# Strong Criticism Of Government

## Conservative Candidate Makes Favorable Impression At Glen- wood Political Meeting.

An enthusiastic reception was ac-  
 corded Mr. G. Shelton Sharp, and  
 supporting speaker, Mr. Adrien F. Ar-  
 senault, M. L. A., at the joint polit-  
 ical meeting held in Glenwood Hall  
 on Thursday night to discuss the  
 issues in the forthcoming bye-election  
 in the Second District of Prince  
 Edward.

The hall was crowded to its fullest  
 capacity and those who could not  
 gain admittance grouped themselves  
 at the open windows. Mr. W. J. Wort-  
 man of West Point, was appointed  
 chairman and succeeded in maintain-  
 ing good order and securing for each  
 speaker a fair and impartial hear-  
 ing. On the platform there were be-  
 sides the Conservative candidate and  
 Mr. Arsenault, Hon. Thane Campbell,  
 Liberal candidate and Premier Lea,  
 who supported him on the platform.

Mr. Sharp, the first speaker, re-  
 ceived a tremendous ovation when  
 he rose to address the meeting. After  
 making reference to general ar-  
 rangements regarding the meetings  
 he stated that between him and the  
 Liberal candidate there had been  
 made a mutual agreement that this  
 is to be a clean election—no money  
 or rum to be used in obtaining votes.  
 This practice is no departure from  
 the principle of conduct always fol-  
 lowed by the speaker, for never in  
 the course of his three political cam-  
 paigns had he given a dollar in cash  
 or a bottle of rum to secure a vote.  
 (Applause.)

"It will be well for us to thus give  
 Mr. Campbell a start in the right  
 direction for he will need a good start  
 and all the advantage of his early  
 training if he is to maintain his in-  
 tegrity while associating with the  
 present government," Mr. Sharp sug-  
 gested. At the meeting held in St.  
 Marks' the previous evening the Lib-  
 eral candidate had for half of his al-  
 lotted time spoken on Federal mat-  
 ters in an effort to beloud provincial  
 issues. Mr. Campbell had then been  
 informed that the Bennett Govern-  
 ment holds the reins of power at  
 Ottawa and will retain them for the  
 next four years, and we are now  
 concerned with local politics. If we  
 elect Mr. Campbell as the representa-  
 tive of this District we would there-  
 by condone the offences and fail-  
 ures of the Government.

**Enforcement Failure**

The speaker dwelt for some time on  
 the prohibition question, stressing  
 the fact that Mr. Saunders had been  
 willing to run on any policy that  
 would win support—Prohibition, Gov-  
 ernment Control or sale of light wines  
 and beers. After having been elected  
 by the co-operation of the Temper-  
 ance Alliance and the temperance  
 people of the Province, he had failed  
 to keep his pre-election promises  
 in regard to the enforcement of the  
 law. Everyone knows that there is  
 at present a great deal of rum in  
 circulation. Formerly the Liberals  
 used to complain that the Conserva-  
 tives let offenders out of jail on  
 suspended sentence, but under the  
 present administration they are not  
 even put in. Over fifty offenders who  
 were convicted never saw the inside  
 of the jail. This may be due to "pull"  
 or to the fact that there are so many  
 prisoners in jail already that these  
 must await their turn.

In dealing with the purchase of  
 road materials mention was made of  
 the fact that the Government had  
 failed to make use of the native grav-  
 el in the province but had instead  
 sent money to the mainland for im-  
 ported gravel. There was no opportu-  
 nity for the farmer or his boys to  
 obtain any work in connection with  
 this for it only had to be discharged  
 from the cars. At West Point, Con-  
 way and other points are quantities  
 of gravel which is equal if not super-  
 ior to the imported gravel. Premier  
 speak on Provincial issues and leave

**Mr. Campbell's Address**

The Liberal candidate's address was  
 in large measure a repetition of what  
 he had said at St. Mark's the pre-  
 vious night. Prohibition, roads, the  
 need of a lawyer in the House, the  
 futility of sending a Conservative as  
 representative in the House at the  
 present juncture, old-age pensions,  
 —all of these subjects were gone over.  
 Mr. Campbell insisted that in spite  
 of what Mr. Sharp had said to the  
 contrary the election of the Liberal  
 candidate in second Prince would be  
 a protest against Premier Bennett's  
 action in boosting the tariff.

Voice from the audience: "You  
 might put Bennett out!" (Laughter.)

