A Canadian girl, Miss Mahon of Brockville, is nurse in charge of President McKinley and the New York Sun, in calling for the best medical skill to attend the distinguished sufferer, mentions the name of Dr. Osler of Baltimore. He is Prof. Osler of the Johns Hopkins University, who was born in Toronto, educated at McGill, and has since become eminent in the principles and practice of medicine. Thus Canadian men and women are found well up among the best and foremost in the United States.

The Edmonton Bulletin and the Winnipeg Free Press have been discussing the probable increase of representation in the great West as the result of the census. They agree that Manitoba shall have ten members, the Territories six, British Columbia eight and the Yukon one, if not two members after the readjustment. This will make at least 25 and possibly 26 members for that part of the Dominion west of Lake Superior. Regret is felt and expressed that they must wait till next Parliament, possibly four years yet, before they can seat their new representatives.

There was a regrettable increase in drunkenness visible in the city on the day of the races, which fact calls for increased activity on the part of those having in charge the enforcement of the prohibitory law. But this must not shut of sight the fact that the law has already done much towards giving us a sober city. The arrests for all causes during the month of August just passed were 26 as against 44 in August of last year and the number arrested for drunkenness was but 17 against 36 last year. Something may fairly be allowed for the excitement and the number of strangers and sporting men in town on race day.

The venture of a trans-atlantic telephone is to be made by the American Telephone and Telegraph Company, which bought out, for three quarters of a million dollars the invention of Professor Pupin. That invention is believed to have solved the question of long distance telephony. It is believed that a cable telephone line under the Atlantic could transmit messages with about three hundred times the rapidity of a telegraph cable and for much more moderate charges. Prof. Pupin's patent covers the discovery that by the insertion of little inductive coils in the telephone wire at distances of one eighth of a mile, the electric current is renewed, and made operative for any required distance. Applied to land lines it enables a very thin copper wire to be as effective as a heavy wire is now.

The people of Winnipeg, who had been preparing on a very extensive scale to do honor to the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall in that City are much displeased with the official limitations that have since being imposed. They had intended to have a great procession in which the Executive, Legislature, City Council and fraternal and benevolent societies should take part. The official orders since received from Ottawa say the procession will be strictly one of royalty, only their Royal Highnesses and suite taking part therein, with the usual military escort. The Mayor and Council are instructed to await the Royal Party at the City Hall. Presentations at the railway station will only be made by command or request of the Duke and will be extremely limited. Premier Roblin blames Major Maude for these restrictions and says he has assumed too much authority. The Premier says much of the order from Ottawa is objectionable and tends to create a feeling of resentment.

Few incidents have given rise to more newspaper fakes than has the shooting of the President. A number of wholly irreconcilable stories of what took place at the shooting have been printed by leading journals. What the President said and what Czolgosz said at the time have no doubt been truly reported by some of the newspapers, but the accounts do not agree. An alleged "confession" of the murderer, which was widely published turns out to be a pure fake. One prominent journal

printed a sensational description of a scene in the hospital when the deadly bullet was extracted "as witnessed only by our own correspondent." The bullet in question is still in the President's body. Four or five different alleged portraits of the assassin are going the rounds of the press which cannot possibly all be recent portraits of the same person.

Our Island stockmen and breeders made considerable shipments of stock by the Princess yesterday as exhibits for the Provincial Exhibition at Halifax. We trust they may meet with their usual good success, and if they do we shall have presently to record a prize list that will show creditably for the Island. Next year we hope to see an Interprovincial Exhibition in Charlottetown. The omission of this year has tended to make our people a little exhibition-hungry.

It is now almost a week since President McKinley was shot, and we are rejoiced to know that so far his progress toward recovery has been all that the most sanguine could have hoped. And yet there must remain a good deal of concern for perhaps a week to come, even should his progress during that period continue to be as satisfactory as it has hitherto been. He has received frightful wounds, which in the state of surgery as it was half a century ago would probably have proved fatal. In that time, however, great advances have been made, and the President has the advantage of the best skill and science of the times. His vigorous constitution, his temperate life and calm temperament are also powerful factors in his favor.

On distinguished visitors from New England have come and gone. They produced a most pleasing impression upon those they met as genial, courteous and gifted men and they professed themselves pleased with what they had seen of Canada and Prince Edward Island. We shall all be delighted if they visit our shores again next year, as they intend doing. Such visits and interchange of friendly greetings tend to promote good and neighborly feelings. But we need not suppose that immediate reciprocity in trade between the two countries is likely to be quickly brought about. There are powerful interests on both sides of the line that stand opposed to free trade. For that matter Boston and New England generally have long favored freer trade relations, but New England although the most enlightened and advanced, is only a fractional part of the great Republic and cannot always have things its own way.
