NOVA SCOTIA WINS THE MATCH

HALIFAX, N. S., June 11—The twenty-fourth annual contest for the Inter-Maritime trophy took place at Bedford road yesterday, resulting in a win for Nova Scotia. This contest between teams of eight marksmen, representing the province of New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia respectively, has been kept up continuously since 1886, the contestants being selected exclusively from the active militia, and creates as much interest locally as the Kolopore cup match does at the National Rifle association meet in England, and is shot under nearly similar conditions, the only difference here is that two sighting shots are allowed.

The match takes place on the second Thursday in June of each year and is shot alternately in the three provinces—last year at Prince Edward Island, next year it will take place in New Brunswick. The trophy is held for the year in which it is won, but cannot be won out permanently. It has been won by New Brunswick eight times, Prince Edward Island four times, and Nova Scotia, including this year, twelve times. Nova Scotia won it in 1907; P. E. Island were the winners last year. Nova Scotia has the record score of the match to its credit—735 points, made in Charlottetown in 1902. The competitors proceeded to Bedford on the 8.15 a.m. train, and started in shooting promptly and were able to complete the shooting at 500 yards by 1 p.m. Captain J. E. Hills, 63rd regiment, very acceptably filled the position of range officer in the absence of Major W. A. Garrison, who was unavoidably prevented from attending. Lieutenant-Colonel H. Flowers, 1st C. A., the general secretary of the Nova Scotia Rifle association, was present throughout the day to do the honors for the visiting teams. Messrs. Doane, Haystead and Dymond acted as range keepers. The morning opened bright and clear and as a result the shooting at the 200 yard range brought out some good scoring. At 500 and 600 yards the wind was from the left rear, varying from three to five degrees. Leaving 200 yards Nova Scotia had a lead of 4 points on P. E. Island.

SMOKE-WRAPPED NEW BRUNSWICK

The Sky Darkened, Many Men Fighting Forest Fires, Relief Trains Sent.

NEWCASTLE, June 11—(Special)—Yesterday afternoon and evening there was a tremendous amount of smoke as town coming from the forest fires which are consuming the valuable timber lands at different places throughout the country. At Lockstead a fire is raging and many men are fighting desperately to get control of it. On Richibucto Road a stretch of five miles on both sides of the road is a seething mass of flames and great anxiety is felt for the people living in this district, as help cannot be got to them. A special train with a large crew of men left Newcastle last night to fight the fire in the vicinity of Rogersville. Another special went up the Canada Eastern, on a like mission.

ROBT. MCCONNELL DIED AT OTTAWA

OTTAWA, June 10—Robert McConnell, of the Statistical Branch of the Customs Department, died here this afternoon after an illness of some length. He was born in Pictou County, N. S., in 1842. For many years he was a prominent figure in Nova Scotia newspaper circles, having published the Eastern Chronicle in New Glasgow for a number of years, and was on the Halifax Chronicle under Hon. W. S. Fielding, was editor of the Truro Guardian, the Moncton Transcript, was assistant Editor of the Montreal Herald in 1887, a short time. He returned to the Halifax Chronicle as editor-in-chief, and for many years filled that position, and represented that paper during a session in the parliamentary press gallery. He was appointed to the Customs Department eight years ago. Mrs. McConnell died about a year ago. The body will be taken to Halifax for burial tomorrow, by his daughter, Miss McConnell of Ottawa, and his son Miller McConnell of the Montreal Star. The funeral will be held on Saturday.

Captain MacKinnon, of P. E. I., unfortunately crossed-fired at 500 yards, and consequently got a miss to his credit. While it has been stated above that the contest under the rules is confined to active militiamen, the past two years New Brunswick has had one member of the permanent corps on his team and no objection has been raised, it is therefore probable that next year the rule will be amended, as permanent corps men are Canadians, which was not so when the contest originally started.