**Mr. A. F. Arsenault**

When the applause which greeted  
 the appearance of Mr. Adrien Arsenault  
 when he rose to speak had sub-  
 sided, he stated that he intended to  
 refer to the imported gravel. Premier

Lea is following Mr. King's example  
 of importing everything and send-  
 ing all the money out of the country  
 leaving neither employment nor mon-  
 ey for our own boys. (Applause.) It  
 is true that some native gravel is  
 now being hauled owing to the fact  
 that a bye-election is pending.

**Comparison of Expenditures**

In referring to the fiscal situation  
 the speaker took a copy of the pub-  
 lic accounts and from them proved  
 conclusively that the finances are at  
 the present time in worse shape  
 than ever heretofore. Later in the  
 course of his address the speaker  
 dealt with the Subsidy question going  
 back to the time when the Dominion  
 Government had purchased from the  
 Hudson Bay Company the land which  
 was later formed into the provinces  
 of Alberta and Saskatchewan.

The fact that the Lea and Saun-  
 ders Government had failed to obtain  
 a settlement as the western provin-  
 ces did, was no doubt due partly to  
 the fact that Mr. King knew that  
 the various farmer parties in those  
 provinces were disintegrating and  
 going back to the original Liberal and  
 Conservative parties and he was cat-  
 ering to these western provinces and  
 fishing for votes. Another reason why  
 we failed to get this additional sub-  
 sidy was the inefficiency of our rep-  
 resentatives. These men have not  
 made good and it is only a question  
 of time to get in a Conservative Gov-  
 ernment in this province and secure  
 satisfactory results.

The audience were asked to consid-  
 er the absurdity of Mr. Campbell's  
 statement that by electing him the  
 people would be registering a protest  
 against the action of the Dominion  
 Government in raising the tariff.

"Fancy this second District of Prince  
 Edward Island, protesting against  
 Mr. Bennett who has been elected  
 with a large majority of votes in a  
 country of eight or nine millions of  
 people.

A vote for Mr. Campbell is not a  
 protest against Premier Bennett, but  
 an endorsement of Premier Lea. Ex-  
 perience had taught Mr. Saunders  
 that it was in the past easy to elect  
 a Liberal in this District and when  
 he wished to find a place in which  
 his law partner might enter the con-  
 test he selected this district which is,  
 according to their estimate, easily  
 won.

In conclusion, the speaker stated  
 that if the people were satisfied with  
 the present government they should  
 support the Liberal candidate, but if  
 they wished to get in line with the  
 Government at Ottawa and secure  
 something for the district they should  
 poll their votes for the Conservative  
 party.

Mr. Bennett and Mr. King to attend  
 to their own business. He went on  
 to show the absurdity of the com-  
 plaint being made by Liberals to the  
 effect that the Conservatives had  
 compelled Mr. Campbell to run an  
 election. Why should this district ac-  
 cept as their representative a man  
 from Summerside—one who was not  
 even a resident in the district? It is  
 the people's privilege to decide wheth-  
 er or not he shall represent them.  
 Had he been a member he might  
 have been elected by acclamation.

Premier Lea had evidently decided  
 that there would be only one bye-  
 election held. The Premier was af-  
 fraid to open the three seats for fear  
 of getting three Conservatives elect-  
 ed.

In speaking of the subsidy claims  
 it was stated that Messrs. Saunders,  
 Inman and Claire Campbell had pro-  
 ceeded to Ottawa with 2,000 copies  
 of the brief presenting their case  
 which had been prepared by the last  
 government. They came back with the  
 report: "We have pleasant anticipa-  
 tions. We hope to receive large sums."  
 Later Mr. Saunders again proceeded  
 to Ottawa and while he was absent  
 Mr. Lea had another brief prepared  
 behind his leader's back. At one time he  
 thought he was in touch with some  
 \$3,500,000. When Mr. Saunders re-  
 turned from Ottawa he quizzed and  
 enquired until he found out about  
 the second brief.

Previously the Stewart Government  
 had not been thus divided but had  
 worked together and had secured an  
 additional \$125,000. This with the  
 railway tax money to the amount of  
 \$40,000 gave the present adminis-  
 tration \$165,000 more revenue than the  
 Conservatives had enjoyed. In spite of  
 this fact the indebtedness last fall  
 was \$540,000. How much it is now we  
 do not know; and this is election year.  
 "But we'll know next spring. It is  
 certain that by the time they get  
 out they will have on this little mil-  
 lion acre farm of Prince Edward Is-  
 land a mortgage of one million dol-  
 lars."

