

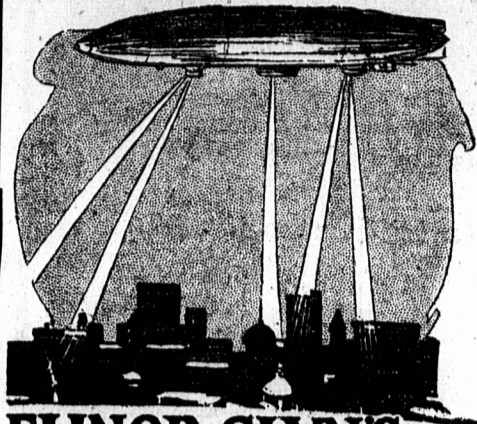

WHY U. S. BOXERS BEST.

Heredity has played its part in producing a new generation of boxers in America, says George Carpenter, who concedes a vast superiority in the fist game.

In the last few years, Carpenter admits, the old "unbeatable" have disappeared, but to take their places have come new men of iron, themselves sons of fighters, who are endowed above all with a tremendous ability to take punishment. Carpenter declared, "and the Americans are the greatest masters of that ability. Hit them as hard as you can for eight, ten or fifteen rounds; your arm will wear out and it affects them little."

FRENCH STALLION'S RECORD.

Rabelais, the oldest stallion in the French thoroughbred stud, heads the list of sires that produced the best winners of the season on French tracks. He is 26 years old and is still going strong. Fifteen of his foals were registered this year and his card for next season is full.

A large part of the sums credited to Rabelais were won by the season's crack, Bird, who was first in the half million Triumphant Arch stakes, and placed in the Derby and Grand Prix. Rabelais was foaled in 1900, by Saint Simon, the English sire out of Satrial.
