BEYOND THE VEIL

Belief in the survival of the soul after the death of the body is common, in one form or another to almost every race and every religion, while for the Christian it ranks among the primary essentials of his creed. Yet the paradoxical phrase of the burial service used by the English Church is precisely accurate when it describes belief in personal immortality as a "sure and certain hope." Strong faith, supported by a dispassionate appeal to reason, can make the hope sure and certain, yet a hope it must remain, and not a certainty assumed by scientific proof.

This truth brings perplexity to many devout minds. They have been encouraged to hope that for all who have tried to serve God physical death will mean entrance to a happier state of being, wholly freed from every trace of sin, of suffering, of sorrow, of decay; a state radiant with completeness of knowledge and love, enriched by lasting reunion with those who have gone before, crowned by the full revelation and glory of God. If such is the destiny awaiting mankind, why has not an absolute certainty of it, a scientific certainty beyond all possible doubt, been granted to the human race?

Natural though this feeling seems, further reflection will suggest reasons for the divine reticence on this subject. The reticence is very marked in the teaching of our Lord, who using the future life as the background in the Dives and Lazarus parable, deliberately employed the conventional imagery of his age, imagery which not even his contemporaries took literally. If the self-imposed limitations of his human knowledge permitted and he had described the glories of heaven as they are, he would at once have frustrated his aim of insisting on the importance of his present life.

Again, he laboured to show that the Kingdom of God is not an approximately visible state, the attainment of which cannot be attempted on earth; on the contrary, it is something to be built up here, begun by wise first disciples to whom he spoke, and continued by each generation of their successors. To dazzle them by revelations of the hereafter would certainly have been to blind them to their immediate tasks and responsibilities. And for us in turn such revelations must inevitably cause this world to seem of no real importance; nothing would matter except to pass from it into the bliss of heaven with the least possible delay.

Thus there seems to be sufficient reason for being content with the existing restrictions of human knowledge concerning what lies beyond the veil.

Reinforcing doses are administered when required to school children immunized three or more years ago.
