notes of the evidence read over to you I doubt that it is necessary for me to do so. You have the distinction clearly drawn between the two. I do not know how you could get a better illustration of what a jury requires to keep in mind when dealing with parties who have undoubtedly lent a hand in connection with a crime. They are all equally guilty and you get to the very essential question of what is guilt, and that is, intention. Hennessey's intention may have been perfectly innocent, perfectly lawful. The intention of the other men, according to their own explanation, was not lawful.

Here I would gladly conclude, except that I feel I would not be doing my duty unless I called your attention to this fact, that the evidence discloses the complicity of more persons in this crime than have been brought before the Court. I don't know what you believe about those two strangers, but one stranger there is a certainty; of the other you may perhaps have some doubt. But it is perfectly clear that other than the accused had a hand in this crime and that so far as we can see they have gone untouched by the arm of the law. The man who drove away that rum on the motor car drove it away not into the wilderness. It did not vanish into thin air. It went somewhere and at the other end in all probability you would find one or more of the criminals involved in this theft. That car should have been followed every motor car in this province and there are not so many cars that could be capable of carrying a weight of this kind. It should have been possible to find out who drove that car and where it went. There is only one means of exit from this island. There is no other place in Canada in which the crime could be so completely segregated and surrounded as here, and it should have been done. Sometimes I know what looks simple, may turn out far otherwise; but I see no evidence of any effort being made to round out this case in this regard. It would be a frightful thing if this island should come to be recognized as the place where motor bandits might safely ply their trade. They usually employ swift machines that can almost fly away from us, but here even a motor truck with two liquor jugs on it was not pursued for its pursuers. It is not so long since the event happened and possibly the operations of the law have been such as to move in the direction of the detection of these criminals. We will hope that this province will not become the place where shop breaking and larceny and carrying away and concealment of stolen goods can be professedly carried on by any person. We would wish it to be known, however, it would be true, that crimes of violence were sure to be followed and punishment would inevitably fall on the heads of those engaged in them. Willful and flagrant violation of the law such as this must be stamped out if we value our lives and our rights.

Mr. Inman Presents Defense.

Mr. Inman, K. C. in summarizing up the evidence for the defense, read the account in the indictment charging the prisoners with breaking, entering and stealing from a bonded warehouse, which he submitted had not been proven by the Crown. In the first place there was any evidence that rum was stolen? The Crown has not succeeded in proving that the puncheons at Carter's were the same puncheons gauged and proved to be rum at the freight shed.

Taking up Edward Hennessey's defense first, Counsel said Hennessey's character was good; he was a hard-working truckman; no attempt has been made to connect him with O'Brien and Essery previous to the time the puncheons were removed. He tells a straightforward story of being called at an early hour by a stranger, who paid him for doing some trucking which he did without asking questions. On the previous Saturday death had entered Hennessey's family and it would be very extraordinary if in a time of sorrow and affliction he would conspire to commit robbery. In the case of O'Brien and Essery further evidence is given to the strange man in the John Riggs and Benj. Crabbe saw the man and Dr. Genge ten days previously saw a man corresponding to the same description, trying to ship rum off to Pugwash, Oct. 13th. Mr. Hand came on the stand to identify Ross & Bros., of New York. He was not subpoenaed. Asked if he knew anything about the robbery he said no, and cross examination brought out the fact that both Mr. Hand and Mr. Bazinet saw the liquor go past in charge of the Customs, and that they never mentioned it to each other, although it was a shipment worth \$2,000 or \$3,000. The next day Mr. Hand went away, the liquor was reported missing but no report was sent to the St. John office. Messages were sent to Mr. Hand by secret code, O'Brien and Essery are two mere boys, doing a huckster store business, and a gallon here and there, but they were somebody behind them. When the Watchmen came around they did not show any signs of guilt. Sergeant McIntosh and the Watchmen testified that everything appeared all right. Counsel submitted that the actions of Essery and O'Brien were thoroughly consistent with their evidence. The next afternoon they went to the front yard with a script and got some beer. If they had the rum they would not need to do that. There is evidently a big manipulation of liquor going on in Charlottetown; truckmen are kept busy moving it at all hours of the night and morning and in the midst of this manipulation this liquor has disappeared.

The Court took recess until 2 p. m.

Crown Case Presented

Attorney General Johnston, summing up the case for the Crown, said that beyond all dispute it was proven that Carter's Warehouse had been broken into and entered and two puncheons of rum stolen between 5 o'clock on the evening of June 17th and 4 o'clock on the morning of June 18th. It is also beyond dispute that the three prisoners were there and were actually caught in the act of taking it away. Outstaid of the prisoners' statements there is no evidence of any other parties being around or innocent men are not seen around at that hour in the morning taking goods out of a bonded warehouse. Two of the prisoners are more likely than they to be mixed up in an affair of this kind? Bookleggers will resort to anything in order to turn over a profit and the profit is a large one. They admitted running a restaurant as a cloak to their liquor business. There is here a very strong chain of conclusive evidence against O'Brien and Essery at least. It is for the jury to decide upon the importance of the statements regarding the two notorious moonshiners and whether these two cunning shrewd fellows were led like lambs to the slaughter by a total stranger whom they had never seen before or since. If they were able to show that they got a certain amount of rum from a stranger in their case, but they admit they got no rum. If their story is true, that the stranger took them

into the front door of Carter's warehouse at 4 o'clock in the morning they must have known there was something wrong. Their whole story was most improbable and preposterous and was indicative of fraud from beginning to end. The delivery of the goods and yet they were delivered there when the goods were bicycled in the swamp out by the bicycle park. Hennessey, as has been said is a truckman and is accustomed to hauling goods late in the evening but not at 4 o'clock in the morning. The testimony of Dr. Genge merely proves that some person was trying to ship liquor off the Island ten days before the robbery. Assuming that there was a "man higher up" that does not let the prisoners out. Mr. Craig testified that O'Brien seemed to be surprised at reading the account of the robbery in the newspaper and yet the evidence is that he and Essery actually assisted in taking the stuff away. The Crown submitted that so far as the business of the Canadian Distributing Company was concerned, Mr. Hand and Mr. Bazinet gave clear and satisfactory testimony. All the staff of the Distributing Company except the night watchman, were