Premier Lea now admits he can-  
 not enforce the prohibition law. Of-  
 fenders had been put in jail—but  
 they set the jail on fire. They also  
 made booze so that the care-taker  
 advised building a rum-proof fence  
 around the jail. They put them to  
 work on the roads—but they got  
 drunk and fought near the homes of  
 two Liberal members and the At-  
 torney-General. Medical attendance was  
 required for some of them after the  
 fight was over. Next they put them  
 to work dismantling an old house but  
 they sold the windows to buy some  
 bottles of rum.

"They paid the Montreal detective  
 \$1200 or \$1400 because he did his  
 duty well. But what did he do about  
 the fire? Nothing. What did he do  
 about the stolen boxes? Nothing; and  
 the bootleggers—did he do anything  
 about them? Yes, he got drunk, and  
 good and drunk. Then they paid him  
 off, and sent him back to Montreal.  
 Did they investigate to ascertain if  
 he had been a reliable man or are  
 conditions on our Island so bad that  
 he became thus degraded in the short  
 month he was here?"

**Election Promises**

In connection with the conduct of  
 affairs by the present adminis-  
 tration, Mr. Arsenault said Premier  
 Lea had become so interested in Federal  
 politics that he even tried to defend  
 the New Zealand Treaty. He prom-  
 ised to look into the business of  
 producing small fruits such as blue  
 berries and cranberries. He imported  
 an American expert who later  
 sent a report in which he advised  
 against any attempt to grow cran-  
 berries here for several reasons. The  
 first reason advanced was that cran-  
 berries cannot be grown without  
 sand; so it seems there is no sand  
 on Prince Edward Island. The second  
 reason given was that we had  
 no experience, and presumably we  
 are too stupid to learn. The third  
 objection was the danger of frosts in  
 July and lastly we can grow pota-  
 toes, and should stick to them.

Road work was the next topic dis-  
 cussed. When the Liberal party came  
 into power, in 1927, they had expen-  
 ded \$100,000 on road machines of which  
 only the large machines proved to be  
 of use. These machines were pur-  
 chased with borrowed money. The  
 expenditures for repairs the first year  
 was \$8,000; for the second year it  
 amounted to \$27,000. Soon repairs to

these machines will have amounted  
 to more than the original cost. We  
 are still paying interest on this mon-  
 ey as well as on that which was bor-  
 rowed to put on the roads gravel  
 which is fast sinking into dust and  
 which it is admitted must be replac-  
 ed. The cost of using gravel indis-  
 criminate at the high cost of  
 \$3,000 per mile was condemned.

After further reviewing the fail-  
 ures of the Liberal administration  
 the speaker pointed out the advan-  
 tage of electing a man from the dis-  
 trict which he represents. In con-  
 clusion he urged them to defeat the  
 Attorney-General and compel the  
 Government to go to the country.

**Premier Lea**

Premier Lea who followed Mr. Ar-  
 senault contended among other things  
 that the roads were in good con-  
 dition, the Prohibition Act had been  
 enforced, and that no offenders have  
 been allowed to go unpunished.

In his rebuttal speech Mr. Sharp  
 denied the Premier's "rumor" that  
 the Conservative candidate had been  
 bribed to run by the promise of a  
 Senatorship. The speaker did not in-  
 tend to belittle the electorals when  
 he stated that their action on elec-  
 tion day would have little effect on  
 the Bennett Government. He had  
 merely stated what was obviously the  
 fact, as every elector was aware.  
 Those who were really belittling the  
 2500 voters in this district were those  
 who had without consulting the peo-  
 ple, sent a Summerside lawyer here  
 to represent them on the assump-  
 tion that no one in the district was  
 capable of filling the position. No  
 one need be told that Prohibition  
 has not been effective, Mr. Sharp  
 continued. Premier Bennett had not  
 called the Parliament to discuss any  
 question except unemployment and  
 the tariff had been considered mere-  
 ly because this subject is closely al-  
 lied with that of unemployment.  
 The contention that old-age pen-  
 sions should now be available was  
 absurd and no one had been prom-  
 ised them or expected to receive them  
 before a reasonable time had been  
 given the Premier to make the nec-  
 essary arrangements. The Liberals  
 boast of the work that they accom-  
 plished on the roads but they can-  
 not get away from the fact that much  
 of this was done on borrowed money  
 and that when they go out of power  
 they will be one million dollars be-  
 hind.
