C. P. R. Steamships Lost 12 Ships To Enemy Action

MONTREAL, May 2 — (CP) — Canadian Pacific Steamship Company has lost 12 ships totalling 199,061 tons due to enemy action out of a total tonnage of 306,468.

President D. C. Coleman of Canadian Pacific Railway told the annual meeting today.

In addition he said, two passenger vessels have been taken over permanently by the British Admiralty. They are the Montclair and Montclair.

Ships lost were the Empress of Britain, 42,000-ton flagship of the fleet; the Empress of Asia, the Empress of Canada, the Princess Marguerite, five Beaver class freighters—the Beaverbrae, Beaverburn, Beaverville, Beaverhill and Beaverhead—and the Niagara.

The Niagara was operated by the Canadian Australasian Line in which C.P.R. has a one-half interest.

Plan Switch To Pacific War Theatre

OTTAWA, May 2 — (CP) — With the decisive stage of the war against Germany reached, service planners here are getting ready for the switch-over from the European to the Pacific theatre of operations.

Canada's navy, army and air force will participate against the Japanese on a reduced scale with forces going to the new theatre on a re-voluntary basis after 30 days leave at home.

The navy and air force units will co-operate closely with British forces while the army will be attached to the United States forces. All will likely be under supreme command of the United States.

The switch-over will be a gradual process, with Pacific forces build-up predicted on the availability of bases in the crowded Pacific area, the size of the force needed for occupational work in Europe, and—not the least consideration—the availability of shipping.

Russian entrance into the war against Japan might conceivably create a re-arrangement of Canadian plans on the best by more accessible bases, being available in the North Pacific.

After the conquest of Germany that country will be divided into spheres of responsibility with Canadian army and air force contingents closely associated with British forces, possibly in the north-west section.

Pacific Requirements

The Pacific requires few of the corvette, frigate and minesweeper types of warcraft which make up the larger share of the Canadian navy.

But officials believe it quite likely that many of this fleet will be used to patrol some time after European hostilities cease, hunting down "pirate" U-boats in the Atlantic. It is possible the pirate fleet, manned by youthful ardent Nazis with nothing to lose, returning to a prostrate land, will continue to operate as long as they can plunder supplies.

However, the navy already sent the cruiser Uganda to the Pacific as the vanguard of a fleet which will eventually include the sister ship Ontario, two fleet aircraft carriers, anti-aircraft cruisers, perhaps a score of tribal and crescent class destroyers and auxiliaries.

No commander of this force has been appointed, but several names have been mentioned, including those of Rear Admiral Leonard W. Murray, 49, Granville, N.S., Atlantic command; Rear Admiral H. E. Reid, 48, Portage du Fort, Que., head of the Canadian naval mission in Washington; and Capt. Harry Dewar, 42, Wolfville, N.S., assistant chief of naval staff.

The army has sent observers and specialists to the Pacific in much larger numbers than it has in North Africa before participating in Mediterranean action. Speculation has been that the army—which operates two divisions, one in Italy and now has a five-division two corps army in northwest Europe—will operate a division against the Japanese with another division in reserve.

Most frequently mentioned name as commander of the Pacific formation is Maj.-Gen. Dan Spry, 32, of Winnipeg, who is acting as chief general in the Canadian army.

The air force, whose squadrons flew more than 26,000 action-packed sorties, will likely leave 10 or 11 fighter and bomber squadrons behind in Europe as part of the police force to fly "flagship" patrols over the British-occupied area.

Perhaps another 15 squadrons of fighters and bombers, retaining their old European anti-aircraft designations, will be switched to the Pacific with Air Vice-Marshal C.M. (Black Mike) McEwen, 43, Griswold, Ont., chief of Canada's bomber group as the likely commander.

USED TO SLIM WOMEN

NEW YORK, May 3 — (CP) — War, despite rationing, hard work and worry has helped pad the woman's figure—and in the wrong places.

