Supreme Court.

The King on the prosecution of John Currie against Alfred Gallant and John Gallant. This was an indictment for assault, occasioning actual, bodily harm and the trial occupied the attention of Chief Justice Sullivan and a jury all day yesterday and resulted in the acquittal of both defendants.

The assault arose out of a disputed boundary line between the defendants. Alfred Gallant's farm on Lot 35, and the prosecutor Currie's. Last October, Premier Farquharson sent out Mr. May of the Land Office to run a line between the farms, but when he got to the place Alfred Gallant objected to the line being run where May wished to run it, claiming that it would be in the wrong place. May, however, insisted on running the line where he liked and directed the prosecutor Currie, to cut stakes to stake out the proposed line. Gallant forbade Currie from cutting any stakes as he owned the land, but Currie insisted and Gallant caught him and threw him down, a scuffle ensued, and the collar bone put out of place Gallant's son John, the other defendant, came to his father's assistance. The parties were separated by other men who were present. The defence was that the defendants were justified in forcibly removing Currie from the land which Gallant owned and if the collar bone was displaced in the removal it was not so intended but was merely an unexpected result of the scuffle and ejection. A number of witnesses were examined on both sides, and the jury after a short absence returned a verdict of not guilty against both defendants and they were discharged. The Attorney-General for the crown, Stewart K. C. for the prisoners. The civil docket will be taken up this morning at 10.30.

THE FIRST SESSION

Students' Conference Held on Saturday

P. E. I. REPRESENTED

Rev. Campbell Morgan, late of London, Eng., the First Speaker

NORTHFIELD, MASS., June 29.—The International Students' Conference met here last evening at 8 o'clock with John R. Mott presiding.

The speaker of the evening was Rev. Campbell Morgan, late of London, Eng., but who is now in charge of the great and varied work that Mr. Moody organized.

Mr. Morgan, who is about forty-five years of age has been marvelously successful as a leader in the so-called higher and spiritual life movement.

The conference which began yesterday will continue until the 7th of July. The program of the different days is not yet definitely known.

The mornings of each day until noon will be given up almost entirely to Bible and mission study. Upon no feature of the Conference is there so much stress laid as upon the Bible study work. All of the delegates have not yet arrived but notwithstanding this fact nearly all the larger institutions of U. S. and Canada are well represented. It will perhaps be interesting to know that P. E. I. has sent one man to represent each of three Canadian colleges. As the Conference advances we may be able to note some features of interest.

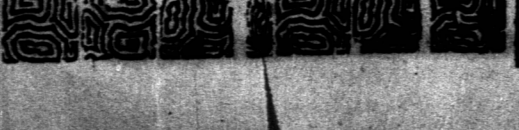

The Death of Rev. J. Bennet.

In referring to the death of Rev. James Bennet D. D. the St. John Sun says:—Rev. James Bennet, D. D. died at an early hour this morning, at the age of 85 years. His tall and commanding figure and patriarchal appearance has grown less and less familiar on the streets for months past. The younger generation know little about him, but for nearly half a century Dr. Bennet was a living force in Presbyterianism in New Brunswick, and in literary circles was known as a man of wide learning and powerful intellect.

Dr. Bennet was born in Lisban, Parish of Killaney, County Down, Ireland, on Feb. 17th, 1817. The family were originally Huguenots, three brothers going from France to the north of Ireland to avoid persecution, and there settling among the Presbyterians. From these three it is believed that most, if not all, the people bearing that name in the north of Ireland, are descended. The parents of James Bennet were John Bennet, a farmer; and Laetitia Patterson, the latter being of Scotch-Irish descent. The Bennets lived at Lisban for at least six or seven generations.

James Bennet had good teachers. He finished his primary education in the classical school of the Royal Academical institution in Belfast, under the Rev. Thomas Dix Hincks father of the late Sir Francis Hincks; took his undergraduate course at Belfast college; studied theology at Belfast, Glasgow, and Edinburgh; under Drs. Chalmers, Welsh and Brunton; and was ordained over the Presbyterian church at Tassagh, County of Armagh, Ireland, on March 20th, 1843. There he remained for nearly eleven years.

He then accepted an invitation to St. John Presbyterian church, and arrived here on March 3rd, 1854. On May 17th of that year he was inducted by the presbytery of St. John and continued to labor in that church until compelled by growing infirmity to retire from the active pastorate. He received the degree of D. D. from Davidson college, South Carolina, in 1877.

Dr. Bennet was a prolific writer. He was associated with the late Dr. Elder in editing the colonial Presbyterian, in which a number of his sermons were also printed. Others of his sermons more than fifty in all were published chiefly in the daily papers. One sermon The Divinity of Christ proved from His Character and Claims preached when Dr. Bennet was moderator of the synod of the church in the lower provinces attracted much attention. He is also the author of a book of 423 pages, Wisdom of the King, published in Edinburgh in 1870. He was one of the original orators and a frequent contributor to the Maritime Monthly, and also wrote for the old Stewart's Quarterly. Besides prose writings he was the author of many metrical compositions of merit, and some of these were gathered together in a little book, he has also written a book which has not been published, but which will doubtless yet appear in print.

Altogether Dr. Bennet has been a strong man, and he is kindly remembered by many an aged Presbyterian in New Brunswick, who may not have seen him for many years, but who remembers him as he was in the days of his vigorous ministry.
