### FIFTY TONS OF CANDY.

Have Been Sent to Our Soldiers in the Phillipine Islands by the Government.

Fifty tons of candy have been sent to the soldiers in the Phillipine Islands by the commissary department of the army during the last three months and amounts to the soldiers in Cuba and Puerto Rico.