After a two-year survey of 100,000 women Clarence MacLery, director of slenderizing schools throughout the United States, has come to the conclusion that the main figure problem of today's woman is an abnormal development of thighs. She says:

"One of the reasons for this condition appears to be the new types of standing work women have been doing in war plants. Tight measurements increase as a result of using machines that hitherto were not developed.

When the war is over, she believes, there will be the same rush to reducing silhouettes that occurred after the First Great War.

"Though my father had established his first slenderizing school for men only it was after the war that the slenderizing industry developed for themselves. So many of them registered that eventually Dad dismissed the men."

Miss MacLery carried on for her father. She helped devise various gadgets to make reducing less of a chore. In her salons there are machines that can be set to massage the body wherever it needs slimming, and a girl can stand, sit or lie in comfort while it is being accomplished.

ENGLISHMAN EXPERT ON AUSSIE ABORIGINE

GAMBERRA, May 3 — (CP) — At the age of 83, Daisy Bates of Wyndring, Inner Australia, has just been given a Commonwealth fellowship to enable her to compile a collection of native stories for children. She will also prepare a work on aboriginal laws and customs and on other features of native life.

Mrs. Bates has lived for 45 years amongst the aborigines of the west and centre of Australia. Born in England, she came to Australia in 1889 and soon became deeply interested in Australia's Stone Age people.

In 1904 the West Australian government commissioned her to prepare a history of the native tribes of Western Australia. This work has long been completed but has not yet been published.

When the Trans-continental Railway was put through in 1917 it began to attract the primitive people from regions hundreds of miles to the north. Aborigines were allowed to ride free on the freight trains and found a lot of fun in this. Mrs. Bates settled at Oidea, on the line, in 1919 and has lived amongst the natives there, or at Wyndring nearby, ever since.

Her natives call her grandmother. She wears, as they do, amongst the aborigines or called into consultation at the Australian Hospital, the tightly fitting blouse, high collar and long skirts of the late Victorian age.

MECHANICAL AGE INCREASES GIRTH

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C.N.R. Staff Reaches High Loan Figure

MONTREAL, QUE., May 2 — In the first seven days of the eighth victory loan campaign, employees of the Canadian National System subscribed \$5,776,200, according to figures released today by the treasury department. There were 56,482 subscribers. Trans Canada Air Lines employees to the number of 2,612 invested \$328,350, and 796 National Railways Munitions Limited subscribers subscribed \$123,400. Totals for the Railway were 53,234 purchasers and \$6,324,450.

The leading unit in Canada is St. Jerome Quebec Div., which has gone over its objective by 14.3 per cent. Of the Systems regions the western is in first place with 64 per cent of its objective attained and Prince Rupert B.C. dry dock at the top with 90.9 per cent. Central regions stand second with 54.2 per cent; employees of the C.N.E. Atlantic region have attained 51.7 per cent of their objective headed by New Glasgow division with 99 per cent.

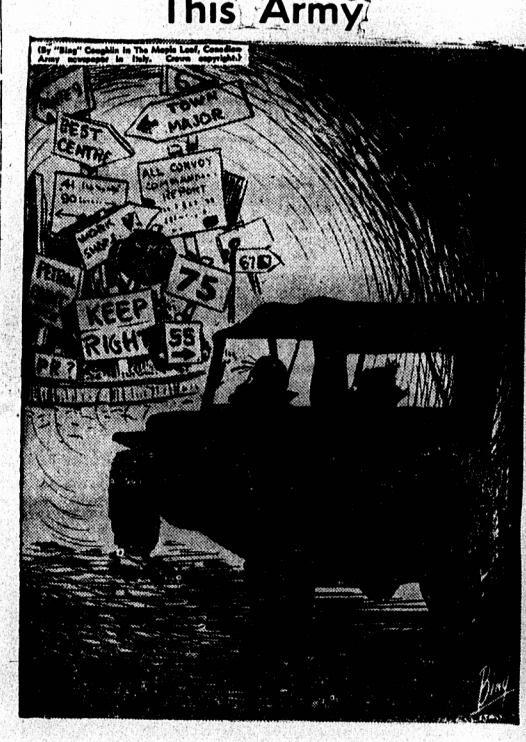
