## Reviews Activities Of Credit Unions

Following is the text of the report of President Lewis F. Campbell at the tenth annual meeting on July 10th with P. E. I. Credit Union League Limited:

"Before presenting my report to the tenth annual meeting of the Prince Edward Island Credit Union League Limited, I wish to express on behalf of the board of directors, my pleasure in welcoming you delegates and visitors to this Convention.

It is gratifying to see such a large number of delegates present a tangible proof of the keen interest our credit unions are taking in this important movement in our province. It is equally gratifying to have with us visitors, both from our own province and abroad because their interest in our work inspires us to greater effort in the important work we have set ourselves to do.

"During the past several years of our growth and development the world was steeped with unrest and wars and to-day we, with thinking men everywhere, are much concerned about the remodelling of a depressed and war-torn world on a Christian and democratic basis which will insure a fuller life and a lasting peace for all our people for all time.

#### Accomplishments

"During the year now under review, your directors met six times to carry on the usual business entrusted to their care by your organizations and to institute and develop new courses of action which the development of an organization of this kind demands.

"Under our new agreement with the Provincial Government the responsibility of the administration inspection and general supervision of credit unions has been placed upon the Credit Union League and during the past year this work has been carried on in an energetic and efficient manner by your zealous Managing Director, Mr. J. G. Dennis and his able and enthusiastic assistant, L. J. Corcoran.

"In the promotional and educational field the League has assisted at short courses which were put on by St. Dunstan's University Extension Department. These short courses are a potent factor in co-operative education and are much appreciated.

"During the year Rev. M. E. Francis was appointed by the League as the Prince Edward Island representative to the Quebec Conference of the Co-operative Union.

#### Mr. Smith's Visit

"During the winter, the Central office of the Credit Union League had the pleasure of a short visit from Mr. Gordon Smith, Canadian CUNA representative. In the short period at his disposal several meetings were held throughout the province. We hope to see Mr. Smith again this summer and we urge all credit union officers and members to be present at these meetings to hear his hand complete information concerning co-operative insurance.

"Your central office endeavored as far as possible to send speakers last October to credit union annual meetings. I am not so sure of the advisability of this procedure, as it tends to interfere with the members' discussions at their own membership meetings. Perhaps a so-called "credit union League" speaker at a meeting following the annual meeting and attended by League Managers and directors would be more effective.

"We are pleased to report that Credit Unions in the Province have made encouraging advancements during the year.

"The membership drive, so successful in past years, was a part of our programme during the year. To the organizations we offer our sincerest congratulations.

"A highlight of our year's accomplishments and one which entailed much work and hard thinking at our central office was the outstanding completion of our Central Share and Loan Department. This branch of our organization is now ready to function, and we hope that, with your patronage, it will fill the needs for which it was organized. Copies of its by-laws and policies will be mailed to member organizations in the near future. The administration of this department according to its by-laws is carried out by the director of the P. E. I. Credit Union League Limited and its Managing Director.

#### Choice of Directors

"Because therefore the Board of Directors of the Credit Committee and the Supervisory Committee of the Department are taken from the membership of the Board of Directors of the League, it is imperative that you choose directors who are willing and able to attend all meetings and to give freely of their time and energy to insure the proper administration and supervision of this important department.

"Our Provincial organization was ably represented by our National Director, Mr. J. G. Dennis, at the CUNA National Convention held at Milwaukee this year; his report is being placed before your Directors as official delegates to the Annual Co-operative Congress in Antigonish.

## Comment On Halifax By-Election

OTTAWA, July 15—(CP)—Prime Minister Mackenzie King tonight issued the following statement on the Halifax by-election:

The expression today of the confidence of the people of Halifax constituency in the present Government is most gratifying. It is also most significant. Halifax is the third successive by-election which has been won by the Liberal party.

It was just before Christmas that the Liberal candidate received the overwhelming endorsement of the electors of Richelieu-Vercheres. Shortly before the Easter recess the Liberal candidate was elected by a large majority in the Cartier division of the City of Montreal.

Now on the eve of the conclusion of a lengthy session of Parliament the electors of Halifax have also expressed their confidence in the present administration by returning Major Dickey, the Liberal candidate, by a handsome majority.

Since the beginning of the session the electors of Halifax have known that an by-election would be held and every effort has been made by all parties to stimulate their interest in the program of the parliamentary session.

It is particularly noteworthy that, at the end of this long session with the opportunities it has afforded to the opposition groups to criticize the Government and its policies, the electorate of Halifax should have been so decisive in its verdict.

The outcome of the by-election is but another evidence that, with the issues placed clearly and effectively before the people they prefer to trust the affairs of the nation to the Liberal party with its forward-looking program and its avoidance of extreme positions. The repeated endorsements of the Government in successive by-elections may not unfairly be regarded as a reflection of the position which the present administration continues to enjoy in the confidence of the people throughout the country.

## Georgetown And Vicinity

Mr. Bracken

OTTAWA, July 15—(CP)—John Bracken, Progressive Conservative leader, said in commenting upon the outcome of the Halifax federal by-election tonight that the electors had accepted "promises" of the government in returning a Liberal candidate.

Text of Mr. Bracken's statement:

The people of Halifax have spoken. With a divided opposition the government candidate has won.

The government delayed the election on the pretext that it could not hold it in cold weather. It then proceeded to concentrate its plans and its promises on Halifax.

With some time to go before a general election these promises have met with substantial acceptance.

The government also had the advantages arising from several thousands of dominion and provincial employees in the constituency, and from the support of a strong Provincial Government organization.

As good democrats we accept the verdict and shall make ready for the next test wherever it may be.

## Mr. Cplwell

OTTAWA, July 15—(CP)—M. J. Cplwell, C. C. F. leader, tonight issued the following statement on the Halifax by-election:

The result of the Halifax by-election is most encouraging to the C. C. F.

In the general election of 1947 we polled less than 2,000 votes. In 1946 our vote was slightly less than half of that polled by the Progressive Conservative who ran well behind the Liberal.

The result indicates the steady deterioration in the support accorded the Progressive Conservative party and the steady trend towards the C. C. F. to noticeable recent by-elections.

We did not elect our candidate but we are pleased with the remarkable increase in strength.


