Trade Satisfactory In Maritimes

ST. JOHN, N.B., August 27.—Maritime Provinces continue to present a very satisfactory showing insofar as industrial conditions are concerned having in mind the present state of trade throughout Canada, declared W. U. Appleton, General Manager of the Atlantic Region of the Canadian National Railways, who arrived in St. John. The afternoon freight tonnage on the Atlantic region up-to-date was equal to that of last year for the same period, Mr. Appleton stated. This may be taken as a fair indication of business trend in the Maritimes. The Canadian National operates more than seventy-seven per cent of the total railway mileage to Canada's Atlantic provinces.

B., Aug. 28.—The holder of the silver trophy emblematic of ladies golf championship of the Maritime Provinces for 1930 will be decided here today when Miss Audrey McLeod, of the Riverside Golf Course County Club, St. John, meets Mrs. A. J. Thompson, of Fredericton. These two New Brunswick ladies won here this afternoon in the semi-finals for the championship, defeating their Nova Scotia opponents after hard battles under a hot sun.

The defeat of Mrs. Stanley E. Goodwin, of Amherst, N. S., last year's runnerup was only accomplished by the nerve test striving by Mrs. Thompson, when she steaded down to take the match in seventeenth hole. Miss Catherine Ladd, of Yarmouth, N. S., Nova Scotia's other hope for the title, went down to defeat before the steady onslaughts of Miss McLeod, conspicuous since the start of the tourney here on Monday.

Succumbed To Sleeping Sickness

MONTREAL, Aug. 28.—Dread sleeping sickness today claimed the life of Percy Fisher, Vice-President of the English Amateur Athletic Association here. Mr. Fisher, who left England in hopes of watching the fortunes of the Empire games at Hamilton, Ont., was stricken with the malady on board steamer and was confined to hospital since his arrival here. Death occurred in the Montreal General Hospital.

The rally was short lived, however, and on Monday there was a grave doubt as to whether he would last through the night. For most of the time he was in Hospital here, he was unconscious.

SUNDAY SERVICE

WHEREAS one of the inducements held out to us to enter Confederation, was the promise of continuous steam communication with the mainland winter and summer for passengers and mails

AND WHEREAS for the past few years there has been a gradual increase of passengers crossing to this Province

AND WHEREAS with the advent of the new Car Ferry and the construction of the Canadian National Hotel in Charlottetown, it may reasonably be expected that there will be a still larger influx of visitors to this Province, many of whom will come from Ontario, Quebec, and the United States points

AND WHEREAS Prince Edward Island is now the only Province of Canada not connected with the railway systems of Canada and the United States on Sunday

AND WHEREAS the business interests of this Province are further prejudiced by the consequent delay in the receipt of their mail

THEREFORE RESOLVED that the Prince Edward Island Associated Boards of Trade desire to go on record as favoring a Sunday service for the whole year round, as being in the best interests of the people of this Province, and of the Canadian National Railway.

AIR PORT FACILITIES

WESTERN TRAIN SERVICE

Whereas The freight train west of Summerside runs on a triweekly schedule leaving Summerside at noon and reaching Tignish, a distance of sixty-eight miles, occasionally as late as midnight.

Consequently freight shipped from Charlottetown takes three to four days before delivery is effected. This is a great inconvenience to merchants who wish to give a quick service to their customers.

W. Beatty, President of the Canadian Pacific Railway, who was in Halifax for a few hours yesterday after visiting Saint John, Digby, Yarmouth and Kentville.

Singling out the Maritime Provinces from the remaining part of Canada, he said that conditions were particularly favorable and that the improved service on the Bay of Fundy route had been inaugurated by the C.
