Gov't Member Does Not Expect Early Lifting Of Controls

OTTAWA, Dec. 2 — (CP) — A cabinet minister today he doubted that it would be possible to release any further important controls over the Canadian economy before the opening of parliament late next month and added, "I think the best we can hope for is to lift a few by the end of the fiscal year, March 31."

His words served to heighten prospects that the subject of controls will be one of the first and one of the heaviest battlegrounds of the third session of the 30th parliament. They grew noticeably after Saturday's announcement by Prime Minister Mackenzie King that wage and salary controls have been lifted.

Meanwhile a second cabinet minister maintained that the government was getting pronounced support for its avowed policy of removing other controls in what the prime minister called "a gradual and orderly manner so as to protect the standards of living and the value of the war savings of the people."

His colleague predicted that rental controls would be the last to go, with those over lumber, vital in the race to meet housing demands, not far behind.


As for goods, he would only propose that the controls would be retained for some considerable time yet because the problem is more a matter of distribution than supply. It was only through con-

Saint John Man Guilty Of Murder

SAINT JOHN, N. B., Dec. 2 — A jury in the Saint John Circuit Court tonight convicted Thomas Heffernan, 38, at the end of his six-day trial on a charge of murdering Miss Leverage Powers, 24. The mandatory sentence of death will be pronounced tomorrow morning by Chief Justice J. E. Michaud in the King's Bench Division, New Brunswick Supreme Court.

The verdict of guilty carried no recommendation for mercy. After the jury foreman spoke the single, fatal confession Heffernan admitted as confidant as he had seemed throughout the trial. Relatives gathered around the prisoner's box. He said a few words to his wife and kissed her.

The jury reached a decision 15 minutes after hearing evidence re-read for almost an hour. Chief Justice Michaud called for a verdict of guilty, not guilty for reason of insanity, or not guilty. There was no charge for a verdict of manslaughter.

Miss Powers' body was found in nearby Ashburn Lake after Heffernan led police to the scene. According to alleged confessions admitted in evidence, Heffernan assaulted the young woman and threw her into the lake. The defence attempted to show insanity but psychiatrists testified there was no evidence of this, and Heffernan spent several months in the Provincial Hospital 10 years ago.

"Apparently," Chief Justice Michaud said in his charge to the jury, "the accused holds the opinion that if a man cannot control his impulses he can be excused on the grounds of insanity. This theory is absolutely rejected in Canada."

Investiture At Ottawa

OTTAWA, Dec. 2 — (CP) — Citations telling of the valorous deeds of Canadian servicemen and women during the war stirred memories, many of them sad, as more than 300 persons today attended an investiture at government house.

The occasion was a solemn one as Viscount Alexander, Governor-General, invested 101 persons with awards ranging from the Victoria Cross to the British Empire Medal. Many a mother, father and widow stepped up to receive a decoration in the absence of a hero who died in winning it.

At the request of his mother, the Victoria Cross won by the late PO. Andrew Charles Mynarski, Winnipeg, has been forwarded to the Lieutenant-Governor of Manitoba, who will make the presentation at some later date.

A dog-fight over the Atlantic in which a Canadian plane was downed was recalled as Mrs. R. B. Gray, widow of PO R. B. Gray, Vancouver, was decorated in place of her husband who gave his life in order that his comrades might

15,700 pigeons were called in to help the British Army.

War Office figures show that transport services also required 6,000 bullocks, and 5,000 dogs were used for a variety of purposes in far-flung battlefields.

John Freeman, financial secretary to the War Office, said in the Commons that figures did not take into account millions of cattle, sheep and other animals handled by the army before use as food.

Casualties among the transport animals were "a very small proportion" of the total. He asked for notice of a question whether a suitable memorial for animals killed in the war should be erected.
