ISLAND BOYS CELEBRATES ANNUAL BIBLE SOCIETY MEETING

Rev. M. J. Smith, Kinkora, remembered By Parishioners On Happy Occasion.

The Parishioners of St. Malachy's Church, Kinkora, paid a signal tribute to their pastor, Rev. M. J. Smith, on Sunday afternoon last. The occasion which prompted this demonstration was Father Smith's completion of twenty-five years in the holy priesthood. Not wishing to have any jubilee celebration, Father Smith, a few days previous to his anniversary—the 29th of June—went to St. Anne de Beaupre, Quebec, and to St. Joseph's Oratory, Montreal, where he quietly and happily celebrated his twenty-fifth anniversary.

During his absence, however, his devoted parishioners made preparations to surprise their pastor and honor him in a manner befitting the occasion. St. Malachy's Hall was packed to the doors at 3.30 p.m. with parishioners and visitors. The stage and interior were tastefully decorated for the occasion. On the stage, besides the reverend jubilarian and the chairman, Mr. Joseph Callaghan, were seated Rev. J. J. Macdonald, a former pastor of Kinkora for twenty-nine years, and Revs. J. A. McIntyre, Martin Monaghan, Bernard Gillis, Wm. E. Monaghan, Clarence Pitre, and Bennett Macdonald. A suitable programme was rendered, those taking part being Rev. Dr. Gillis, James P. McInnis, Mrs. W. J. Callaghan, Ottawa, Mrs. Joseph Callaghan, and Gertrude, Charles, and Winnifred McIvor. Five addresses were then read to Father Smith. The address from the parish was read by Mr. F. P. McCarville, trustee, accompanied by a well filled purse presented by Mr. Ambrose Monaghan, trustee. The second address was read by Mrs. Patrick Mulligan, president of St. Malachy's Sub-division C. W. League, and the Vice-president, Mrs. Eugene Smith, presented a silver service. Mr. John W. Farmer, president Kinkora Branch C. M. B. A., read an address, and Mr. Michael Mulligan, charter member of this branch, presented a valuable club bag. The fourth address, on behalf of the Catholic Young Men's League, was read by Mr. John R. McCabe, President, and the Vice-president, Mr. Earle Duffy, presented a china cabinet. Finally Miss Eileen McIvor read an address from the Children of Mary's Sodality and Miss Elizabeth McCordie made a presentation of silver.

I kneel before the Altar Throne In true sincerity, And ask each favor of the past Increase a thousand fold, And that, in perfect health, you see The Silver turn to Gold."

LOSE BOUTS HIS SILVER JUBILEE MEETING

Rev. M. J. Smith, Kinkora, remembered By Parishioners On Happy Occasion.

The annual meeting of the P. E. I. Auxiliary of the British and Foreign Bible Society in Canada and Newfoundland was held in the United Church in Mt. Stewart yesterday.

The afternoon session opened with devotional exercises conducted by Rev. M. K. Charman who in addition gave a very hearty welcome on behalf of his town and church to the delegates. This welcome was responded to appreciatively by the President, Rev. H. D. Raymond.

The Treasurer, Dr. H. D. Johnson, reported a total of over \$13,000.00 received. Of this amount \$8,271.00 has been forwarded to Toronto and \$1,074 expenses, leaving a balance on Jan. 1st, 1931, of \$3,728.00. Since then \$3,500.00 has been also forwarded to headquarters. We are glad to report bequests amounting to \$4,698.00.

The District Secretary, Rev. J. M. Murchison, gave the following report: The year 1930 has presented some unusual problems in our Bible Society work. The financial depression especially evident in farming districts has made collecting very difficult, but our Island Auxiliary was fortunate this year in falling heir to a legacy through the will of the late John R. MacLeod. It may be of interest to the Bible Society friends on the Island to know that the New Brunswick Auxiliary was also fortunate in that regard through the will of the late A. B. Foster, but in the case of New Brunswick the money has not yet come into the hands of the Society.

It is gratifying to notice that almost all of the new branches organized during the year have sent in substantial subscriptions. The total contribution from the province of Prince Edward Island is \$8,749.00.

Colportage was prosecuted vigorously by Mr. Thomas Millman. His work has been of the very highest order and because of his addresses and organizing ability many friends have been made for the Society. I am also glad to say that in New Brunswick colportage has not been neglected. Messrs. Crozier, Bradley and Goodwin have rendered magnificent service and although their period of service was somewhat short yet they circulated over 3,137 portions of Scripture in a little less than three months. The value of the work of these men is not determined merely by the Scriptures they sell but by the spiritual power which is released through their personal contacts in conducting family worship in the homes and also on the conduct of public services they make Jesus Christ more real to the people.

Because this is a part of District No. 2, I feel it is only right to state that Dr. Heine, one of our Maritime men, is carrying on a marvelous work with the Foreign speaking population in Upper Canada. His services to the Bible Society are invaluable because of the fact that he is able to carry on a conversation and speak to the people of the great living truths of God's Word in over twenty six languages.

During the year it was my privilege to conduct services in various places. The officers in each place where a meeting was conducted were interviewed and in addition personal interviews were held and I reorganized the Alberton and O'Leary branches. During the trip I organized the following new branches: Glenwood, Cape Wolfe, Wheatley River and Fredericton.

SCHMELING TO MEET CARNERA IN TITLE BOUT

NEW YORK, July 8.—Max Schmeling, world's heavyweight boxing champion, and Primo Carnera, giant Italian challenger, will meet "some time in the early fall," in a championship bout, William Saxe, President of the Madison Square Garden, of Illinois, announced today following a conference with the fighters' managers.

NEW YORK, N. Y., July 8.—Max Schmeling, king of the heavyweights, will be back in the ring September 17, risking his championship and swapping punches with another challenger, this time Primo Carnera, the "man mountain" from Italy.

Less than a week after he blasted young Bill Stribling in the Cleveland Municipal Stadium ring, the dogged German agreed today through his manager, Joe Jacobs to his second championship defense of the summer season. Schmeling is en route to Germany for a brief vacation, but he will return in August to resume training. The distance will be fifteen rounds, but the site for the match must remain a guessing puzzle for several weeks at least. Unless Schmeling is reinstated in New York, a remote possibility, since he so far has refused to meet Jack Sharkey, in a return engagement, the bout will be taken by the Madison Square Garden Corporation of Ohio to Chicago, Jersey City, or Philadelphia. Cleveland might be given another chance to produce a gate greater than the \$350,000 output for the Schmeling-Stribling duel that cost the Ohio Garden a loss of about \$50,000.
