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IN MEMORIAM (Continued from Page 1) march to Timbuctoo and relieved a French military column that had been ambushed by natives. Joffre's appointment in 1911 to be generalissimo of the French armies "in the event of war" proved to be a particular piece of prudence and prevision on the part of the French authorities, for when war did come in 1914 Joffre showed himself to be just the man of unwavering resolution and commanding strength that the army and nation needed in the crisis that developed. It was known before that he was a great soldier and strategist. It was demonstrated in September, 1914, that he was even greater as a commander, for it was in the historic first Battle of the Marne that he put the seal to his military reputation and established a high standard of commandship. The French armies under him had made violent and disconnected attacks on the Germans in their invading movements through Belgium. Then came the French retreat which exposed the north of France to German occupation, and then it was that Joffre's great power made itself felt. In his hands the French retreat became more and more coherent, until, finally, by a supreme act of command, he bade the retreating army turn about and take the offensive. The order was magnificently obeyed, to bring about the "miracle of the Marne" which raised Joffre's prestige higher than that of any other living general of the time. It was, however, seen that Joffre was not suited to the trench warfare that followed in sequence. Unsuccessful operations were accompanied by heavy losses, and Joffre's failure to make doubly sure the assurance he gave that the Verdun front was safe and well equipped—an assurance which was disproved by recurring German attacks—was the principal rock on which his command foundered. His prestige suffered grave injury, and in November, 1916, the field command was transferred to General Nivelle. Joffre was called to Paris and was promoted to marshal of France. Afterwards he became technical adviser to the French Government. That marked the end of his period of active war service. In 1917, when the United States entered the war, Marshal Joffre came with the French mission to America, and Canada had the honor of welcoming him in the course of the short tour that he made on this occasion. That welcome was worthy of the soldier and the man. Those who had the honor of meeting him immediately appreciated and admired his genial personality and his ability of character.
