Livestock Report

MONTREAL, Sept. 19.—Cattle receipts 1,569, buyers began trading by purchasing calves, lambs, and hogs and at time of writing cattle sales were just beginning. The few sales made would indicate prices about even with last week, one load mixed steers including good and poor averaging 960 pounds sold for \$6.75. Some good cows were sold for \$7.75 and \$6.00 and bulls were quoted around \$3.25 and \$2.50.

Quotations:—Butcher steers good \$7.50 to \$7.75, medium \$6.50 to \$7.25, common \$5.00 to \$6.25, butcher heifers, medium \$5.50 to \$6.50, common \$4.00 to \$5.50. Butcher cows, good \$5.50 to \$6.50, medium \$3.50 to \$5.00, canners \$1.75 to \$2.25, cutters \$2.75 to \$3.25, butchers bulls, common \$3.25 to \$3.50.

Calf receipts 1,577. Calves were strong, veals sold from \$10.00 to \$12.00 with a few choice ones picked out at \$12.50 and \$13.00. Heavy pair fed calves in fair flesh brought from \$7.00 to \$9.50 and Quebec grassers \$4.50 to \$6.00 with the bulk of sales \$5.50 or better.

Quotations:—Good veal \$11.00 to \$12.50, medium \$10.00 to \$11.00, common \$7.00 to \$9.50, grassers \$4.50 to \$6.00.

Sheep receipts 7,540. The lamb market was rather slow \$11.00 was about the top for good quality ewes and wethers with the bucks out at \$2.00 per cwt. less. A few carloads good lambs were sold at \$10.50 flat but only a moderate percentage of bucks were included. Several hundred good quality black faced buck lambs were taken by one local buyer at \$10.00. Common lambs were sold from \$9.50 to
