Reduction In Ford Car Prices

EAST WINDSOR, Ont., Jan. 17.—Prospects for a material improvement in the automobile industry were anticipated today by Mr. Wallace R. JAMES E. KING WAS POPULAR IN SILVERTON

Late School Principal Was Returned Veteran; Funeral in East

SILVERTON, B. C., Jan. 6.—The Kootenay district generally and especially Silvertown lose a valuable and respected citizen in the death of James E. King, late principal of the Silvertown school which occurred suddenly in the Community hospital New Denver, early Wednesday morning, December 31.

His illness was of very short duration, as he only entered the hospital on the evening of December 29. Dr. Francis, in charge not being entirely satisfied with diagnosis ordered a post mortem examination and inquest. The jury brought in a verdict that death was due to a perforated gastric stomach ulcer. All possible

that medical aid and kind attention could do was done.

Mr. King was 44 years of age and was born at Rocky Point, Prince Edward Island.

He was a graduate of Prince of Wales College, Charlottetown, P. E. I., in 1904, later taking a degree at Queen's university. He taught school for a time on the island, coming to Creston, British Columbia, in 1908, taking charge of the school there later going to Salmo, where he taught until coming to Silvertown in 1915. Taking charge of the Silvertown school as principal, he taught continuously with the exception of two years spent in active service overseas.

The first graduating class from the Silvertown Superior school was passed under the direction of the late principal and each year his achievements had been marked by successful graduating classes. He was a member of the Canadian Legion, Slocan branch and was well and favorably known throughout the province. He was a lover of sport of every kind and took an active interest in every undertaking which would benefit the community. In religion he was a Roman Catholic. Mass on his behalf was celebrated in St. Patrick's church, Silvertown on Saturday morning, January 3, by Rev. Father Finnigan. The body was forwarded to his home parish on Friday morning in accordance with the wishes of his relatives. It is probable that a military funeral will be held about January 10. His mother, two brothers, William and Frank at home, and a brother Aubrey J., residing at Ryderwood, Wash., remain to mourn his passing.
