**DEATH OF GUNNER
GORDON FERGUSON
OF 8TH SIEGE BATTERY**

Mr. H. E. Ferguson of the P. E. I.
Railway has received a telegram an-
nouncing the death of his son Gordon
who died of gunshot wounds in No. 7
General Hospital, Stomr, on July
17th. Gunner Ferguson was a member
of the 8th Siege Battery and was em-
ployed with the Rogers Hardware Co.
before enlisting.

Mrs. Ferguson, is in receipt of the
following letter giving particulars of
the death of her gallant son.

Dear Mrs. Ferguson:—You will
have received intimation of the death
of your dear son and I write to give
you a few particulars—and to offer
my deepest sympathy. He was
brought to this hospital the evening
before last, very severely wounded.
He was conscious for a little while
and not in great pain. He soon laps-
ed into unconsciousness and died at
10 a. m. yesterday. He had the best
of surgical and nursing skill and devo-
tion. I gave him Christian burial at
the Souvenir Cemetery, St. Omer.
We laid him to rest in that blessed
hope which robs death of its sting
and sorrow of its despair and I pray
that hope may sustain you. Your son
has given his life in a noble cause
and your sorrow will, I know be ming-
led with pride. May God comfort
you.

**"NOTHING MORE
GLORIOUS"**

**P. E. I. Archbishop's Eloquent
Tribute to Those who are
Doing and Have Done "Their
Bit"**

A few words from an address by
His Grace Archbishop Sinnott, of the
Roman Catholic Diocese at Wint-
peg, a native of Morag, delivered on
the occasion of the unveiling of the
honor roll in the Brandon Catholic
Church are apropos, and comforting
at the present time:

"I have been told," said His Grace
"that there is a small reservation of
Indians somewhere in Ontario, where
every man of military age and fitness
took up arms when the country called.
I know not what credence may be
attached to that report, but were it
true, it was indeed a glory which
might be the envy of every commu-
nity in the land. For my own part,
I would desiderate nothing more glori-
ous for any parish in this arch-
diocese. And even if every able-bodied
young man paid the supreme penalty,
the community would indeed be the
loser, but the democracy we cherish
would not be the loser, for their
names would be a precious heritage
to encourage and inspire wherever
duty called for courage and sacrifice."
"Now to the honor which we will-
ingly pay to those who are gone and
to the sorrow which we naturally feel
at their loss, we must add the suffra-
ge of our prayers. That is another
reason why we are gathered here to-
night. Before this altar of sacrifice
and in presence of the divine victim
who dwells thereon, we join with you
in prayers that God may heed their
sacrifice and grant them eternal
rest. Their blood has watered the
soil of France, and they are buried in
nameless graves, far from those they
loved, but the sweet aroma of their
heroic deeds is still with us, and
will endure as long as time will last.
That God may bless the families from
which they sprung and bless the
country for which they died is our
most fervent prayer."

THE MONTAGUE RACES

It is estimated that there were
close upon five thousand people in
attendance at the horse races at Mon-
tagne on Wednesday.

A regrettable accident happened to
Mr. W. S. McKie's horse "British
Soldier." This fine animal came to
the track in the pink of condition and
started the first heat of the 2.18 trot
stake and was leading the pack with
the exception of Devilish Dorothy,
when one of the reins broke and he
jumped up the bank at the side of the
track and sprained an ankle. This
injury was not noticed until the sec-
ond heat when the animal was retired
from the field.

Though starting in fourth position
Devilish Dorothy captured the pole
and won the first heat. Duholme won
the subsequent three heats and the
race, the fight for second place being
between Dorothy and Dr. Sharper.
Best time 2.20.

The 2.25 pace was won in straight
heats by Patola, owned by David
White, North River. At hardly any
time during the three heats was
Queen Catherine more than a length
behind. Moth Miller also put up a
splendid fight going from seventh pos-
ition in the first heat and indeed cap-
turing second position from Queen
Catherine on the home stretch in the
third.

In the 2.30 trot stake Dus' Miller,
in the first heat set the mark at 2.21
after which the best time made was
2.25 by Lloyd Achilles and Cap Cres-
ceus respectively in the 2nd and 3rd
heats. It took five heats to decide
this class, and the surprise was in
store for the knowing ones when Bet-
ter Not whose position in former
heats had been 10, 4 and 8 respec-
tively stepped out in subsequent heats
and captured first place.
