of Jan. 6th. He did not know that she had gone to Summerside for legal advice and did not know until afterwards when he was in jail that she had signed the mortgage.

"Up to that time you had thought that she was still refusing to sign?"

"And if she had refused and remained alive you couldn't have been able to carry out the transaction?"

"Yes."

Ellis said subsequently that when he heard she had gone to Summerside he had an idea that she had changed her mind about signing and had gone in for the purpose.

"When she came in that night did you ask her where she had been?"

"No."

"How did you know that she had been in Summerside?"

"I thought I saw her when the trains crossed at Wellington."

Ellis denied having said to his wife when she returned home on the night of the 6th: "you're back are you? Good—d—n you, you have a nerve to come back here."

Questioned as to his conduct after the deceased left the house that night Ellis said that although he did not go out to look for her he worried considerably. He felt that she had gone to one of the neighbors where she would be properly looked after. In the morning when he saw her downstairs he thought she had been there all night—thought that he had come back. Up to that time he did not know where she was.

"She was not in a mood to be asked any questions, at that time," said witness when asked why he did not interrogate his wife.

"What mood were you in?" asked counsel.

"I was in a good mood. I have perfect control of my temper."

In reference to the deceased's conduct on the 7th, Ellis said that it was a common occurrence for his wife to spend a whole day in her room and on several occasions he had gone to her door and asked her to come down and have something to eat, but each time she declined that day he did not go near her. He would have if he thought he would have been received. The deceased persistently refused to go anywhere with him. On many occasions he went to her and asked her to go places and do things anything to cheer her up and cure her homesickness. But she would not even go to church with him. She gave reasons.

"What were the reasons?"

Ellis hesitated before answering. He did not, he said, want to say anything to blacken her character. Counsel insisted.

"The reason she gave me," said Ellis, "was that her father had kicked her out. He was a preacher but not a Christian and she was fed up with churches and parsons.

Then, in addition to being an attempted murderer, she also committed unnatural offence while in bed with her own husband and antagonized her own father?"

"Yes," replied the accused, "but I am not bringing that out voluntarily."

"Did she say why she was kicked out?"

"Because she was defending her mother against her father?"

Ellis said he had met the father and had found him to be a perfect gentleman.

The bruises on the arms of the deceased might have been caused by himself, accused said, when he grasped his wife to seat her on the chair in the kitchen.

road on which it was situated.

Ellis said that his wife went home in order to avoid confusion in sailing orders. The only information he had of a disagreement with her father was from herself on the boat. He had asked her to get a written permission to marry from her father which she did. It was not necessary, he said, but he asked for it anyway. A medical certificate and clergyman's recommendation were necessary but parent consent was not provided. The girl was of age. All he required was the consent of his commanding officer.

Crown Counsel denied permission to give the prisoner one of his wives letters to read to the jury and to state whether the whole or any part was true or untrue. Mr. Saunders made a strong objection and was sustained. Mr. Johnston then asked to have the witness read the letter privately and to indicate what contained therein was true. Permission, after argument, was refused.
