NEW YORK, Nov. 18—With the statement that from twenty to twenty-five per cent of women afflicted with a form of cancer peculiar to the sex can be cured permanently if the disease is treated in its early stages the Clinical Congress of Surgeons at its meeting last night in the Academy of Music, Brooklyn, took steps to start a crusade of publicity throughout the country which it is believed will help largely to check the ravages of the usually fatal malady. A committee of five of the leading gynecologists of the United States was appointed to begin the fight at once and report at the next congress.

THE SAME OLD GAME BY SAME OLD BOY.

WINNIPEG, November 18—Under the heading. The same old game by the same old boy the Telegram makes an editorial attack on the Rev. Charles W. Gordon (Ralph Connor) for being the "presumable author of the resolution passed by the Presbyterian synod at Brandon criticizing the government's motives during the recent MacDonald election. Gordon, says the Telegram, is a man entirely under the dominion of his passions and prejudices and incapable of sane judgment on any matter even remotely connected with politics. This is so recognized that people have come to treat him more with pity and consideration rather than with contempt; he would otherwise merit. His next idea has been brooded over by an ill-balanced mind so long that it is probably imbedded in some physiological alteration in the brain structure which greatly diminishes his responsibility, if it does not entirely remove it. No doubt the synod was far more occupied with the immediate problem of keeping Gordon in a soothed condition than with the terms of the implication of the resolution. If so its motives in getting thru with the matter were praiseworthy and will be sympathized with by those who know the reverend gentleman. Argument, expostulation and opposition are hopeless. They only lead the Gordon type to confound with the price of darkness any who make use of them. The Gordons of this world must either be humored or restrained, when their mania is touched.

To accuse Gordon of calculated hypocritical malignity from the fact that outrage practiced in the interests of the liberal party cause no mental reaction to him would be absurd. Such things do not touch him because we don't strike the nerve center where the disease lies.

PRES. WILSON SEEKS REST IN BERMUDA.

HAMILTON, Bermuda, November 18—President-elect Wilson and his family on board the steamer Bermuda arrived at Hamilton today. Mr. Wilson was received by the officials of the city and was enthusiastically cheered as he passed through the streets. The mayor of Hamilton in the course of a welcoming address said: "We trust that during your term of president the cordial relations between the United States and Great Britain will be maintained and unimpaired and that the strong bonds of the union will be strengthened. Mr. Wilson replied: "As soon as I knew I had been sentenced to four years hard labor. I thought of a rest in Bermuda. The friendship existing between the United States and Great Britain is a very happy and natural one and I hope nothing will happen during my administration to disturb the relations of the two countries. Mr. Wilson then expressed his wish to be allowed to remain incognito.
